Thank you for your e-mail regarding plans for the commemoration of the 100th anniversary of Armistice Day on 11 Nov 2018.

I would be pleased to see what others are planning and a round table meeting sounds like a good way to do this. Delma Tomlin, from NCEM, called a meeting some years ago about VWV1 and has built up an archive so she would be a good contact to start the conversation, delma:tomlin@ncem.co.uk

In our churches, we have started to formulate and implement some plans for the anniversary:-

- 1. York Peace Bells these are already in position at Holy Trinity Goodramgate, St Paul's Bookshop and in the Merchant Adventurers' Garden (the latter will be moved to Holy Trinity Micklegate soon). Information attached. Nearer the time, we will put information about the WW1 bell story beside the bells.
- 2. We have bought banners with the poppy emblem for the lantern at All Saints Pavement. These were installed in 2017 and have now been taken down. We will use them again in 2018
- 3. We have launched a Poppy Project asking people to make poppies and keep hold ofthem until Sept 2018. At that point we will bring groups of people together to attach the poppies to camouflage netting. The whole of the outside of All Saints Pavement Church will be covered with the netting and poppies with sandbags around the base to make an art installation for 30 days leading up to 11 Nov2018. E mail address is Poppies2018@aol.com Knitting/crocheting patterns can be found on All Saints Pavement website https://www.allsaintspavement.org.uk/poppy-project-2018.html

This is in partnership with York Press, RBL York Branch and the families of the three young men remembered in the Afghanistan Window in All Saints Pavement. We are hoping that people will embroider names on to the poppies of family members or friends who died or were injured in WW1 and all conflicts/wars since then to link WW1 with Afghanistan. http://www.yorkpress.co.uk/news/15634535.Spectacular_poppy installation planned for Armistice centenary/ More publicity will be done in Jan 2018 and continue through until Nov 2018.

- 4. We have researched the names of those who are commemorated on the memorial boards in our churches. This information will be made available for public viewing in our churches in 2018.
- 5. Plans are in place for the 2nd Annual Peace and Reconciliation Lecture in June 2018. We are hoping that Pastor Robert Pfeiffer and Pastor Annegret Wegner-Braun from Marienkirche in Lubeck, Germany will be with us to have dialogue.
- 6. Those named in the WW1 memorial book in St Martin Coney Street are being remembered by name in church services, on the anniversary of their death. This has been in place since 2014 and continues.
- 7. Holy Trinity Micklegate has educational information panels about WW1 on display in the church and joined in with the Micklegate businesses initiative to display wooden and knitted poppies along Micklegate.
- 8. We are planning Remembrance Day services or Acts of Remembrance for all of our churches to include silence at 11am on 11.11.18 and bell ringing that day to announce the 100th anniversary of the Armistice. The content for St Helen and St Martin will depend on the city's plans eg if a huge event is planned in the city centre.
- 9. We are planning services of music and readings in some of our churches on the eve of the Armistice (Sat night)
- 10. We are considering the use of All Saints Pavement Church for the 30 days during the Poppy Project installation. This could be in partnership with others to provide a programme of lectures, music, readings etc.

Other thoughts:-

a. I have been impressed in 2017 by the use of the words of in Flanders Fields which were marked out in poppies in several locations across the UK. Could something similar adorn the grassed areas of the walls of York?

- b. Falso wonder how the stories of local families carribe told eg. the 10 Calpin brothers who went to war in WW1 http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/av/uk-england-york-north-yorkshire-27622656/york-s-calpin-brothers-hailed-as-ww1-heroes
- c. Conversations with school are important and I haven't heard anything about what they might be planning. Could every school age child be given a momento of the 100th anniversary eg. a chocolate coin wapped in a commemorative foil? (A real coin or medal would be better but I guess that's too expensive) Nestle might help.
- d. I'm wondering whether or not York Minster has plans for the display of the Kings Book.

Contradicting DORA - Ring for Peace

If you wander around the streets of York, you will find 3 mediaeval bells and an invitation to Ring for Peace. The locations are:-

- 1. Holy Trinity Goodramgate
- 2. The gardens of the Merchant Adventurers
 Hall
- St Paul's Bookshop, Fossgate

The Defence Of the Realm Act forbade the ringing of some church bells during war time – this project asks people to ring a bell for peace to commemorate the 100th anniversary of WW1.

With permission of The York Bell Fund, three remaining bells from the old church of Holy Trinity

or Christchurch (The Butchers' Church), King's Square have been located across the City for up to one year as we prepare a permanent home for the bells. We have details of the bells which indicate that they were founded by



Chamberlain's of London circa 1440. These bells would have been heard by Saint Margaret Clitherow and by the butchers in the Shambles.

Rev'd Jane Nattrass is chaplain to the York Gild of Butchers who agreed to support the project. The link with Holy Trinity, Micklegate is apt because the Gild now meets in Jacob's Well, Holy Trinity, Micklegate's hall. Butchers were reserved occupations during wartime so it is pleasing that the Gild can be part of a peace bell project.

Aims:

- To enable the people of York to reclaim their connection with part of their heritage by telling the story of the bells and history to those who live here.
- To allow access to 15th century bells and bring them back into use.

- To assist in providing a City wide project which will be a legacy in the City of York commemorating the 100th anniversary of WW1.
- To bring back into use an empty bell tower for the benefit of the community and to engage with the heritage of York's only remaining priory church. It is hoped that the bells will find a permanent home in a church in York with three new bells. They will be known as York Peace Bells commemorating the 100th anniversary of WW1.



SIT NOMEN DOMINI BENEDICTUM Located at Holy Trinity Goodramgate (Blessed be the name of the Lord)

ETERNIS ANNIS RESONET DOMINIS JOHANNES Located at Merchant Adventurers Hall Gardens (Through eternal years, let John resound for the Lord)

The York Army Museum has recently received £6300 from the Heritage Lottery Fund for an exciting new project, Impact: First World War

Legacies , through HLF's First World War: Then and Now programme. The project will focus on exploring the experiences of Yorkshire soldiers when returning home to Yorkshire, and the efforts made to memorialise those who did not. This project involves discussion of soldiers' return to the UK and will work to support school and community groups explore war memorials in their areas, and research soldiers appearing on them. The project will result in greater awareness and understanding of the diversity of those who fought in the First World War and how the conflict affected the local area after its conclusion. We are offering free workshops and resources to local school and community groups to help document war memorials that are housed within buildings and areas they use. The outcomes of this project will be a temporary exhibition hosted at York Army Museum and a database compiling information regarding the local war memorials documented and the soldiers who are documented on them. The information generated on this database will be available through the exhibition and also in the archive and via the website of York Army Museum.

We will also have a programme of talks and activities throughout the year.

Other Suggestions

1.One thing which might prove useful would be a central website or printed leaflet which draws together key details of the various events planned across the city. We have approached the Minster, Mansion House, NRM and Bar Convent about liaising to produce joint information aimed at schools and youth groups which simply gives details of the themes/topics in relation to WW1 which each organisation is concentrating on during 2018 so it is helpful for teachers, planning and information purposes, perhaps something like that would be useful but on a bigger scale.

2 We hosted a Memorabilia Roadshow last year where we invited the public to bring along photographs, documents, medals etc and we would help them with identifying and finding out more about their documents. We worked with Explore York Archives and are planning to do so again next year with a world war 1 focus. Such an event with an emphasis on WWI history could allow people across the city to share stories, learn how to look after their documents and artefacts and create a community led exhibition which could be displayed at various venues across the city.

The merchantile marine, as it was termed in those times, played a significant and often critical role throughout the First World War...much the same as it would two decades later. In both world wars merchant seafarers and fishermen fought the enemy, the weather and the seas to keep the nation and the Armed Services supplied and able to defend themselves. Their way of life and conditions of service were austere with seafarers often not returning home for over two years, some having been sunk, survived and transferred to other ships to maintain those lines of support.

The total recorded losses for the First World War were 2,479 ships and 14,287 seamen plus 675 vessels of the fishing fleet and 434 seamen. There were many more seafarers who died ashore and were not commemorated. They had to die at sea to be commemorated even whey they were hospitalised because of their wounds. They were also off pay when their ships were sunk. They actually had to die at sea to be commemorated.

The men, women and boys who were lost at sea during the First World War included lads such as Redan Sydney Jeffries (aged 13) of Lowestoft, presumed drowned on 24th October 1917. Redan was a Cook aboard the fishing vessel Vanguard. More than twenty-nine Boy seamen aged only 14 lost their lives for their King and Country. At the other end of the scale were men long overdue for retirement who insisted on "doing their bit" and who paid the ultimate sacrifice. Men such as A.B. Patrick Casey, aged 73, killed when the S.S. Dotterel was sunk by a mine off the French coast on 29th November 1915....they were the forgotten heroes, their lines of support were never broken.

The war saw horrifying loss and suffering and, whilst being called 'The war to end all wars', it of course proved to be far from that. Whilst all those that fought in the war have sadly now passed away and those who lived through it are now few in number, it is vital we continue to remember those that died in WW1 and those that have subsequently died in defence of our nation, and to educate people for the future. Next year's 100 year anniversary will be all the more poignant as it falls on a Sunday, although we are hoping that day will be just the culmination of a series of events across York.

Earlier this year, City of York's Council passed a motion calling for a Councillor group to be set up to co-ordinate plans for the commemoration across the city, with the aim of ensuring that as many people as possible feel part of the commemoration—see copy of motion attached.

As the members of the Councillor group, we are keen to find out about:

- Any plans that you may already be developing to commemorate the WW1 centenary.
- What the Council and its partners might be able to do to support those plans,
- What other ideas you might have for commemorative events or initiatives that

you think the city might pursue

• Whether you would be willing to participate in any events being organised in the city
