LICENSING ACT 2003 SUB – COMMITTEES PROCEDURE FOR HEARINGS

Introduction

The procedure outlined below will be followed at all Licensing Hearings.

As Licensing Hearings are quasi-judicial the Sub-Committee will, in effect, act like a Court and the rules of natural justice will apply. The Sub-Committee will be guided by legal principles in determining whether evidence is both relevant and fairly admitted. Committee Members have a duty to view all evidence presented before them impartially. Members of the Licensing Sub-Committee have all received relevant training and are used to making decisions of this type. No matter how strong local opinion may be, Committee Members can only make decisions based on relevant licensing issues as set out before the Sub-Committee in determining applications.

The hearing will be in public session. However, the Sub-Committee may exclude the public from a hearing if it considers it in the public interest to do so. However, the decision will be made in private.

The purpose of the hearing is

- To enable those with a right to appear to advance their point of view and to test the case of their opponents
- To assist the Sub-Committee to gather evidence and understand the relevant issues

In view of the requirement to hold hearings within specified times, the Licensing Authority will generally be unable to enter into discussions to identify dates convenient to all parties concerned. In exceptional circumstances, the Licensing Authority will consider applications to adjourn hearings to a later date.

Representations at Licensing Hearings

The Applicant, Ward Councillors, and Representors who have made written submissions will be allowed to speak at the Sub-Committee. At

any hearing of an application, the Applicant and any Representors shall attend in person wherever possible. Any party to a hearing may be assisted or represented by any person, legally or otherwise.

All parties will be given a fair hearing and each party will have the same amount of time in which to address the Sub-Committee. A time limit has been set because of the pressures on the Sub-Committees to hear so many applications in a short period of time. **Each party will have 15 minutes to address the Sub-Committee, give any further information, and call any witnesses.** If any party considers this time to be insufficient then a request in writing may be made to the Democracy Officer for an extension of time at least 2 working days before the hearing. However, this will not be automatically granted and will be at the discretion of the Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee may take into account any documentary evidence or other information in support of the application, representations or notice, either before the hearing or, with the consent of all other parties, at the hearing.

If any Representors fail to attend the hearing, the Sub-Committee will normally proceed but will consider their written objection and hear and consider any evidence and argument in relation to it put forward by the Applicant. In considering written evidence in the absence of a Representor, appropriate weight will be attached, given that the person cannot be questioned by the Applicant and Members.

The Sub-Committee is required to disregard any information given or evidence produced by a party or witness which is not relevant to the application, representations, or notice, and the promotion of the licensing objectives. Duplication should be avoided. Comments must be confined to those points already made, although the parties may extend or expand on their written submissions. The Sub-Committee will have read and familiarised themselves with all the written submissions and the issues prior to the hearing, and therefore do not require the points to be repeated or made at length. The Applicant and Representors cannot raise substantial new information at a hearing which has not been seen previously by the other parties.

A Representor **may not** introduce any new ground or objection not referred to in the written submission. Additional representations which do not amount to an amplification of the original representation may not be made at the hearing.

Any person behaving in a disruptive manner will be asked to leave the hearing. If this does occur, that person may, before the end of the hearing, submit in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally.

Procedure prior to the Hearing

The Members sitting on the Sub-Committee will meet prior to the hearing to note the matters that are to be presented. They will only be accompanied by the Democracy Officer and Legal Advisor (*if present*). Attention will only be drawn to the nature of the application and the premises or person to which it relates. The actual application will not be discussed.

At any hearing of an application, the Licensing Officer, the Applicant and any Representors or representatives will report to reception and be asked to wait in reception until the democracy officer calls them through to the committee room.

Procedure at the Hearing

1. Members of the Sub-Committee will appoint a chair.
2. The Chair introduces the Committee Members and officers [*Democracy Officer, Legal Advisor to the committee (if present) and the Licensing Officer*], welcomes the Applicant and Representors (or their representatives), and establishes the identity of all who will be taking part.
3. The Chair will explain to the parties the procedure that will be followed at the hearing.
4. The Chair will proceed with the order of business on the agenda.
5. When the agenda item relating to the application is reached, the Chair will invite the Licensing Officer to present the application.
6. The Licensing Officer outlines the application, confirms the application details, introduces the report and gives an update on any recent changes.

7. The Chair will invite Committee Members, the Applicant and Representors (or representatives) to ask the Licensing Officer questions to clarify any points raised in the report.
8. The Chair will ask the Applicant (or their representative) to present their case.
9. The Applicant (or their representative) will present their case and may call any witnesses to support their case [*maximum 15 minutes*].
10. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to ask questions of the Applicant (or their representative) and/or witnesses [*maximum 5 minutes each party*]
 - (i) Police
 - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
 - (iii) Ward Councillors
 - (iv) Interested Parties
11. The Chair will invite the Committee Members to ask questions of the Applicant (or their representative) and/or witnesses.
12. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to state the nature of their interest in the matter, present their case and call any witnesses to support their case [*maximum 15 minutes each party*]
 - (i) Police
 - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
 - (iii) Ward Councillors
 - (iv) Interested Parties
13. The Chair will invite the Applicant to ask questions of each Representor (or their representative) and/or their witnesses after each presentation [*maximum 5 minutes per Representor*].
14. The Chair will invite the Committee Members to ask questions of each Representor (or their representative) and/or their witnesses after each presentation.

15. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to summarise their case *[maximum 5 minutes each party]*
 - (i) Police
 - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
 - (iii) Ward Councillors
 - (iv) Interested Parties
16. The Chair will invite the Applicant (or their representative) to summarise their case *[maximum 5 minutes]*.
17. The Chair will provide the Sub-Committee with a final opportunity to seek clarification from any of the parties on any points raised, or seek advice from the Licensing Officer on policy, or from the Legal Advisor *(if present)* on law and jurisdiction.
18. When all the evidence has been heard, the Chair will declare the hearing closed and ask the Licensing Officer, the Applicant and Representors (or their representatives) plus any witnesses present to leave the committee room and wait in reception while the Sub-Committee considers the evidence.

Procedure after the Hearing

19. If the Sub-Committee wish to seek further clarification on the evidence given, the Democracy Officer will invite all parties back into the committee room.
20. If possible, and for all hearings under:-
 - section 35 or 39 which is in respect of an application made at the same time as an application for conversion of an existing licence under paragraph 2 of Schedule 8 (determination of application under section 34 or 37)
 - section 85 which is in respect of an application made at the same time as an application for conversion of an existing club certificate under paragraph 14 of Schedule 8 (determination of application under section 85)
 - section 105(2)(a) (counter notice following police objection to temporary event notice)
 - section 167(5)(a) (review of premises licence following closure order)

- paragraph 4(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing licence)
- paragraph 16(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing club certificate)
- paragraph 26(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application by holder of a justices' licence for grant of personal licence)

the Sub-Committee will make a decision on conclusion of the hearing and only the Democracy Officer and the Legal Advisor to the Sub-Committee (*if present*) will remain in the room with the Committee Members. These officers will not comment on the merits of the application, but will be present to provide advice on legal and procedural points and to record the decision.

21. If the decision has been made, all the parties will be invited back into the committee room by the Democracy Officer. The Chair will announce the decision including reasons together with, if appropriate, details of any conditions to be attached to the grant of the licence. This decision will then be communicated in writing to the Applicant and Representors within 3 working days of the hearing. There can be no further questions or statements.
22. For all other hearings not listed above, if the Sub-Committee is unable to make a decision on the day of the hearing, the decision will be made within 5 working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held. The Democracy Officer will inform the parties that they are no longer required and the decision will be communicated in writing to the Applicant and Representors within 3 working days of the decision being made.
23. The notification will include information about the rights of appeal against the determination made.

Summary

1. This report seeks Members determination of an application for the grant of a premise licence, which has been made under the Licensing Act 2003.
2. Application reference number: CYC-060438
3. Name of applicant: Dunnington Community Events
4. Type of authorisation applied for: Grant of Premises Licence
5. Summary of application: The proposal is to allow for the provision of the following licensable activities:

Proposed Activity	Timings
Plays (indoors & outdoors)	Friday to Sunday 10:00 – 23:00
Films (indoors & outdoors)	Friday to Sunday 10:00 – 23:00
Boxing or wrestling (indoors)	Friday to Sunday 10:00 – 23:00
Live music (indoors & outdoors)	Friday to Sunday 09:00 – 23:00
Recorded Music (indoors & outdoors)	Friday to Sunday 09:00 – 23:00
Performances of Dance (indoors & outdoors)	Friday to Sunday 09:00 – 23:00
Opening times	Unrestricted

Background

6. A copy of the application is attached at Annex 1. A copy of the plan of the premises is attached at Annex 2.

Promotion of Licensing Objectives

7. The operating schedule showing how the applicant will address the four licensing objectives as follows:

General

- 1) Dedicated event safety officer.
- 2) Committee members and volunteers present throughout events.
- 3) Full risk assessment and site plan.

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

- 4) Licensed security.

Public Safety

- 5) Barriers.
- 6) Licensed security.
- 7) Volunteers / marshalls.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 8) Car parking marshalls in dedicated car parks.
- 9) Regular security patrols.

Protection of Children from Harm

- 10) Lost children area.
- 11) Visible stewards.

Special Policy Consideration

8. This premise is not located within the special policy area.

Consultation

9. Consultation was carried out by the applicant in accordance with s13, and s17 (5) of the Act and Regulation 42, Parts 2 and 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005, which concern the displaying of a notice on the premises and an advertisement in a local paper giving details of the application and serving a copy of the application on all responsible authorities. The applicant complied with all statutory requirements. In addition the relevant ward councillors and/or parish council were notified by way of register.
10. All procedural aspects of this application have been complied with.

Summary of Representations made by Responsible Authorities

11. North Yorkshire Police made a representation to the application but withdrew it when the applicant agreed to the following conditions being attached to the premises licence if granted:
 - 1) The York Safety Advisory Group will be presented with the Events Safety Manual, full risk assessment, Public Liability Certification and Safety Certification where the expected attendance is above 499 people and / or significant demountable structures or road closures are proposed no later than 3 months prior to the event.
 - 2) A scale plan showing the layout of the event, to include fire exits, shall be submitted to the Safety Advisory Group 3 months prior to the event.
 - 3) There shall be a litter pick of the area upon the conclusion of the event (or daily conclusion should the event be held over a number of days) with particular emphasis on any glass items that have been brought onto site by customers.
 - 4) All necessary steps shall be taken to ensure that all supervisory staff in sole charge of children and young people are Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checked by the licence holder.
 - 5) There shall be no more than 6 events totalling no more than 18 days in any 12 month period.

- 6) Prior to holding any event the fire authority should be notified in good time of the activities and layout which are to be held so they can make suitable observations and recommendations to ensure that fire safety measures are appropriate in the circumstances having assessed the risk to the public and the adequacy of the existing fire precautions.
- 7) A dispersal policy appropriate to the site will be agreed with the Licensing Authority.
- 8) A minimum of 2 SIA registered door supervisors will be on duty at the premises to cover an occupancy of up to 500 customers throughout trading hours when licensable activities are taking place and the premises is open to the public, and an additional SIA registered door supervisor will be employed per 100 customers (or part of) thereafter.
- 9) The need for SIA registered door staff shall be determined in accordance with a risk assessment with specific consideration given to boxing and wrestling events, the risk assessments shall be carried out by the premises licence holder. When employed door staff will wear high visibility armbands.
- 10) An adequate number of stewards shall be on duty when licensable activities are taking place and the premises is open to the public which specific consideration given to boxing and wrestling events.

Boxing / Wrestling Events only

- 11) A qualified first aider shall be present throughout any sporting entertainment involving boxing and wrestling.
- 12) Where a ring is used it will be constructed by a competent person and shall be inspected by a competent authority before use and any material used to form the skirt of the ring shall be flame retardant.
- 13) The seating layout shall be agreed with the appropriate authorities.
- 14) All drinks shall be served in non-glass vessels only. For glass bottled drinks, the drink is to be decanted into non-glass vessels.

12. The agreement is attached at Annex 3.
13. City of York Council Public Protection (Environmental Protection) made a representation on the grounds that the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective would be undermined if the premises licence were to be granted in the terms applied for. Public Protection withdrew the representation after mediation with the applicant who agreed to the following conditions being attached to the licence if granted:
 - 1) A detailed plan showing the exact layout of the site and proposed sound monitoring locations shall be sent to the City of York Council's Public Protection Environmental Protection and Licensing Authority at least 28 days before an event. The plan shall include a sample of a leaflet to be delivered to residential properties within the vicinity of the event giving details of the event and a list of the addresses which will receive the leaflet.
 - 2) Generators shall be placed away from residential properties and if possible behind a building or screen.
 - 3) The quietest generators available shall be used.
 - 4) Before the event a designated complaints phone shall be set to vibrate and the complaint hotline number tested to make sure it is working.
14. The Public Protection representation and agreement is attached at Annex 4.

Summary of Representations made by Other Parties

15. Representations have been received from 72 residents on the grounds that all four of the licensing objectives will be undermined but in particular in relation to the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective. A list of representors is attached at Annex 5. Copies of the representations are attached at Annex 6.
16. A map showing the general area around the venue is attached at Annex 7.

Planning Issues

17. There are no planning issues.

Options

18. By virtue of s18(4) of the Act, the Committee have the following options available to them in making their decision: -
19. Option 1: Grant the licence in the terms applied for.
20. Option 2: Grant the licence with modified/additional conditions imposed by the licensing committee.
21. Option 3: Grant the licence to exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates and modify / add conditions accordingly.
22. Option 4: Reject the application.

Analysis

23. The following could be the result of any decision made this Sub Committee:-
24. Option 1: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by any of the representors.
25. Option 2: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant or any of the representors.
26. Option 3: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant or any of the representors.
27. Option 4: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant.

Council Plan

28. The Licensing Act 2003 has 4 objectives the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm.
29. The promotion of the licensing objectives will support the Council's Plan for a prosperous city for all and a council that listens to residents.

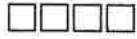

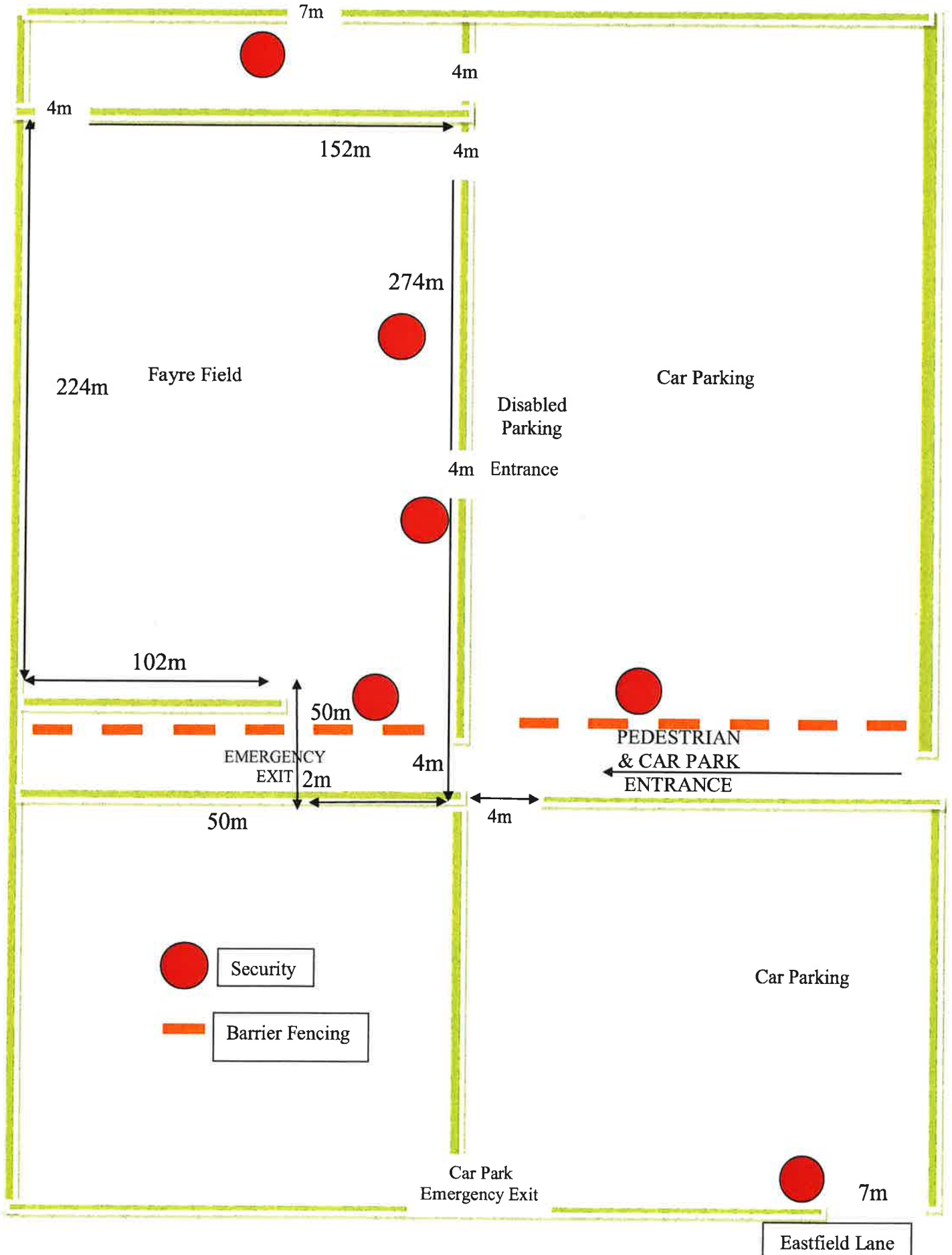

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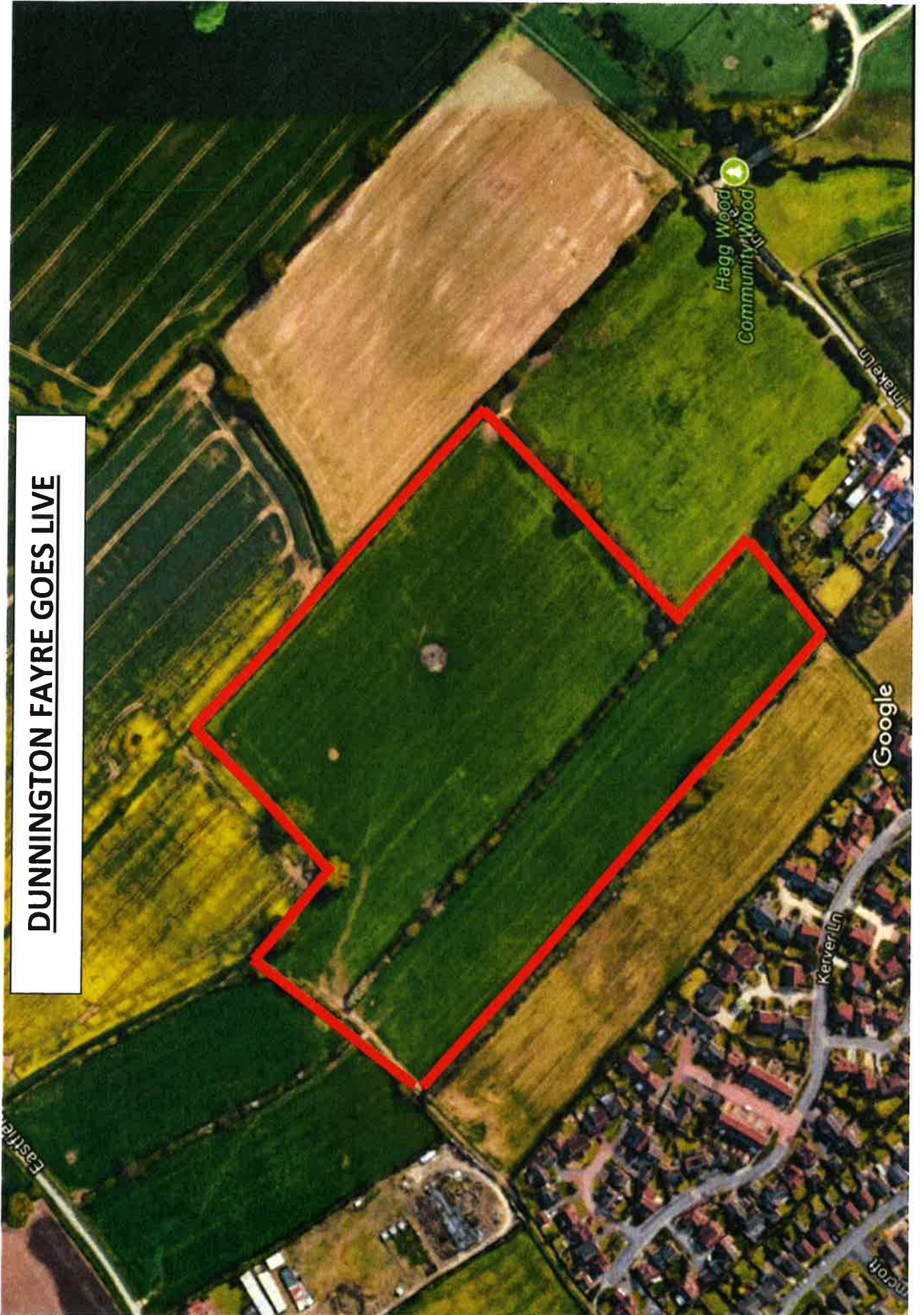

Eastfield Lane marks the exceptional scenic setting of the northern boundary of the village. I write therefore to raise a number of issues about this application, which would seriously affect Eastfield Lane and also the wider village.

- 1. Events:** Currently there are two events on the "Showfield": Dunnington Fayre and Bonfire Night. These are genuine events for the community of Dunnington, which existed before their present location. This application seeks a massive increase in the number and variety of events, none of which would be genuine community events. Of the six categories, Plays and Films are very well catered for in York, Boxing and Wrestling are inappropriate and the remaining three Music events are adequately and successfully catered for at the Dunnington Sports Club and the Reading Rooms. The events proposed on the "Showfield" would badly affect both the Sports Club and the Reading Rooms and the noise would impact across the village. The events are unnecessary and serve no obvious community need.
- 2. Traffic:** The only vehicular access to the "Showfield" is on Eastfield Lane, with vehicles being parked on the large field between Eastfield Lane and the "Showfield". The carpark adjoins Contract Services UK Ltd, which in turn adjoins local plan site H31. The latest CYC draft plan provides for the building of 76 houses on site H31, which also only has access to Eastfield Lane. The entrances to "Showfield" and H31 are approx. 105 yards apart. In submissions on the local plan, the Parish Council and residents of Dunnington have detailed the adverse traffic issues arising from H31. Some 152+ more cars from H31 and limited access will badly affect Eastfield Lane, which is very narrow; there will also be major knock-on issues across the village. The additional traffic issues precipitated by regular "ad hoc" events on the "Showfield" would grossly exacerbate those from site H31 which have already been strongly opposed by residents.
- 3. Indoor Structure:** The use of the term "Showfield" implies a permanence and intent that it does not currently justify. There is no indication of what structure would be used for these indoor events. Is that ad hoc too? Any permanent structure or regular events must be strongly opposed, because a change of use at some future date could potentially result in major housing plans that would change the entire character of the village. It is noteworthy CYC has turned down an application for the land to be safeguarded for longer term development (ref site 811 in the previous annual plan).

This proposal seems unnecessary and wholly inappropriate for Dunnington.

Regarding the above submission: this field has been used for several years now, and in my view is not suitable for the granting of licences for various reasons.

1. Eastfield Lane is at the junction of staggered, narrow crossroads. It can only accommodate two cars' width at the beginning, so any cars that park on the road cause tremendous visibility problems. The lane then narrows when housing stops and becomes a single track down to the entrance to the field.
2. Cars attending any events can park on any of the nearby roads, causing further blockage/visibility problems. Parking is available at a charge on another field, at a cost, but cars can be bogged down in wet weather.
3. Access for heavy lorries, trailers or mechanical vehicles attendant to these events are via Intake Lane, another residential road, past the children's play ground, also a road which narrows to a single track, or down the extremely narrow footpath/emergency road off Horsfield Way.
4. The noise levels from music played over loudspeakers travel over the eastern part of the village for quite some distance, especially during the still summer evening when windows are open, and play on until late.
5. We already have a purpose built facility in the village – Dunnington Sports and Social Club – fund raised by villagers in the 1970s and onwards, on land donated by locals, with rates paid to City of York presumably. These premises have the necessary basic requirements of water, drainage and sanitary to prevent disease which a field may not, despite any portable equipment. There is car parking and defined access.
6. The question of no defined opening or closing times, on unspecified dates rather unsettles.
7. The Council has recently passed planning for housing to be built on a field adjacent to the "Showground" field. Does this impact at all?

I live adjacent to Eastfield Lane field and I'm writing to object in the strongest terms to the Premises License application CYC 060438 being made to allow a wide array of events to be carried out on any weekend from 9am until 11pm.

If the license was granted than a quiet and safe neighborhood would suffer from noise, disturbance, issues of public safety and anti-social behavior because of the impact of the actual events and customers arriving and leaving. There are currently only two events held in this area which we currently content with.

Our house is in a quiet cul-de-sac at the end of a small snicket leading from Horsefield Lane to Kerver Lane. The snicket leads directly to the field mentioned within the application. It is an area where local children look to play and residents enjoy peaceful walks. This will be severely disturbed by events held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Our small cul-de-sac is occupied by young families and retirees and is a "destination and desirable area" to live due to its' secure and contained nature and peaceful environment. The area is very quiet both during the day and evening. Having an open-ended license to allow the adjacent field to play live and recorded music and serving alcohol will have a major impact on our local community. I feel our levels of safety will fall and pro-rata increases in disturbances late in the night/early mornings will be significant.

As all events will be outdoors and playing amplified music late into the night, is it reasonable to expect we will have to close our windows until midnight? Or reasonable to expect not to allow our children to play outside at the weekend or walk around safely?

There are no large areas of public parking and attendees of the events will have to enter the field on foot via the narrow snicket. Increases in traffic and parking into the cul-de-sac (and surrounding streets in the village) is tolerated for the current two events but will not viable for any

It is not suitable for hundreds of people to arrive/leave via this small path. It is directly behind people's property. The potential for damage to properties, pollution of the neighboring environment and risk to safety (including children who'll no longer be able to play safely in the snicket or cul-de-sac at weekends) is beyond my belief.

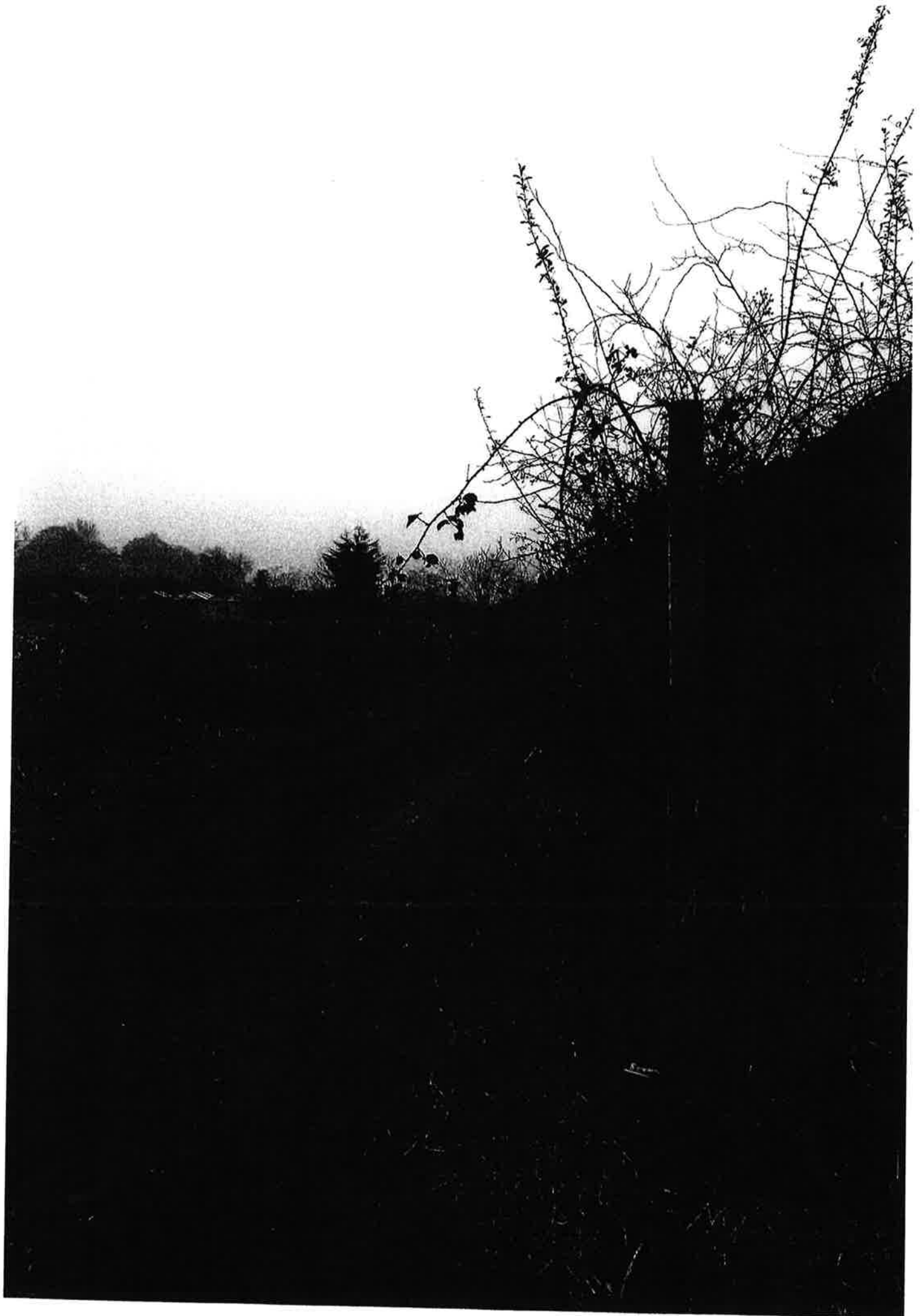

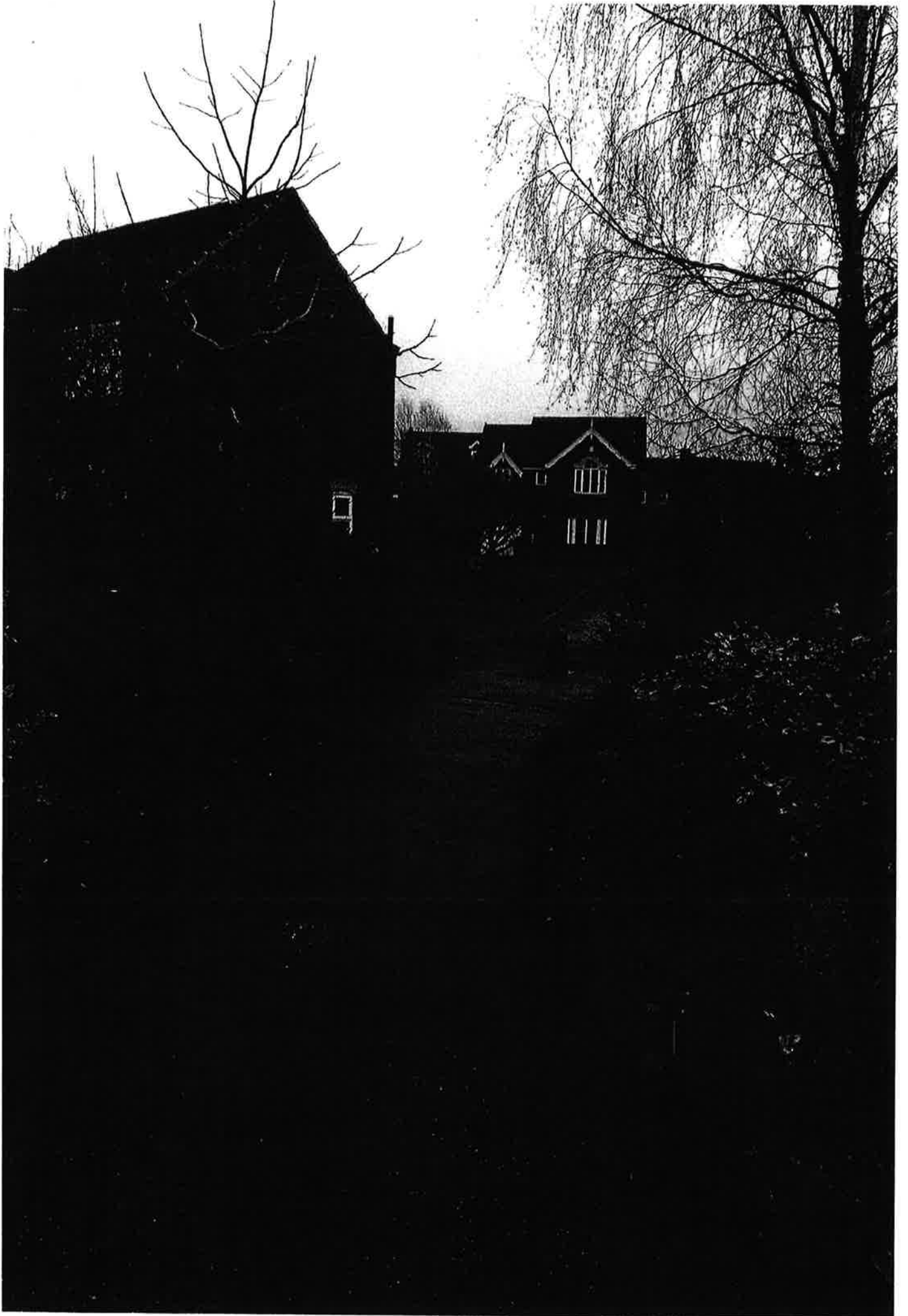
this notice on the evening 4th March - four full working days before the objection period closes.

We wish to **object** to the granting of the above licencing application.

This not a "showfield". The use of this term implies that there is an established use for regular events. It is an agricultural field which has a public footpath running through it, and is used primarily for grazing of livestock, other than on bonfire night and the summer fayre weekend. The field does not have direct vehicular access and requires use of another field adjacent Eastfield Lane to provide parking.

The proposed licence for various events will result in unacceptable levels of noise, traffic, light pollution, disruption to use of footpath (or will deter people from using it), and mud on roads, all of which will have a detrimental impact on the quality of life of a large number of local residents. Furthermore, it is totally unnecessary.

The field is in close proximity to a very large number of residential properties, all of whom already suffer significant disturbance from noise from the existing two annual events (bonfire night and summer fayre). Noise from amplified music, increased use of public footpath which runs past a significant number of houses (by people who are noisy - particularly late at night when they leave an event en-masse) are already an issue.

Furthermore – previous events have taken up a lot of resources of the City Council's Rights of Way team due to vehicles driving down the footpath to deliver equipment etc. Not only is this an issue in terms of noise disturbance, but is also a safety issue as a large number of residents use the footpath – including many elderly and young children. I presume the Rights of Way team have been consulted on this application.

Another cause for disturbance is the siting of floodlights and noise from associated generators along the footpath – with flood lighting glaring directly into people's bedrooms.

Continued...

Because the field does not have direct access to a highway, any equipment will have to be brought in along either the public footpath or across another field. Parking also needs to be provided in another field – which is accessed along a residential road which leads to a single track lane. This will lead to significant disturbance to residential properties adjacent the temporary car park and will also lead to significant amounts of mud on the roads, causing highway safety issues.

The two existing events – bonfire night and the summer fayre already cause a significant amount of nuisance to local residents, however, it is accepted that there is a benefit to local community for both of these events (albeit the amplified music at both events causes significant issues of noise late into the evening). However, any additional events are completely unnecessary and would cause unacceptable levels of disturbance to a great number of local residents.

Consequently, this licensing application should be refused.

Given the close proximity of my property to the proposed site I am rejecting for the following reasons:

- This will be a direct nuisance to my family, including my young children, given the likely noise from such events up to the proposed 11pm end time. Also, although the events are proposed to finish at 11pm the time taken for people to disperse for the event means there will be continued disruption later into the evening as is already the case when the venue has been used for events to date (annual fair and fireworks).
- The area proposed is greenbelt land and therefore any temporary buildings, stage, seating etc will need to be removed after each event causing further disruption outside of the proposed times referred to in the license application.
- Depending on the nature of the events this could attract large groups which could lead to increased crime and disorder before, during and after the events.
- Access to the site is via a narrow lane and some previous events have also used pathways which is dangerous to pedestrians and can create substantial mess and damage to verges etc.

Dear Sir/ Madam ,

I wish to raise an objection to the Licence Application as requested in the above reference number dated letter regarding the 'Showfield' on Eastfield Lane Dunnington.

This site is a series of grass fields kept for grazing livestock, which for the vast majority of this year and previous years have been grazed there. Also over the previous 4 to 5 years we have started to experience events being held twice a year, which encompass a Summer Fate, for two days, and Bonfire night in November. We, that is my family including children, have put up with the noise and disturbance for the these occasions cheerfully, but reluctantly, as we are all working, including weekends, and the noise obviously prevents relaxation and more to the point sleep to which we are entitled. (Right to a Private Life etc. under the Human Rights Act etc.). More specifically the erection of lighting for both access and generally at the event in November lights up the whole of our property but especially one of my daughters bedrooms, like a Disco, when she should be able to sleep peacefully. Please don't tell me I have to move my family around in the house or go away to a hotel at my expense, just to facilitate ' Dunnington events.' We also, due to the nature of the single track access have found ourselves not able to get in and out of our premises freely on these occasions. Despite bunting tape being put along the verge to stop parking in this area, the free flow of traffic attending and pedestrians being forced to walk amongst the moving traffic has caused me further problems and concern for those involved., These events up to now have only been occasional.

My understanding of the latest application is that this land will effectively, if the licence is granted, be available to hold events, not yet specified, over any one or all of the weekends of over the year.

In short, once the licence is granted the frequency of traffic, public and lack of peace will increase.

Location,

The site is at the eastern side of the village off a single track road, which Eastfield Lane is at this point. A bottom access has been used on at least one occasion which is also a single track road, that being Intake Lane. There is a 'middle' access from Petercroft Lane which again has been used for vehicles. The problem with this is I actually own part of that access over its full width. I have, and I do allow the landowner, access over that lane within the terms of the access, which are for AGRICULTURAL PURPOSES, not for parking cars or access for event staff and vendors at a none agricultural event. After all; the events held, are for some profit to be made generally. I would also point out that this access is a public foot path which is for a large proportion of its length not hard surface so vehicles will slide about, as they have done tearing up the surface, when times are wet reducing control in the close proximity of foot passengers many of which are children attending the events. To this end I would invite you to look at the submitted plans very carefully, they are inaccurate!. The main access is over the aforementioned 'agricultural land access'. There are also other inaccuracies over emergency exits and widths which are unfortunately straight onto Eastfield Lane, which will be heavily congested if previous events are anything to go by.

I have already alluded to the congestion and I am aware that the landowner has similar fields which are at this time used for livestock adjacent to his own premises. Indeed when an event is to be held he seems to have no problem emptying the fields adjacent to me, on Eastfield Lane, of the livestock, taking them to the fields near his premises. I cannot understand why, given that the access to the land adjacent to his premises is accessed (from a main; single carriageway two lane highway of approximately 7.5metres wide and only 0.6 of a mile from a main trunk road (namely the A1079)) why this land would not be more suitable. It is better for traffic flow and pedestrians, as there are footpaths on at least one side of the road at that location. The A1079 is also less than ¼ of a mile from the A64 dual carriageway at Grimston bar, for those who wish to attend these publicised events from out of the village. I assume by the list of activities being applied for that the events are only going to increase in size and frequency. I also understand that whilst there are always medical staff on site at such an event, any real emergency would require the attendance of a land ambulance or possibly fire brigade, in which case the land adjacent to the Landowners own property has far superior and efficient emergency access. There are also mains utilities at that location. I am also aware that when a bonfire night was held a few years ago, the same landowner found it quite easy to hold it in his own land adjacent to the A1079 which had even better access.

Finally if the event was held on land at the western side of the village of Dunnington, adjacent to the landowners own property, it would prevent excess traffic travelling through the village, and housing estates or along the edge of a housing estate on a road which is only 5metres wide before it becomes single track. Many attendees also clutter up the housing estate to the west of me, 'Holly Trees' to park vehicles once they find out the 'Showfield' is either full or more to the point boggy as happened at a November bonfire night. They will abandon cars all over the place. Surely the land adjacent to the Landowner or even the A1079 would be a fairer option for all those villagers who may be otherwise affected, who do not wish to participate on the events. It is definitely better for health and safety reasons, perhaps the most important of which, is emergency access to the land and from there to a Hospital. Finally I do not see why myself or my family should continue to suffer

noise and physical disturbance at, what is after all, OUR HOME, especially with the potential that once the licence is granted its frequency will only increase.

In respect of Eastfield Showfield on Eastfield Lane in Dunnington

Along with my neighbours in this area, I received a hand-posted copy of two sheets of paper late yesterday evening. The first carried the City of York logo in its heading and referred to the Licensing Act 2003, followed by 'Notice of Application for the Grant of a Premises Licence'. The second sheet was a copy of application CYC 060438.

Before I get to the substance of this letter, which is the reasons why I am raising an objection, I would like to point out a couple of things.

I read, on the City of York Council website, both the terms of the Licensing Act 2003 and the application itself.

Firstly, the site concerned is a 'field' that isn't accessible to passers-by and if the required display of a notice of the application (if one was actually displayed) would not be seen by most of the households affected, unless they were dog-walkers.

Secondly, the intention of such rules are to give recipients a fair chance of responding, the stated period being 28 days. I would suggest that, receiving a copy of an application that was dated 9th February 2018, late on 4th March 2018, with only 4 effective days left to register an objection, can hardly be construed as 'fair'.

Additionally, the footnote to the application states that due to the fact that the 'premises' is a field, that will have ad hoc events, there can be no opening or closing times. How can an application exist for which there is no control of timescales?

I was, some time ago, honorary auditor of the Village Fayre Accounts, which I did as a favour for Jenny Lewis, a member of the organising committee who prepared the accounts. In recent years the annual fayre and the fireworks display (both under the umbrella of Village Fayre) used fields owned by Gary Kay and they paid him for the hire. Wanting to check whether this licence application might be related to that situation I contacted both the Parish Council Clerk and the contact name given for

the Village Fayre. I was advised by the Parish Clerk that I could make representations to you through the Council website, but on reading the details realised that I would have to post a signed copy to you as well in order for it to be considered (hence this note). Many people have apparently already contacted her on this matter. The contact for the Village Fayre (as given in the village magazine) has now changed, but he did tell me that 'Dunnington Community Events' was not, as he understood it, the same as the Village Fayre and suggested that I speak to Jenny Lewis to get a clear picture of what was happening. Jenny is on holiday this week.

With this lack of clarity I must object to the licence application, principally on the grounds of noise and general nuisance to those of us who live in this vicinity. The Village Fayre and the Fireworks Event are recognised as one-off events and held within defined timescales. The evening events can be heard, but one makes allowances for these isolated occurrences. The traffic is a problem as access to parking is from the narrow country lane extension of Eastfield Lane, but it may well be adequately controlled or policed for these annual events – I wouldn't wish to comment on that as I don't know. The owner of the field is, I am told, still Gary Kay. What is implied by the name of the applicant 'Dunnington Community Events' (whose address is that same field) is that more events are being planned, otherwise why not leave things under the known activities of the Village Fayre? The wording of the application is not restricted in any way and looks as though the applicant wants a licence to hold as many events as 'they' wish, for as long as they wish, and including noisy activities. This is clearly unacceptable near family housing. No one should profit from something that is a detriment to the general community.

Please register my objection to this application.

Although these events have been held in an area very close to a large number of houses and although they are both very noisy, at least the fact that there are only two days involved makes them acceptable.

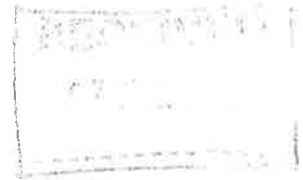

I am writing in connection with the above application, by the organisation known as Dunnington Community Events, for a Premises Licence covering a field on the eastern edge of Dunnington, named as "**Eastfield Showfield**", for the following activities:

- Plays
- Films
- Boxing or Wrestling matches
- Live Music
- Recorded Music
- Performances of Dance

As a resident of Dunnington I wish to **OBJECT** to the application on the following grounds:

- a. Access to this field is either across an open field from a small and badly maintained country road called Intake Lane, that terminates shortly after the entrance gate, or from Eastfield Lane which is, presumably, intended as the main vehicular access. The occasional event that has previously taken place in this location has resulted in both access lanes being left in a mess with badly scarred grass verges.
- b. There are already other suitable venues in Dunnington, where the proposed activities could be staged, that have the facilities necessary to service public events which the proposed location does not.
- c. Access for the Emergency Services, in the event that they are required, could be dangerously restricted.
- d. The road traffic generated by many of the proposed activities will cause disruption and possibly serious obstruction to the wider community who live in Dunnington.
- e. There is no running water supply, no sanitation and no electric power available at the location.

- f. Children live in relatively close proximity and could be adversely affected by some of the proposed activities.
- g. Certain of the proposed activities have the potential to cause a material degree of noise pollution to the residents of Dunnington.

Staging activities of this nature in an open area with minimal facilities involves a wide variety of Health & Safety implications so may I assume that York City Council has a Safety Advisory Group and that the members of this Group will be consulted before a decision on the granting of a Premises Licence is made?

May I also assume that the Highways Authority, the Fire Brigade and the Police will be invited to review the application and make comments before any decision is made?

The provision of a qualified Health & Safety Manager and an appropriate number of trained stewards qualified under the provisions of the Security Industry Act, together with adequate medical facilities (including a First Aid team, a 4X4 Ambulance and a Doctor) are essential to the staging of activities of this nature, especially in an open environment. A comprehensive Risk Register, an appropriate Event Management Plan and a Major Incident Plan would be essential for each event.

As I have indicated above, I suggest that this application should be declined but, if the decision of the Licensing Services department of the City of York is to grant a Premises Licence, may I respectfully request a response to this letter explaining and/or justifying the reasoning behind the decision, please?

Dunnington Community Events – Eastfield Showfield License Application

Dear Sirs, I am writing to **object** to the notice of an application for the grant of a premises License by Dunnington Community Events Eastfield Showfield, Eastfield Lane, Dunnington. I am objecting to this proposal based on the following criteria:-

- 1) That the noise levels from existing events (Bonfire Night / Summer Fayre) and all possible future events especially:- (Live music/recorded music/Performance of Dance/Films) are excessive and already impact greatly upon the abilities of young families trying to put children at a reasonable hour. Proposing live events on a more frequent basis and an uncontrolled number of events will impact hugely from increased and excessive noise levels less than a field away from Kerver Lane making it impossible for young children / families to get to sleep before a proposed 23.00 finish and especially in summer when our bedroom windows have to be open for coolness during the summer. Not only will it impact on young children / families but also shift workers who have to rely on sleeping during the day and at weekends, the noise carries too easily from these events into the surrounding areas/streets/gardens. The noise levels from existing events is too great already and has a huge disruptive impact on the streets nearby especially residents on Kerver Lane, Eastfield Lane, Intake Lane, Horsefield Way, Holly Tree Lane.
- 2) Having uncontrolled number of events all weekends (fri thru to Sunday), thru the day and night and not restricted on timings, with potentially major noise disruption will impact hugely on the lives of families enjoying their gardens at weekends, it is not acceptable to have noise pollution when we are trying to enjoy the weekends.
- 3) I have to object also on the grounds of road & pedestrian safety as the access to the existing event site is via Eastfield Lane for public and Intake Lane for show wagons/ vehicles. Neither of these lanes are suitable for large vehicles and already have a restriction of 7 tonnes on Eastfield Lane. These lanes can only take singular width vehicles and are only the width of a car, they are not suitable for lorries and larger vehicles as there neither footpaths or passing places to ensure safety for pedestrians, cyclists and dog walkers who use these lanes. The increased and excessive use is already eroding the current tarmac and width of these lanes which is creating large pot holes and ruts which are dangerous to the public, adding more show vehicle and car access will only worsen the current lane conditions.
- 4) Damage to Eastfield Lane and Intake Lane already occurs from the existing two events (Bonfire night and Summer Fayre) and the mud from these sites / events creates an already dangerous road surface safety issue to pedestrians and vehicles for months after the events and will only worsen if more events are allowed to be held.
- 5) I also object on safety grounds and lane unsuitability based on the existing width of these two narrow lanes and lack of footpaths and passing places for cars/ show vehicles to pass pedestrians/cyclists safely.

- 6) I am also concerned about the increased number of events will have on the loss of a green field site and wildlife habitat in particular the effect on the existing and rare animals that use this and the surrounding fields. Increases in both noise levels and light levels during the evening will have a dramatic effect on driving rare species away from these adjoining fields and our gardens plus Hagg Wood. The proposed site and surrounding fields / gardens are frequented and host a varied list of rare species which live and hunt across these fields / gardens :- Great Crested Newts, Buzzards, Barn Owls, Sparrow Hawks, Kestrels, Bats (even a rare Russia Pine Bunting visited this site only last year witnessed by hundreds of bird watchers far and wide). Proposed usage and timings from 9.00 to 23.00 hrs is unacceptable as it will have a huge impact on the existing wild and rare species using these fields.
- 7) Public parking is another issue as over flow cars currently park on Kerevr Lane, Holly tree lane, Eastfield lane, Horsefield way especially when the designated fields are unsuitable for muddy and wet conditlons the local residents have major issues with people parking off their streets/drives now..
- 8) I also object on the grounds of road safety access as the turning off the Stamfordbridge Road onto Eastfield Lane (opposite / adjoining Parman Lane) also presents another danger with public trying to access this narrow and restricted 7ton lane, causing a backup on the main road and blind spot where the big Oak tree currently stands. This spot is already hazzerdous and represents a terrible blind spot prone to accidents it won't be helped with cars / vehicles travelling at 60 mph potentially hitting queuing traffic to the site.

Based on our concerns, we need to object the application. Please register our objection to the application.

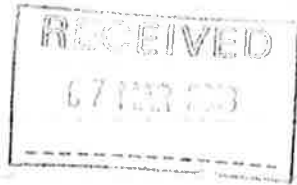

We understand that an application for a premises licence has been lodged & that you are inviting representations on the proposal. We have the following observations.

The field in question forms a valuable part of Dunnington's rural setting & contributes to the environmentally important Green Belt.

The field is described in the application as "Eastfield Sheffield" but has no formal designation as such within the planning system.

Bi-annual events are currently organised at this location. Car parking is an issue. Car parking arrangements are made using a nearby field, however, these are weather dependent & there has been substantial visitor parking in adjoining residential streets & on verges, causing damage.

There is a bespoke & well supported Sports & Social Centre in the village enjoying good access & all the necessary facilities on site. Events are organised here which have the support of the local residents.

It seems that few residents are aware of this application & therefore, its implications. In fact, there has been no attempt to garner support using the village newsletter, notice boards or by means of the applicant's website, for the sort of events being proposed. Events at this location already impact on residents through the noise generated.

The sort of events proposed will attract a car-borne audience from well beyond the Village. To grant a licence for an "open-ended" arrangement to organise events at any time of year, for unspecified lengths of time, is bound to have an impact on the amenity of nearby households.

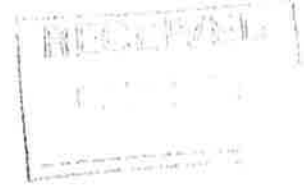

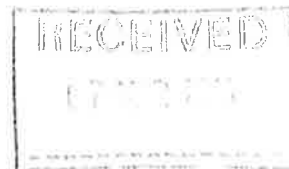

We write to you to strongly object to the application made by 'Dunnington Community Events' for a Premises Licence for the above address. We, like many residents in the area were only aware of this application when it was picked up via social media a day ago, so clearly given the number of people who have only just learnt of this application, indicates that methods to communicate the application were not effective. Given that this is under the title 'Dunnington Community Events' no residents were consulted on this prior to or during the application process. Our key concerns and reasons to object to this application are;

NOISE

Originally a Village Show and a Fireworks Display were held on the Sports & Social Field in the centre of the village before moving to this agricultural field off Eastfield Lane. We are situated on a road that backs onto a field prior to this land and as such have experienced high noise levels from PA Systems, recorded & live music plus the generators (providing power for the lights as well as associated equipment). The noise level increases during the day, into the evening and goes beyond the advertised finish times. We have a community of elderly and young residents who are impacted negatively by the current events and further events would not be acceptable on this basis.

DISRUPTION

The same area is also used as a carpark for these events however many visitors from outside of the village leave their vehicles on surrounding streets leading to blocked driveways, increased hazards for pedestrian's (including children) and attempts to reduce this by the organisers using a limited number of traffic cones does not work, simply forcing drivers who do not want to pay for parking to leave their cars within residential streets. Clearly increasing the number of events and the number of visitors will exacerbate this situation.

CRIME

With the range of events the organisers are planning we are concerned with a potential for an increase in crime within our community. One of the categories highlighted on the proposed application is for 'boxing or wrestling' which I fail to understand how an alleged community group would put on for the families of this community? We know of one resident who had an attempted break in during the Fair weekend last year of which the police were made to be aware. We see no Police presence at the current event and future high capacity events would result in a need for a Police presence of considerable size for this proposal.

In addition to this we have a number of questions and points to raise;

- 'Dunnington Community Events' is an unelected group of volunteers who we believe do not have the interests of the wider Dunnington community at heart. They have never sought information for the community regarding this or any future events. The current Fair and Fireworks night are advertised outside of the village and as a consequence we have a large number of visitors from outside which is at odds with the word 'community' in their title. This feels more like a commercial venture which is looking to expand further.
- Our understanding is they plan to run 6 events however no reference is given to this in the application and as such they would have the ability to run events every weekend from 9am - 11pm for 52 weeks of the year which is unacceptable.
- Who is going to police and monitor these events?
- For outdoor events why would they want to apply for indoor activities leading to potentially semi-permeant buildings?
- Why is the term 'Showfield' used to describe the location when our understanding is that it is owned by a local farmer and used as grazing land for sheep when events are not on?

Please can you confirm receipt of this letter and look forward to your response on the issues we have raised

Further to the recent notification of the above licensing act application by Dunnington Community Events to grant a premise license for events up to 23.00hrs Friday to Sunday for plays, films, boxing or wrestling, live music, recorded music, performances of dance on the Eastfield Showfield, Eastfield Lane, Dunnington.

This is could as be classified as a change of use:

- a. The field until recently was used solely as a farmer's field. This has never previously been used as a show field and has only been designated by Dunnington Community events as such. The grazing of sheep / cattle being its primary and intended function.
- b. The farmers field has not got the necessary services / Infrastructure to support such an application:

I write in objection classified as considered by the Council to the above application for the following reasons:

1. Public safety

a. Roads

i. Increased traffic on roads that are unsuitable for this:

1. Junction of York Street, Common Lane, Church Street and Petercroft Lane - difficult junction to cross where there are normal volumes of traffic, with increased traffic volumes at this junction the danger increases considerably;
2. Junction of Church Balk, Church Lane, Church Street and Eastfield Lane – a partially blind / obscured junction which used for the majority of signed traffic for event parking, results in turning made in contravention of the highway code, ie over the white lines;
3. Eastfield lane is a narrow road – with barely enough room for two cars to pass each other, this means that larger vehicles not only cause issues for those using Eastfield Lane, but also erode the fabric of the verges on the Lane
4. Eastfield Lane narrows to a single carriageway with passing places – this is the prime access to the field which is currently used as a car park for the bonfire event
5. No parking along the preferred traffic route, means that those living in the area are unable to park outside their own property – any 'events' that they may also choose to hold which mean additional

cars visiting their property cannot be accommodated as a result
Impacting on their own arrangements

b. Public Footpath

- i. This is a majorly a green lane path – the structure of which is being eroded by increased use by non-farm traffic;
- ii. The narrow footpath is not designed to take increased volumes of farm vehicles or 4 wheel drive vehicles which are accessing the field;
- iii. The footpath enters / exists onto Petercroft Lane at a very difficult junction – partially blind and across a perpendicular footpath;
- iv. Access by vehicles increases danger to those on foot / bikes, who may be using the public footpath and those dog walkers and with small children who may not be aware of the increased danger;
- v. Increased use of the public footpath by 4 wheeled vehicles / farm vehicles to access the field, endangering the lives of those using the public footpath for its primary purpose.

c. Event capacity

- i. Number of people licenced to attend the event is proposed to be up to 4999 at each event. Given the size of the village (The population of the civil parish was 3,230 at the 2011 Census) this exceeds the current number of village populous by 1,769, - almost 50% more than the figure at 2011.
- ii. Access to a major incident on the field could be limited and potentially impact on the ability of any incident to be managed safely to the detriment of those individuals involved.

2. Crime and disorder

- a. Increased visitors into the village – may attract those seeking to benefit from unknown faces and commit crimes;
- b. Increased events providing bar facilities, encourages individuals to drink excessively in an unsuitable environment where travelling to the event by car is the norm;
- c. Lack of facilities elsewhere in the village for those attending events results in public urination along the footpath / In fields adjacent to the farmers field;
- d. Increased number of 'strangers' in the village increases the likelihood of children being approached for subvertive activities. This has previously occurred in Dunnington;
- e. Increased likelihood of underage drinking and potential to increase the use of drugs within the village under the cover of the event(s).

3. Public nuisance

a. Sewage

- i. This is transported away from the field using portaloos;
- ii. Often by tractor, this means that raw sewage is spilled onto the public footpath / public footpath as the road surface is uneven;
- iii. Lack of facilities elsewhere in the village for those attending events results in public urination along the footpath / in fields adjacent to the farmers field;
- iv. Reduction in the use of the outside facilities (garden) to own property whilst events are held.

b. Electricity

- i. Generators are used to support electric requirements for the existing events. These are used for lights in the nearby fields for parking and foot traffic – as this area is not lit;
 - ii. The last event meant that directly behind my property the generator was running for in excess of 6 hours, with the lights shining in my property at the same time;
 - iii. Distress was caused to the human and animal residents of the property as a result.
 - c. Noise
 - i. Noise from the events travels across the fields to the nearby residential area – the noise can be easily heard from inside properties with windows and doors closed;
 - ii. Increased traffic along the public footpath causes traffic noise – not intended for the properties alongside the pathway;
 - iii. Increased foot traffic and the accompanying noise – some of which with abusive and foul language – from the footpath impacts on the properties alongside the pathway – this pathway is usually used by dog walkers or those walking the footpaths of the village;
 - iv. Constant noise from the generators means that we are unable to use our own garden for any activity, nor can certain rooms within the property as the constant “droning” of the generators cannot be cancelled out;
 - v. Reduction in the use of the outside facilities (garden) to own property whilst events are held.
 - d. Frequency
 - i. Approval should be for a limited number of nights per year only – the Dunnington Community Events representation have advised villagers that this is only for 3 events per year, not as applied for;
 - ii. This is a village with insufficient infrastructure to support events held weekly over three nights of the weekend as currently applied for.
 - e. Duration of events
 - i. Current events do not run to time. Over the past 3 years events for Dunnington Live have overrun considerably their stated time – impacting on those in the surrounding area.
 - ii. Licencing to 11pm Friday, Saturday and Sunday would impact those who live in the surrounding properties and alongside the pathway – noise, lighting etc would inhibit sleep and affect pets. Those with small children would be severely impacted due to noise.
 - iii. Length of proposed licencing to commence at 9am and go through to 11pm – if taken up would result in impacts from the event for at least 14 hours – those leaving the event will leave after the finish time meaning that this could be up to midnight on each occasion.
- 4. Protection of children
 - a. Lack of facilities elsewhere in the village for those attending events results in public urination along the footpath / in fields adjacent to the farmers field;
 - b. Increased number of ‘strangers’ in the village increases the likelihood of children being approached for subvertive activities. This has previously occurred in Dunnington;

- c. Increased likelihood of underage drinking and potential to increase the use of drugs within the village under the cover of the event(s);
- d. Increased pollution through traffic and noise.

Application for Grant of Premises Licence – Ref: CYC 060438 – Dunnington Community Events (DCE)

We would like to make the following representations regarding the above application:

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

- All previous DCE events at this location have been very widely publicised throughout York and surrounding area and via social media. Hitherto, events have tended to be 'family-oriented'. Increasing the range, scope and attendance dynamic – especially where alcohol is on sale for a prolonged period – risks moving city-centre type disorder issues to a village environment, where they would not be so readily handled. Particular points include:
 - Widespread publicity to maximise attendance encourages large-scale, mass arrival and departure at concentrated times, thus clogging residential roads.
 - The licence application gives events times as 09.00 to 23.00; potentially 14 hours of on-site alcohol sales.
 - Based on similar issues evidenced in York, alcohol-related disorder issues (especially at turn-out times) potentially include:
 - Noisy processions through the village to bus stops or the village pub for further drinking;
 - trespass into local gardens, particularly if on-site toilet facilities are not adequate;
 - a temptation for drink-driving (especially given out-of-town location);
 - large bus queues where the bus may not have sufficient seats for all those waiting;
 - People on-street awaiting late-night availability of cabs;
 - Massing and possible disputes, especially in the village centre.
 - Would DCE provide adequate professional security, both inside and outside the venue and include CCTV, lighting, etc? Presumably local police resources are already at full stretch and could not police events.

Public Safety

- Eastfield Lane and Intake Lane, the main access roads, are both narrow single track roads with limited pavement.
- Previous DCE events have offered car parking in an adjacent field. However:
 - Under normal circumstances this involves increased traffic through residential streets to access parking, both pre and post-event. This increases the risk of accidents – young children and the elderly being especially vulnerable.
 - When wet/muddy, many prefer to park on-street in a concentrated residential area in order to access the site via a pedestrian lane. In the past this has restricted access for local delivery vehicles and made crossing roads more difficult, especially for children and the elderly. Also, residents have had difficulty in getting in and out of their properties due to the sheer volume of on-street parking.

- Emergency vehicles may have difficulty in accessing the site because of overspill parking; Kerver Lane, Horsfield Way, Holly Tree Lane and Petercroft Lane having been seriously affected for vehicular access at previous events.
- Vehicles emerging as late as 23.00 increases risk, especially alongside possible alcohol-related issues or adverse weather. There is currently no permanent lighting on site or immediate access roads, and only limited lighting in the local area.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

- Music at previous DCE events could be heard throughout the village, and presumably very loudly in proximity of the field. Whilst one night a year, ending at a reasonable hour, might be thought acceptable, an open-ended "ad hoc" remit with no limit on events per year and no time constraints does not make for a controlled environment.
- The noise created by a wider list of activities, ie music, cheering, films, recorded music etc., would be particularly invasive for local residents, especially those with young children.

Protection of Children from Harm

- Earlier comments relating to increased traffic, parking, noise and alcohol-related issues refer.
- Not only children are at risk from the above, but also the elderly population and the vulnerable.

Few details are given relating to any provisions or safeguards that DCE would make in relation to these proposed events, most of which – to our knowledge – have never been held at this site.

The list of proposed events and the 'open remit' scope being sought by DCE seem to suggest that a field currently being used for sheep grazing and twice-a-year family events is now being proposed as a semi-permanent venue for mass – chiefly adult-focused – entertainment, with the attendant risks listed above. We believe this potential scenario should also be taken into consideration by the planning authorities when considering this application.

I am writing with my concerns about the open-ended application to hold events, including wrestling, boxing, etc in the so-called Eastfield Lane Showfield, Dunnington.

While the sheep field has been used for events for several years, the track record is not great. There are issues of public safety and nuisance caused by the amount of litter left in the access routes after each event, as well as damage to the access routes caused by machinery using routes which were not designed for such use. The organisers make a good effort to clear litter from the field itself but neglect the access routes. In terms of damage, prior to the last event, large vehicles used the footpath access from Horsfield Way and have damaged the lawned area and verges, despite there being several other access routes available onto this land. No attempt has been made to rectify this damage. This surely amounts to public nuisance.

In respect of the current application, if there is only the intention to hold a limited number of events, why is the application for a wide range of events at any time? Given that the fields are close to residential areas - Kerver Lane and Hollytree Croft - it is surely unreasonable to expect families to tolerate late night music and "revelling" on more than an isolated occasion? This would amount to public nuisance, as would the volume of traffic and parking generated by such activity.

My concerns are therefore on the grounds of public nuisance in terms of littering, noise, damage to access routes and a challenge to individual's rights to peaceful enjoyment of their homes and gardens. Public safety is also threatened through loss of sleep, risks from discarded litter and damaged access routes.

I would be prepared to tolerate the number of events so far held, two per year, provided a requirement is included to clear all litter from the fields used and all access routes and to make good any damage caused.

What provisions have been put in place to park all these people that would be visiting the event, in the past I have known them to park in the courtyard where I live, which is a private parking area for residents only!

Each year Dunnington enters the Village in Bloom and each year we win either silver or gold, how do they plan to keep the litter at bay around the village so this won't be affected. Winning the village in bloom has had an effect on the house prices rising as it makes it more appealing to home buyers.

If passed, a full blown music event (with booze) could be held every Friday, Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9am until 11pm. This does not benefit the village whatsoever, it won't bring much revenue to the villagers themselves, possibly only to the event holders and the one small supermarket that we have in the village.

Therefore bearing all the above in mind I would like to oppose the application for full premises license

Dunnington Parish Council objects to the granting of this licence. The applicants have not consulted the Parish Council on this application.

- 1) We object strongly to the open-ended nature of this application. In the past we have not objected to a small number of one off events at this site but do not support a blanket licence which allows for all day events (through to 23:00) on every Friday to Sunday throughout the year.

- 2) The showfield is at the edge of the built up area of the village and has no on site facilities. This field is within the green belt. The Parish Council supports the extent of the greenbelt within the published local plan. All utilities, structures, staging, lighting etc will have to be brought to the site each time it is used. There is no hard standing on site. Temporary structures could easily become permanent if the showfield is used regularly in accordance with this licence.

- 3) We are concerned at the large volume of traffic which could be generated every time an event is staged in accordance with this application. Public transport to the village is very limited especially in the evening. Access to the site is by narrow residential roads and single track lanes which are not suitable for event traffic. Damage could be caused to the grass verges on the single track access from Eastfield Lane.

- 4) There is no hard standing for parking and on wet days the field they have designated for parking may be unusable. This has in the past resulted in significant on street parking problems within the village and more especially on Eastfield Lane. Access could be seriously restricted for emergency vehicles both to the event site and also for residents.

- 5) The inevitable noise from such events which is difficult to contain given the location of the field will reduce the amenity of the nearby residents on that side of the village. Particularly late at night there is a significant risk of disturbance due to the playing of music, loud talking as people leave the field and walk down residential streets and of car doors slamming as they get back to their cars.

- 6) If these events are not adequately policed there is a risk to public order given the number of people who may attend (especially if alcohol is available). The events in the past have been attended by a large number of children.

To whom it may concern.

I am writing to oppose the above application for a premises license.

The application proposes evening events on Friday to Sunday with no limit on the number of events per year. This will potentially allow the organisers to run 150 events per calendar year. The application is open ended.

My concern is that this application will lead to a detrimental impact on the local area and community. The access to the event field is along a narrow single track lane, the environmental damage to the grass verges and plants will be substantial. Traffic congestion will increase in the village as attendees will park throughout the village to avoid travelling along such a small road. In the past police have been required after attendees blocked driveways. The risk to children will be increased due to the extra traffic. The alternative access will increase the number of people using a poorly lit pathway (between Kerver Lane and Petercroft Lane). Every year after the bonfire this public tarmac path is left in an appalling condition with mud and damage to grass verge lasting 6 months and well into spring.

The poor access to the location will render the emergency access of vehicles very difficult which will pose a risk to public safety.

The field is very close to a large number of residential properties, many with children and young adolescents. The impact from noise until 11pm will lead to children and vulnerable adults having difficulty sleeping (with all the associated psychological impacts of this) many who will be school age with exams etc. Unfortunately it is not just on the night of the event that this will occur. From previous experience the days around the event are also very noisy until the early hours of the morning, the noise is similar to a construction site with heavy machinery moving and the sound of generators.

Less than twelve months ago a very rare bird (the pine bunting) resided in the adjacent field for many weeks. It was so unusual that ornithologists from all around the country came to Dunnington to witness this. To whom it may concern.

I am writing to oppose the above application for a premises license.

The application proposes evening events on Friday to Sunday with no limit on the number of events per year. This will potentially allow the organisers to run 150 events per calendar year. The application is open ended.

My concern is that this application will lead to a detrimental impact on the local area and community. The access to the event field is along a narrow single track lane, the environmental damage to the grass verges and plants will be substantial. Traffic congestion will increase in the village as attendees will park throughout the village to avoid travelling along such a small road. In the past police have been required after attendees blocked driveways. The risk to children will be increased due to the extra traffic. The alternative access will increase the number of people using a poorly lit pathway (between Kerver Lane and Petercroft Lane). Every year after the bonfire this public tarmac path is left in an appalling condition with mud and damage to grass verge lasting 6 months and well into spring.

The poor access to the location will render the emergency access of vehicles very difficult which will pose a risk to public safety.

The field is very close to a large number of residential properties, many with children and young adolescents. The impact from noise until 11pm will lead to children and vulnerable adults having difficulty sleeping (with all the associated psychological impacts of this) many who will be school age with exams etc. Unfortunately it is not just on the night of the event that this will occur. From previous experience the days around the event are also very noisy until the early hours of the morning, the noise is similar to a construction site with heavy machinery moving and the sound of generators.

Less than twelve months ago a very rare bird (the pine bunting) resided in the adjacent field for many weeks. It was so unusual that ornithologists from all around the country came to Dunnington to witness this. This is a further example of how environmentally sensitive this area is, particularly with the peaceful wildlife haven of Hagg wood close to the proposed site.

In summary an open ended application to host events on potentially a huge number of nights per year is clearly inappropriate with the environmental impact and the adverse effects this will have on children and vulnerable adults. I strongly oppose this application.

We wish to **object** to the granting of the above licensing application.

The proposed licence for various additional events will undoubtedly result in unacceptable levels of noise, traffic, and disruption to the local community and local residents in Dunnington.

Put simply this is an agricultural field which has a public footpath running through it, and is used for this purpose aside from bonfire night and the Dunnington Fayre weekend. For both of these events we have to put up with late night noise, music and floodlighting all of which are disruptive to a great number of local residents.

There is also no direct car access or adequate parking adjacent to this field, which means that for any given event there are way too many cars parked in other fields or local side roads such as Kerver Lane, sometimes causing difficult access to our property.

Several vans and lorries can also be seen using the public right of way at the rear of our house transporting goods to & from the events – this is a real safety concern for residents & children using the pathway.

Once the events have finished there is always excess mud on the roads adjacent to the field, and there are safety concerns for local residents with all of the traffic associated with such events.

We wish to **object** to the granting of the above licencing application.

This not a "showfield". The use of this term implies that there is an established use for regular events. It is an agricultural field which has a public footpath running through it, and is used primarily for grazing of livestock, other than on bonfire night and the summer fayre weekend. The field does not have direct vehicular access and requires use of another field adjacent Eastfield Lane to provide parking.

The proposed licence for various events will result in unacceptable levels of noise, traffic, light pollution, disruption to use of footpath (or will deter people from using it), and mud on roads, all of which will have a detrimental impact on the quality of life of a large number of local residents. Furthermore, it is totally unnecessary.

The field is in close proximity to a very large number of residential properties, all of whom already suffer significant disturbance from noise from the existing two annual events (bonfire night and summer fayre). Noise from amplified music, increased use of public footpath which runs past a significant number of houses (by people who are noisy - particularly late at night when they leave an event en-masse) are already an issue.

Furthermore – previous events have taken up a lot of resources of the City Council's Rights of Way team due to vehicles driving down the footpath to deliver equipment etc. Not only is this an issue in terms of noise disturbance, but is also a safety issue as a large number of residents use the footpath – including many elderly and young children. I presume the Rights of Way team have been consulted on this application.

Another cause for disturbance is the siting of floodlights and noise from associated generators along the footpath – with flood lighting glaring directly into people's bedrooms.

Continued...

Because the field does not have direct access to a highway, any equipment will have to be brought in along either the public footpath or across another field. Parking also needs to be provided in another field – which is accessed along a residential road which leads to a single track lane. This will lead to significant disturbance to residential properties adjacent the temporary car park and will also lead to significant amounts of mud on the roads, causing highway safety issues.

The two existing events – bonfire night and the summer fayre already cause a significant amount of nuisance to local residents, however, it is accepted that there is a benefit to local community for both of these events (albeit the amplified music at both events causes significant issues of noise late into the evening). However, any additional events are completely unnecessary and would cause unacceptable levels of disturbance to a great number of local residents.

Consequently, this licensing application should be refused.

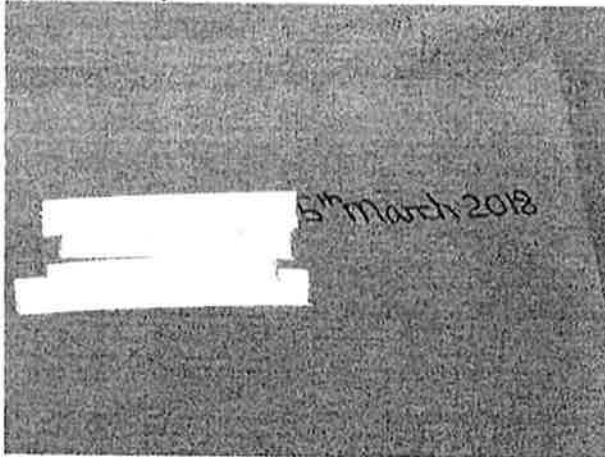

I write with an objection to the above application submitted to City of York Council Licensing Services for the below reasons

- 1) Public safety – This is clearly an issue with the current 2 events held by the said applicant of the Annual Bonfire and the Fayre so to add further events to the calendar would only increase this risk. On the days of the current events due to the lack of proper car parking people attending the events just literally dump their cars where they see fit. I.e. on grass verges which our local Dunnington in Bloom team keep immaculate only to be wrecked by the inconsiderate people attending these events, blocking of villagers drives so they are unable to get in and out of their drives. This has happened to us over the last couple of years and when on asking the public to move get bombarded with abuse even though on one occasion there was an actually family emergency.
- 2) When the public actually come and finally move their cars they think nothing of leaving their rubbish behind bottles, babies nappies etc. If I wanted to be a street cleaner I would apply for a job but how are we expected to leave these in the street with young children wandering about.
- 3) We as anyone else have the right to rest/quality time with our families this will not be the case if the above is granted. Disturbance to the degree we get at the other two events is not acceptable on every weekend and well against our Human Rights. The noise lighting and increased traffic is clearly a public nuisance.
- 4) At the current events there is limited mobile toilet facilities with the year before last only one portable toilet working for the whole event resulting in the public using peoples gardens/bushes/hedges to elevate themselves. This is clearly a health and safety issue and a danger to people's health.
- 5) The bringing in to the village of all these extra people and the majority consuming large volumes of alcohol will only increase the amount of crime and disorder the village has to tolerate and for someone who has been broken into is not something I would want to go through again.
- 6) The said applicants on their website clearly state they do things for the community /they are for the community this application is clearly not for Dunnington villages but for those further afield with the Dunnington villagers having to put up with all the public nuisance incurred. I work for a local Dunnington Cancer support group who in the past have always supported the Fayre and done a stall at the event. The event's organisers have come back this year and said we can have no more than 2 non-paying people manning the stall . We are a group of people whose age on average is 70+ who cannot man a stall with 2 people all day. Where is the local community spirit there?

I live on Eastfield Lane near the field which has been used for events for the past few years.

I object to the granting of a premise licence as it is **currently proposed**. There is no indication of the number of events to be held. In theory there could be an event lasting three days every week and I believe that if the number of events is not limited a public nuisance would be created.

The noise levels of the events currently held on the fields are high but tollerable as they only take place two or three days a year. More frequent events may not be as tollerable.

Even though the events are 'community events' this does not mean just the community of Dunnington. The events are very popular and are attended by many people from outside the village.

All the cars using the official car parks, which are adjacent to the event field, pass our house. This goes on for several hours as the cars arrive and then leave.

In wet weather, inspite of the best efforts of the organisers, the cars that park on the official car parks bring a lot of mud onto Eastfield Lane. Both these issues could be mitigated if the cars, as they leave, were directed on the single track road away from the residential area and towards the A166 preventing this nuisance. This would also reduce the noise for residents late at night as visitors leave.

Some visitors, rather than partking on the 'offical car parks', park on the streets throughout Dunnington. This creates a nuisance as some of the cars block access to the drives and garages of the residents.

I believe that the organisers of the previous events have tried hard to act on feedback from residents to improve the management of the events. In their currant form, ie Dunnington Fayre, Dunnington Live and Dunnigton Bonfire and Fireworks, the events are well organised and are held with as little disturbance and nuisance for residents as is possible for such events. I particularly support an organised bonfire to minimise accidents.

However if too many events are organised I believe much goodwill between the organisers and the residents will be lost.

EASTFIELD SHOWFIELD LICENCE APPLICATION – CYC 060438

I am writing to you to object to the granting of the above licence to Dunnington Community Events.

My reasons for objection are:

Public Nuisance

As a resident living very close to the location of these proposed events, I am very concerned by the excessive noise and amplified music that will occur. In addition to the noise on the day of the event there will be additional traffic noise caused by vehicles bringing in staging equipment and other structures. Having experienced the annual Dunnington Fayre and Bonfire events over last few years, I know only too well how the sound can be very annoying. On previous occasions the organisers have advertised the times only to discover that the music has gone on longer than stated. There is also the constant noise from generators which have to be run to provide the electric power.

A few years ago a gypsy wedding event was held in the same field which went on for three days. There was non-stop music being played throughout the night. It was so loud that I could not get to sleep and had to call out the COYC Noise Control team. They asked for the music to be turned off, but as soon as they left the music was turned back on. I understand that the owner of the field did not have a licence to hold such an event.

Public Safety

I am also concerned that the village infrastructure is not able to cope with such large volumes of traffic expected at these weekly events. As a consequence there is likely to be injuries sustained by car drivers and pedestrians.

Both access roads along Eastfield Lane and Intake Lane are very narrow. In particular Intake Lane towards Hagg Wood is used by walkers and cyclists. I therefore fear that there could be more accidents sustained.

If the planned housing development goes ahead along Eastfield Lane (H31 in the COYC Local Plan) this will create more homes next to the Showfield affected by the noise and yet more traffic congestion.

There is also a Public Right of Way which runs through the Showfield area. This would again put walkers at risk of being hit by vehicles entering the area.

Crime and Disorder

It is inevitable that with such large numbers attending such events, there is bound to be an increase in anti-social behaviour, especially if alcohol is available. I very much doubt that the Police will be able provide resources to protect the residents of Dunnington and their properties.

Though I do support the two current events held in the Eastfield Showfield, I certainly do not want this to be a weekly occurrence, otherwise I may need to think about making sure I can plan to be away when the events are being held.

This field is in very close proximity to resident's houses and the licence is for any weekend, Friday, Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9am and 11pm. The events could include live music, boxing and wrestling events which all bring noise and disruption to the village and its residents. From my location I can very clearly hear the music when the Summer Fair and Bonfire Night Events are held but these are twice yearly and quite frankly enough.

This should not be granted for a number of other reasons, from the prevention of crime and disorder in this small rural village, to public safety and very importantly the protection of children from any harm. Events like these would attract large crowds (anything up to 5000 people) from outside the village making the village less safe for our children to play. I have spoken to a local police officer who has policed events like these over the years and they often result in drunken brawls and an increase in crime.

In conclusion therefore, I feel very strongly that this licence should not be granted.

We are strongly against this proposal because if it is approved we could have loud music, dancing, plays, boxing, wrestling and crowds within a few yards of our house from 10:00 on Friday to 23:00 on Sunday 52 weeks of the year. This is clearly completely unacceptable. Below are some more details to support our objection.

We live in Kerver Lane in Dunnington, very close to the field referred to in this application, and bordering the route that people would use to access the field.

We would like to start off by pointing out that referring to it as a "show field" is very misleading. It is an agricultural field which usually has sheep in it. Over the last couple of years the sheep have been removed twice a year; once in the summer for a summer fayre and once for bonfire night. This clearly does not make it a "show field".

The application for a license is completely inappropriate both in terms of potential frequency (no limit specified) and the activities listed.

Dunnington is a quiet rural village. The area in close proximity to the "show field", and adjacent to the access route, is populated by retired couples and families with young children.

The type of events proposed are likely to cause significant impact and risk to the local population:

- **Pollution**

- The license specifically refers to live and recorded music. This will cause an unacceptable level of noise pollution.
- In the past flood lights have been erected on the path at the bottom of our garden. The light from these streams into our garden and through our curtains causing light pollution (and the diesel generator causes air and noise pollution).
- Large numbers of people attending the events is likely to cause litter to be dropped in our pristine countryside and along the paths which are routinely enjoyed by the local residents. Some of this litter may be hazardous to local residents, pets and wildlife.

- **Security**

- Encouraging large numbers of people to visit our quite village may compromise security. Because of the tight knit community we are fortunate to have very low levels of crime. Crowds of people coming into the village provide opportunities for burglars and thieves to enter the area unchallenged. We believe that on the evening of one of the previous events in the field there was an attempted break-in at one of the houses adjacent to the access route.

- **Children / Safeguarding**

- One of the specific items listed on the application is boxing and wrestling. This is completely inappropriate in our village, and potentially exposes our children to violent sports.
- Large gatherings of people could result in antisocial behavior potentially fueled further by drugs and alcohol. This could expose our young residents to:
 - Drunk people
 - Alcohol
 - Drugs
 - Drug Needles
- As with security, large numbers of people coming into our community could provide cover for people who may pose a threat to our younger residents.
- Additional traffic on our small lanes and streets poses an increased risk of road accidents.

- **Congestion**

- Because of the location of our village, people attending the events are likely to drive to Dunnington. This will cause congestion and parking problems.

The noise / light pollution and road congestion are completely foreseeable because it has already occurred at previous events in this location.

This proposal is completely unacceptable, and we urge you to reject it out-right.

We also believe that the notification process has not been adhered to. As you will gather from the large number of letters and emails that you have received over the last few days, the license application has only just come to our notice. We don't believe that the appropriate signs have been posted in prominent locations. We would expect that, as a house adjacent to the access route, we would have received a notification through our door at the very start of the review process.

Dear Sir or Madam,

As a resident of Kerver Lane, in the vicinity of the field to which this application relates, I wish to object to this premises license application on the grounds of public nuisance (in particular noise, car parking) and public safety (e.g. access for emergency services) and risk of crime and disorder.

The field has been used for two events per year in previous years, this license would allow additional events to be scheduled Friday to Sunday up to 23:00 HRS, and for those events to be larger. The events held in previous years have been getting larger, and impact on residents in the vicinity is already increasing – any further growth in size or number of events would cause significant detrimental impact to the amenity of the village.

The following specific points are related to my objection:

1. The field related to this License application is close to the edge of the village of Dunnington. Events such as those proposed generate noise, causing disturbance to properties in the vicinity. Music and other noise from events has been clearly audible from my property and neighbouring houses during past events - and has in the past kept my children awake at night past their bedtime. Any increase in the number of events which this license would permit will cause disturbance and harm the amenity and enjoyment of this peaceful village.
2. Whilst the applicants have indicated allocation in the field for car parking, during past events in the field cars typically park in and around Eastfield Lane, and Kerver Lane – especially in wet weather when the field itself can become very muddy. Eastfield Lane in particular is a narrow lane and parking along this lane could seriously restrict access for both residents and emergency vehicles.
3. Events on the field have grown in size over recent years, and traffic associated with events has consequently increased. Previous events have been licenced through Temporary Event Notices with a maximum capacity of less than 500 people. The application for a Premises License would allow events to grow significantly beyond this. The Impact of additional traffic on pedestrian safety - particularly through the centre of the village which is a designated

conservation area, and along Eastfield Lane which is the narrow access route to the site. The application does not provide adequate proposals to limit and manage impact of traffic and parking, particularly for events which may significantly increase in size if this license were to be granted.

4. The events have traditionally been primarily focussed on the community of Dunnington and surrounding villages. As the events have grown, increasingly they are losing in my opinion their community focus. If the events are to continue to grow I believe other locations with better transport (including public transport), car parking, and facilities to support large events would provide a more appropriate venue. The peaceful village of Dunnington is not a suitable location for large outdoor events.
5. The field is located in the greenbelt as defined in the draft York Local Plan. As a greenfield location the site lacks the infrastructure and facilities required by large public events. Temporary facilities such as toilets, stage, audio-visual equipment, power generators and any temporary buildings would need to be delivered to the field in advance of any events – causing further detrimental impact in terms of traffic (with movements of large vehicles on narrow lanes which approach the field), and noise. Roads which access the site are narrow with some difficult turns (for example Eastfield Lane, Intake Lane), with the children's playground on Intake Lane. These routes do not provide suitable access for large vehicles and any increase in the number or size of events would have a detrimental impact on residents, and put children coming and going from the Playground at increased risk of road traffic accidents.
6. I am concerned that temporary buildings and equipment could be left on a semi-permanent basis on the field between events, spoiling the character of the countryside on this side of Dunnington, and could attract criminal and anti-social behaviour.
7. The license application allows for an increase both in the number, and size of events. Without adequate policing there is a risk of anti-social behaviour, public nuisance, crime and disorder – all of which would have an adverse impact on the community and residents of Dunnington.
8. As a greenfield site the field has no fixed services such as power, water, or sanitation. The use of generators and floodlighting of access points has during past events caused disturbance (noise, light pollution) for residents in the vicinity of the site. The license associated with this application could allow for an increase in both the number, and type, of events and therefore have further detrimental impact on neighbouring properties and residents.
9. I am concerned about the lack of consultation with residents by the applicants. The Parish Council have indicated that they were not consulted by the applicants. Residents in the vicinity became aware of this application only days before the deadline for representations. This application is causing some considerable concern amongst residents I have spoken with in Dunnington.

We are writing to express our concerns and objections about the above proposed licensing application for Dunnington Community Events, Eastfield Showfield, Eastfield Lane, Dunnington.

We are residents of 102 Kerver Lane, Dunnington, directly overlooking the site in question. We are familiar with annual events which already take place, those being Dunnington Fair, Dunnington Live and bonfire and fireworks display. We support these events, as they are community based, infrequent and benefit the local community. However, application reference CYC 060438 appears to be a commercial venture, which will not be to the community's benefit, it is not in-keeping with the green belt location and there is risk of substantial noise from both the events taking place and from vehicles entering and exiting the site. Indeed, the existing community events create substantial noise disturbance, long after the events have finished and often late into the night in association with the setup and dismantling of infrastructure.

We note the site is accessed by a narrow lane, which is insufficient for two cars to pass in opposing directions without utilising the grass verges. Furthermore, the field utilised for parking is sloping away from the access point and we have witnessed for ourselves the difficulty experienced whereby cars are unable to leave the site in anything other than dry conditions.

In summary, the site is not suitable for the proposed use on a regular basis, the proposed use is not in-keeping with the local surroundings and the potential damage to the local environment, in terms of noise disturbance and traffic issues, will create a substantial impact on local residents.

We seek to ensure City of York Council continues to offer a wide choice of high quality and **well managed entertainment and cultural venues within a safe, orderly and attractive environment**. Valued by those who live in, work in, and visit, the city....

improving the quality of life for local residents through a reduction in alcohol related crime and disorder, disturbance and anti-social behaviour;

I am aware that the applicant is an unincorporated association, and so it will not have to show its accounts. There is concern that the association may not be acting in the best interests of the village, as I am unaware of whether the association returns any funds to the community. The population of the civil parish of Dunnington was 3,230 at the 2011 Census. Even if the whole village attended, then there is still scope for a further 1750 people to attend. I, therefore, question the thinking behind the numbers or the motives if the applicant, unless it was just due to lack of experience in dealing with event premises licence applications.

From speaking with fellow villagers, there has been little in the way of consultation with the residents, some that for a deemed community association I find extraordinary. Again, I hope this is just due to lack of experience in dealing with event premises licence applications.

I am all for the current 2 weekends a year that take place in this area, the Dunnington Village Fayre and the Bonfire Night. They are cultural events and as these are annual events, with known advertised dates, a blind eye is turned to the public nuisance, dispersal issues and the like. People should they wish can leave the village if they don't want to deal with the issues. With them being village events, village people do attend, it will be if extra events, that are not focused towards villagers, that issues will arise.

The current application allows for any number of events per year, for upto 4999 people to attend. I have enough issue with people using Dunnington as a cut through from the A64 when

the traffic is busy and due to the limited transport network, consideration must be given as to how 4,999 people will get in and out of the village with out creating a nuisance.

I would ask therefore, that the application be granted for a maximum of 4 days per calendar year, so that the risk of any unwanted events does not take place.

These comments are focused on dealing with the issues now so that the committee can grant a suitable premises licence (if it all), so that the need for a time consuming and costly premises licence review is not required.

5. Applications for Premises Licences:

POLICY

The operating schedule should include information which is necessary to enable responsible authorities, or other persons, to assess whether the steps to be taken to promote the licensing objectives are satisfactory and have been fully addressed.

The Licensing Authority will normally expect the operating schedule to have regard to the nature of the area where the premises are situated, the type of premises concerned, the licensable activities to be provided, operational procedures, and the needs of the local community in addressing the four licensing objectives.

Applicants are strongly recommended to undertake a thorough and appropriate risk assessment of their business in order to arrive at a detailed operating schedule which identifies and meets all necessary steps to promote the licensing objectives in relation to the application made. Matters detailed in this document in relation to other policies and strategies should, where appropriate, be taken into account when preparing the operating schedule and form part of the overall risk assessment.

The concept of developing an operating schedule for all premises is recognised as good practice whether applying for a variation or otherwise and all licensees are recommended to do so.

POLICY

The Licensing Authority encourages new applicants to discuss their proposals informally with licensing officers and other responsible authorities before an application is submitted.

Reason: To ensure the timely and efficient determination of the application and to avoid unnecessary formal hearings.

For an events licence, for this number of people for the number of days it can be used, the operating schedule is not detailed enough. I will submit a list of further conditions prior to the hearing that would be relevant in order to promote the licensing objectives. Again, I hope that the lack of detail contained within the operating schedule is due to lack of experience.

When determining an application in respect of which representations have been received relating to the prevention of crime and disorder and/or prevention of public nuisance, particular consideration will be given to the following by way of promoting the licensing objectives:

- Location and impact of licensed activity;

-The application area backs onto residential houses with there being an issue with noise nuisance, currently unreported due to them being for a limited time per year. Dispersal for 4,999

people will be very difficult due to the limited public transport in and out of the village. Event days should be limited to 4 per Calendar year.

- The type of use and the numbers likely to attend the premises;

-The type of use for purely village related functions is fine, it is if other events that are not village focused that will be an issue. Dispersal for 4,999 people will be very difficult due to the limited public transport in and out of the village. Event days should be limited to 4 per Calendar year. This number should be reduced.

- The proposed hours of operation;

- These are fine as long as there will be only 4 Calendar Events per year, that are well advertised, as a 'blind eye' can be turned or people can leave the village.

- The scope for mitigating any impact;

There is a lot of scope with mitigating conditions and limiting the number of days, currently this is not the case.

How often the activity occurs; and in considering any application that is already licensed, the Licensing Authority will take into account any evidence:

- Of past good operation of the premises;

I am aware that there are noise issues for the nearest residents and that there was a minor criminal incident thought to be linked to previous events run by the operator.

- Of past demonstrable adverse impact from the activity especially on local residents or businesses;

- That, where adverse impact has been caused, the appropriate agreed measures have been put into effect by the applicant to mitigate the adverse impact.

Reason: The purpose of this part of the policy is to achieve the licensing objectives of preventing public nuisance and crime and disorder. In furtherance of this aim the policy lists particular matters that the Licensing Authority will take into account in considering whether a licensed activity is likely to cause an adverse impact, **particularly to local residents.**

6.1 Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Dispersal

The Licensing Authority and the relevant responsible authorities would normally expect, as good practice, that the operating schedules relating to all premises licences (excluding guesthouses supplying alcohol to residents only and premises supplying alcohol as off sales only) and club premises certificates set out how they intend to manage the dispersal of customers from the premises. The aim should be to disperse people gradually either prior to, or immediately following, the final hour of operation of the licence. The hours the premises are open to the public, appropriate to the nature of the activities in the premises, should be determined.

Signage visible from outside the premises indicating the operating hours and proposed drinking up times should be displayed in order that customers are aware when the premises are likely to close. The provision of quiet areas and departure lounges is encouraged as a means of quieting the mood of customers prior to departure and deterring the waiting on streets for taxis and private hire cars.

Prominent signage should be displayed to remind customers to leave quietly. Other means should also be considered to aid effective dispersal.

Reason: Difficulties in encouraging customers to leave premises licensed to sell alcohol at the end of trading has been associated with violent disorder. Therefore holders of premises licences must have management plans in place to advise customers of the opening hours etc to effectively disperse customers. This contributes to the crime and disorder objective and potentially contributes to the reduction of public nuisance.

As discussed above dispersal of 4,999 people in this small village will be an issue with no public transport and limited infrastructure to support the number of cars that would be required to get that number of people to the events. This number should be limited.

6.3 Prevention of Public Nuisance

Customer Management

The Licensing Authority and the relevant responsible authorities would normally expect operating schedules to address steps to be taken to avoid disturbance being caused by persons entering and leaving licensed premises. The following measures should be considered:

- Erecting prominent notices at the exits to premises asking customers to leave quietly and not slam car doors;
- At appropriate times making announcements to the same effect. Instructing door staff to ask customers leaving the premises to leave the area quietly;
- Directing customers away from noise sensitive areas where appropriate;
- The means to ensure customers are taken away without delay. The Licensing Authority would encourage the forming of partnerships with local transport providers, and the provision of telephone points and public transport information;
- Steps taken to reduce the impact of any parking on local residents or businesses where appropriate.

Reason: Many complaints arise from nuisance caused by patrons and staff entering and leaving premises.

The above are key and conditions offered to address these issues.

Outdoor Music Events

The Licensing Authority and the relevant responsible authorities would normally expect licence holders to consider the following matters when compiling their operating schedules where events include outdoor music events in relation to the public nuisance objective:

- The timing of the event, considering the day of the week and the finish time;

As above the current form of the licence gives no consideration to this. As stated this needs to be limited to 4 Calendar days a year.

- The number of noise sources and whether they will compete to create a louder overall noise;

EHO should be consulted and noise management plan be produced for each event.

- The number of days the event covers;

As above the current form of the licence gives no consideration to this. As stated this needs to be limited to 4 Calendar days a year.

- The type of music to be provided. Low frequency associated with bass orientated music travels further;
- The size of the event;

4,999 is too large for a village this size with the proximity of the licensed area being so close to residential areas in terms of public nuisance and crime and disorder in relation to dispersal.

- The proximity of the venue to local residents.

As above.

Reason: Noise nuisance to residents can be caused due to loud music from outdoor events.

Litter

The Licensing Authority and the relevant responsible authorities would regard as good working practice, the inclusion within the operating schedule, measures which address and prevent public nuisance being caused by the generation of litter from the premises or operation particularly in relation to premises which primarily provide late night refreshment (takeaways).

Reason: Excessive litter is generated from licensed premises in various forms, particularly takeaway food wrappers and event/venue promotion leaflets (flyers) and cigarette butts.

Again, conditions need to be offered to ensure that a full litter collection is done for the whole village, within 24hrs of an event ending.

8. Licensing Hours

POLICY

Providing consumers with greater choice and flexibility is an important consideration, **but should always be carefully balanced against the duty to promote the licensing objectives and the rights of local residents to peace and quiet. It is the aim of the Licensing Authority to strike a fair balance between the needs of a licensed business and the risk of disturbance and nuisance to local residents. The Licensing Authority may, upon receipt of relevant representation, restrict the hours of operation where it is considered necessary to avoid unreasonable disturbance to local residents or businesses.**

The Policy covers this point neatly in that there is a duty to promote the licensing objectives, in its current format the application gives local residents no comfort at all. Again, I hope this is just due to lack of experience.

Dispersal

The Licensing Authority have received representations from the police expressing a view that disorder is most likely where crowds gather to queue or wait after leaving licensed premises. The effectiveness of dispersal of customers away from premises will be a consideration to the Licensing Authority when it is required to determine licensing hours.

Reason: The time at which licensed activities take place has a significant impact on the potential for public nuisance and disturbance to occur and is also a factor in the prevention of crime and disorder. A licensed activity may be acceptable at certain times and not others. Generally the later the activity takes place the greater the potential for problems to occur. The Licensing Authority has a duty to promote the licensing objectives.

Issues will arise in terms of crime and disorder if numbers allowed to attend remain at 4,999, they should be reduced.

I hope that through the period prior to the licensing hearing that the applicant considers the above seriously and amends the application to promote the licensing objectives and ensure that residents are not affected by events.

Dear Sir or Madam,

I object to this application on the following grounds.

I am a resident of Kerver Lane. Events which have been organised on the showfield in recent years have caused issues with noise from the event itself, this has an impact on the amenity of the village for myself and others living in the vicinity during events. Any increase in the number or size of events hosted on the field would only result in more noise disturbance.

Noise from events on this field can be clearly heard from our property, particularly in summer this is a problem when we would be unable to leave windows open on a hot evening, or enjoy relaxing in our garden without being disturbed by noise from events. The license would allow more events, which would result in more weekends where noise disturbance is an issue for us.

Past events have also caused issues with parking of vehicles, and movement of vehicles – particularly large vehicles bringing event equipment to the site. Trucks and large vans have in the past been directed down Intake Lane, past a children's playground. I am concerned about more events which would mean more trucks and vehicles – and the risk to the safety of children using the playground.

People visiting past events have parked on Kerver Lane, rather than the designated parking in the field at the site. The increased traffic on a quiet residential street causes noise disturbance and is a safety issue when cars are parked inconsiderately. Noise from loud talking and slamming of car doors at 11/11.30pm as people leave events also causes noise disturbance.

Whilst I have not objected to the two events per year held in the showfield in the past, if the events were to become any larger or more frequent I believe that the impact on those living in the vicinity, myself included would be significantly adversely affected.

We wish to object to the granting of this license on the following grounds:-

1. This is an open-ended application which could lead to regular all day events on every weekend throughout the year. Previously this field has only been used for two community events for residents each year, the annual village fayre and the annual village bonfire.
2. The so-called "showfield" is part of the green belt area at the edge of the village and has no on-site facilities. For any event, all equipment, utilities and structures would have to be brought in and out of the site.
3. There is only one route to this site which is along Eastfield Lane. Part of this route is single track and the rest is a narrow residential road past housing. Neither is suitable for event traffic and damage could be caused to both the roads and verges by heavy event vehicles or high volumes of traffic. This has happened in the past at the junction of Church Balk and Eastfield Lane where there is a very sharp corner, necessitating the construction of a substantial embankment and raised kerb to protect the grass verge from further damage.
4. Public transport to and from the village is limited, especially in the evenings, which would generate even more traffic to this site.
5. There is no hard standing for parking and therefore on wet days the field may be unusable for parking. This has previously resulted in significant on street parking problems, not only in Eastfield Lane, but also in surrounding residential streets and has also seriously restricted access for residents and emergency vehicles.

6. The inevitable noise from the proposed events in this open field will be difficult to contain and will reduce the amenity of residents on that side of the village. Along with the previously highlighted access and transport issues, additional noise from traffic as people arrive and leave will contribute further to this.
7. Unless these events are adequately policed there is a risk to public order given the number of people who could attend, especially if alcohol is available.

First, the access roads are narrow and increased traffic will increase risks of accidents for both drivers and pedestrians. Events on this field also lead to excessive parking on surrounding streets, even when parking is offered on an adjoining field.

Second, large events on the field create public nuisance with noise from the event itself and from attendees as they arrive and leave. Large numbers of people passing through the village late at night, with the likely addition of alcohol, will have a detrimental effect on crime and disorder. In an area where police patrols are not regular and placing additional demands on their resources.

I live very close to the field in question and am well aware of the impacts that twice annual events on the field have on the area. I do not wish these events to become any more regular.

We wish to object to this application on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance, especially noise and traffic movement late at night.

1. 'Eastfield Showfield' is in fact a farmer's field located within 400 metres of many houses in Dunnington, and is located in York Green Belt. There are no permanent facilities at the site so when an event takes place the site has to be set up and then taken down.
2. The field is not located next to a paved road, despite the address being given as 'Eastfield Lane'. Access to the site from Eastfield Lane is across a field. The only other access to the site is from Horsfield Way along a narrow unmade track which runs directly adjacent to houses. For most of the year the field is used for grazing animals. The site is currently used by Dunnington Community Events on only two or three occasions a year.
3. The site is not an enclosed space, ie a building, and therefore the potential for noise and public nuisance is high. In the past the use of this site on two or three occasions per annum has been acceptable to us as the events ended no later than 8 pm. **Extending the hours to 11 pm is a major change and would create noise late into the evening** thus disrupting sleeping children and adults. The fact that the site has to be cleared could also raise the risk of noise from traffic well after 11 pm. On a previous occasion a musical event run by this group caused significant music noise to us on a warm summer evening and ended much later than scheduled.
4. This application is 'open ended' and potentially opens up the possibility of many more events being organised for much longer hours.
5. Currently parking for events at this location is in a field off Eastfield Lane adjacent to a significant number of houses, ie between The Market Garden and 65 Eastfield Lane and next to houses in Holly Tree Croft and houses at the top end of Kerver Lane. Events ending as late as 11 pm pose an unacceptable risk of traffic noise along the length of Eastfield Lane at or later than that time, especially given that the site has to be cleared. In the past there have been problems getting vehicles out of this field in wet weather, requiring the use of a tractor to pull out cars, thus creating more noise and slowing down traffic leaving the site.
6. In our view the so called 'Eastfield Showfield' is not a suitable venue for events which will end as late as 11 pm, given its location, access and proximity to housing. Whilst a small number of events is acceptable to us ending at 8 pm, as outlined above, we are of the opinion that the site is not appropriate for more extensive use as requested in this application.
7. We therefore object to this application for the reasons given above.

We are writing to object to the granting of the licence for Dunnington Community Events at the Eastfield Showfield in Dunnington.

We are objecting to the open-ended nature of this application. My family support the two events that happen in the village but I object strongly to what I understand is a blanket licence which potentially could allow all day events on every Friday – Sunday throughout the year.

We also have concerns over:

- 1) The large volume of traffic which could be generated every time an event is staged in accordance with the application. Access to this area is difficult and public transport limited on an evening. Event traffic accessing the Showfield is just not practical or feasible on single lane tracks.
- 2) The noise from such events is difficult to contain as it is in a field. There are a lot of families with young children that live near the location so there will be a significant risk of disturbance to them.
- 3) If the events are not adequately policed, there is a risk to public order given the numbers that may attend. If alcohol is available this increases the risk further. If large numbers of children attend, we would be concerned for the safety of them.

I wish to object to the above application.

My main concern is one of nuisance to neighbours and residents on that side of the village. The site is a field and therefore there will be no possibility of containing any noise. Any indoor events will be in a tent or marquee where there will also be little or no ability to contain noise. Residents in many roads in Dunnington are able to hear music from the site; this is known from the events already held there. Whilst this might be considered acceptable on a couple of weekends a year for community events, the possibility of this happening every weekend of the year is not. People would be unable to enjoy their gardens and many residents would hear the music indoors. Car doors slamming as people leave late at night could also be a nuisance especially as there is no guarantee that visitors won't park in residential streets.

The application gives details of parking facilities but makes no mention of any contingency plans for if, as has happened in the past, the fields are too wet to use for parking. Considerable problems were caused by parking on nearby roads and concerns were raised with me including access of emergency vehicles.

Alcohol will be available at some, if not all, events but there is nothing explicit to say how children will be protected either from people using alcohol or from getting it themselves.

With regard to the above application, as residents of Dunnington, we wish to object to its implementation for the following reasons.

Dunnington is a quiet, rural and residential community and the application would drastically disrupt the peace in such a tranquil area.

Although Dunnington has families with people of all ages there is a large population of retired and older residents who would be particularly disturbed by this intrusion.

The noise would amount to nuisance at all hours of the day until 11pm and particularly at night when young children are trying to sleep. It would be difficult to enjoy sitting in one's own garden and expecting to have some peace and quiet. There would be no choice in the matter!

The application would bring litter and other pollution to the village and would have a detrimental effect on the environment. We know how large crowds of people attending events such as those proposed behave with diminished responsibility.

Drunkenness, crime and other forms of antisocial behaviour would increase in the village which prides itself on good community relationships. Crowds of people who are non residents descending on the village would be intimidating and put the resident population into a minority at times.

It would be a disaster if the village deteriorated and volunteers gave up their efforts because the situation has become hopeless. I would remind you that Dunnington has won awards for Britain in Bloom. Dunnington needs to be attractive to visitors for the right reasons and not for the wrong reasons.

Dunnington has fine areas for recreation and wild life conservation and these are also cared for by volunteers. In addition we have the Friends of Hagg Wood, Friends of Hassecar and people maintaining the sports ground environment and the children's

play ground. Noise, litter and disturbance would have a detrimental effect on wildlife which more than ever needs to be preserved and nurtured.

We feel that the assertion that the area proposed is already a show ground is irrelevant. I wish to object to the current application, number CYC 060438, relating to the Eastfield Showfield, Eastfield Lane, Dunnington, York, on the grounds of public nuisance and public safety. The application represents a major escalation in the frequency, length and range of events which it would be permitted to hold at this site, which is a rural field with access along a narrow single track road that is close to a large residential estate whose residents risk suffering considerable nuisance from music and other noise late into the night and over a substantial period of time on any week of the year. The field is at present only used for about two events each year, each of which attracts considerable additional traffic to the area, and generates considerable noise. Granting the approval for this application would give the applicants permission to hold large events of a much broader range and frequency every Friday – Sunday until 11pm, with traffic noise still continuing after that time.

The wide range and frequency of events proposed would be likely to attract large crowds from a potentially considerable distance, posing substantial problems of traffic control and public safety at the difficult junctions of Eastfield Lane with Church Balk, of Petercroft Lane with York Street, and of Church Balk with the A166 York to Stamford Bridge Road. These public safety concerns would be further increased if, as at present, alcohol is permitted to be sold on the site, with car drivers from the wider York area potentially driving back late at night after consuming alcohol at such events.

The range and frequency of events that would be permitted are on a commercial scale that is inconsistent with the lack of facilities and planning status of this field in the Green Belt, with large crowds and adjacent parked cars and other vehicles in a potentially muddy field posing further public safety concerns.

The application should therefore be rejected.

Dunnington Parish Council objects to the granting of this licence. The applicants have not consulted the Parish Council on this application.

- 1) We object strongly to the open-ended nature of this application. In the past we have not objected to a small number of one off events at this site but do not support a blanket licence which allows for all day events (through to 23:00) on every Friday to Sunday throughout the year.
- 2) The showfield is at the edge of the built up area of the village and has no on site facilities. This field is within the green belt. The Parish Council supports the extent of the greenbelt within the published local plan. All utilities, structures, staging, lighting etc will have to be brought to the site each time it is used. There is no hard standing on site. Temporary structures could easily become permanent if the showfield is used regularly in accordance with this licence.
- 3) We are concerned at the large volume of traffic which could be generated every time an event is staged in accordance with this application. Public transport to the village is very limited especially in the evening. Access to the site is by narrow residential roads and single track lanes which are not suitable for event traffic. Damage could be caused to the grass verges on the single track access from Eastfield Lane.
- 4) There is no hard standing for parking and on wet days the field they have designated for parking may be unusable. This has in the past resulted in significant on street parking problems within the village and more especially on Eastfield Lane. Access could be seriously restricted for emergency vehicles both to the event site and also for residents.
- 5) The inevitable noise from such events which is difficult to contain given the location of the field will reduce the amenity of the nearby residents on that side of the village. Particularly late at night there is a significant risk of disturbance due to the playing of music, loud talking as people leave the field and walk down residential streets and of car doors slamming as they get back to their cars.
- 6) If these events are not adequately policed there is a risk to public order given the number of people who may attend (especially if alcohol is available). The events in the past have been attended by a large number of children.

RE: Dunnington Community Events application for licensing Eastfield Showfield, Dunnington, York.

We write with unwavering objection to the proposal to license the Eastfield Showfield. This license will create opportunity for a multitude of events to be held in the village, none of which are wanted by a large majority of villagers. Dunnington Community Events suggest they are trying to help bring more 'trade' to the village, none of the events held so far have created any trade for the existing shops/businesses here in the village. In fact, as the fayres and shows that have been held on the Eastfield Showfield all have self-contained food and beverage outlets, the businesses in the villages have all commented on being quieter at these times.

Our main objections are the following:

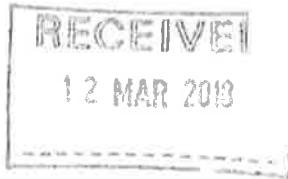
- 1) **Parking/Public Safety issues** – Dunnington Fayre and Dunnington Fireworks events have both caused many issues with parking and access to properties in the village. People do not park appropriately, blocking driveways and damaging grass verges. I personally suffered as a result of these parking issues, being heavily pregnant at the time of the Firework event in 2016 I needed to get to hospital with stomach pains, somebody had completely blocked our driveway, resulting in me waiting longer to get someone to collect me.
As a member of the villages in bloom community, our village takes great pride in the appearance of the village, yet after the events we are left with damaged grass verges and a terrible litter problem. The driving observed by some of the 'visitors' to the village at these times is dreadful and an accident waiting to happen.
- 2) **Crime** – Following the Dunnington Village Fayres in the last few years it was mentioned that there was a rise in burglaries in the villages shortly afterwards. There was also vandalism to people's cars and masses of litter left for the villagers to deal with.
- 3) **Noise** – Living adjacent to Eastfield lane, we very much experience noise disturbance from these events, they always run over the designated finishing time and with loud music playing in an open space, the sound travels a long way. With 3 children under the age of 4 and loud music playing until almost midnight this has caused great nuisance for our family, followed by the streams of cars leaving the event past our house. It was also noted after the events last year that some people getting into their vehicles had clearly been propping up the bar in the afternoon. This is a massive concern to our family.

As the field is green belt land it seems highly inappropriate for these events to be taking place any more regularly than the twice a year we already have to suffer. Of course, some of the villagers do benefit from the show and fireworks, however, if given the choice between keeping these 2 events alone or being awarded a license to allow numerous other events, which are not in the best interest in the villagers, the majority of the community I have spoken to would rather sacrifice them all.

At present the Show field is used for two events per annum. The Dunnington fayre held over two days and the Dunnington Bonfire night fireworks. These events finish at approximately 21.30Hrs and the traffic is cleared by 2300Hrs. These events are not without problems but are tolerated locally. The entrance to the carpark off Eastfield Lane is on a single track road with no footpaths. The verges are taped off to prevent parking on them, this makes pedestrians and cars use the same road.

The new licence is for events finishing at 23.00Hrs every weekend this means that the traffic will not clear Eastfield Lane before midnight. I work at Full Sutton Prison and attend every other weekend having to rise at 0500Hrs for me to be on site for my start time. The road is only approximately 32 feet from my bedroom window. Having lived here for over thirty years and being traffic free at night. This will impact on my sleep and possibly my ability to be alert while at work.

Dunnington has a Sports club that is used for disco dancing and playing music, it could quite easily put on films if required. The reading rooms in the village have a stage and plays are put on in them, films could also be shown at this venue. The only proposal that is not covered by amenities in the village is the licence for boxing/ wrestling. At present there is not a boxing /wrestling club in the village and if there was it would have the necessary rings inside for practice or competition. This would then negate the need for this licence. Please find the enclosed flyer from Dunnington Community Events which clearly shows that the reading rooms and the sports club are presently used by them.

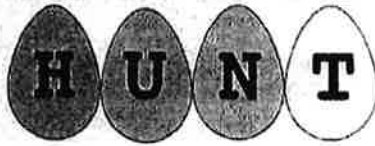

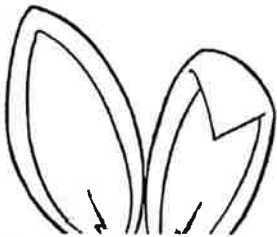

I refer to the attached sheet which shows 3 things:

1. Parish Council Information to Dunnington about an application for an entertainment licence;
2. Sparse details about that application;
3. Brief details about a complaint I made to Dunnington Parish Council and the Police on 5th Novemeber 2016 after a firework display in Eastfield Lane.

The circumstances of my concern were that between 7.15pm and 7.45pm on the evening of 5th November, vehicles leaving the firework event in Eastfield Lane moved towards Church Balk in 2 lines of traffic, completely preventing any vehicles travelling in the opposite direction from accessing the Lane and the properties therein.

That inability to gain access would have extended to emergency service vehicles.

I do not object to the events per se, although I do have concerns about any development in ~Eastfield Lane until the road is wider, but I do have concerns about Public Safety and Public Nuisance and unless there is a plan to manage exiting traffic properly, object on those grounds.

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**MANDATORY & PROHIBITED CONDITIONS – PREMISES LICENCE
LICENSING ACT 2003**

MANDATORY CONDITIONS WHERE LICENCE AUTHORISES SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL

1. In accordance with section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
2. The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
 - (a) at a time where there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
3. The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises –
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage individuals to –
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either –

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that –

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures –

- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125ml;

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

MANDATORY CONDITION: ALCOHOL PRICING

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 –

(a) “duty” is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(6);

(b) “permitted price” is the price found by applying the formula –

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where –

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence –

- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) “value added tax” means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(7).

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day (“the first day”) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (“the second day”) as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

MANDATORY CONDITION: DOOR SUPERVISION

1. In accordance with section 21 of the Licensing Act 2003 (as amended by section 25 Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006), where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, the licence must include a condition that each such individual must -
 - (a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
 - (b) be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of that Act.
2. But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed -
 - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or
 - (b) in respect of premises in relation to -
 - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence, or
 - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
3. For the purposes of this section -
 - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and which is licensable conduct for the purposes of that Act (see section 3(2) of that Act), and
 - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

MANDATORY CONDITION: EXHIBITION OF FILMS

1. In accordance with section 20 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
2. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.
3. Where -
 - (a) the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
 - (b) the relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
4. In this section - 'children' means persons aged under 18; and 'film classification body' means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

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Legislation and Policy Considerations

1. The following provisions of The Licensing Act 2003 apply to this application: S4 general duties of licensing authorities; s17 application for premises licence; s18 determination of application for premises licence; s23 grant or rejection of application; ss19, 20 and 21 mandatory conditions; The Licensing Act (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010; and The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Conditions) Order 2014.
2. The following provisions of The Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005 apply to this application: Regulation 42, Part 2 (Premises licences) and Part 4 (General) relating to applications, notices and representations and advertisement of applications
3. The following provisions of the Secretary of State's guidance apply to this application: Section 2 The Licensing Objectives; Section 9 Determining applications; Section 10 Conditions attached to premises licences and club certificates; and Section 13 Statements of licensing policy.
4. The following paragraphs of the licensing authority's statement of licensing policy apply to this application: 5.0 Applications for Premises Licences, Club Premises Certificates and Variations; 6.0 Guidelines for Applicants; 7.0 Saturation and Cumulative Impact and 8.0 Licensing Hours.

We resurrected the fayre 12 years ago and at the start it was a 4 night and 2-day event. As time has gone on we have reduced the days and nights - by listening to comments, to suit what is supported and the hours available by the volunteer committee. We moved from Dunnington Sports Club to a local farmers field so we were able to include vehicles, animals etc in the fayre and more importantly there were car parking fields available which we did not have at the Sports Club.

We had no intention of holding events all year round but felt that we may like to add another event or so in the future so it left us some flexibility and had not quite understood the license procedure. We have accepted the license restrictions from North Yorkshire Police including that there shall be no more than 6 events totalling no more than 18 days in any 12-month period.

Access/Car Parking – prior to the event signs are put up in the village to direct people to the event and car parking fields. A ‘no vehicle entry’ sign is placed at the start of the public footpath at the end of Petercroft Lane. Cones are placed in front of the houses on Eastfield Lane between the Holly Croft Junction and Eastfield Showfield and then barrier tape is used from there until the last house on Eastfield Lane in the direction of Stamford Bridge. Parking stewards are available throughout the events directing cars on arrival and departure. We use a one-way system with cars leaving down Eastfield Lane towards Stamford Bridge away from the village.

Pedestrian entrance is along a public footpath at the end of Petercroft Lane away from the carpark entrances.

Prevention of Crime & Disorder – SIA badged security, marshals and committee are present at all times during the events, so we can ensure public safety.

Site Clearance – All rubbish is placed in a hired skip and removed after the event. A road sweeper is hired on the Monday morning after events if required to clean; Eastfield Lane, Holly Tree Lane, Petercroft Lane, Horsfield Way and Intake Lane.

Toilets – these are hired in and all waste taken away in tanks.

Full Event Manual - to be submitted 3 months prior to event including; description, aims, objectives, organiser, management structure, insurance, safety advisory group members, event control/communications, stewarding, crowd control, site plan, contractor’s responsibilities, medical provision, lost children, vehicle movement, traffic management/car parking, noise, emergency evacuation procedures/routes, catering, external contractors, site clearance. Copies of - steward/volunteer briefing note, lost child form and resident’s flier to be included.

Music - JSS Audio - PA and audio hire and installation company based in York are used. Noise checks to be carried out and logged during testing and with every band playing.

We support the village facilities using both The Reading Rooms and Dunnington Sports Club for smaller events, but they are sometimes too small to cover costs.

Please accept my written submission as Ward Councillor as I am unable to attend the hearing.

The two events that take place every year on this site are extremely well supported and appreciated and I do not think that many in the village would want to stop them happening. However, this application is for every weekend of the year.

My main concern is one of nuisance to neighbours and residents on that side of the village. The site is a field and therefore there will be no possibility of containing any noise. Any indoor events will be in a tent or marquee where there will also be little or no ability to contain noise. Residents in many roads in Dunnington are able to hear music from the site; this is known from the events already held there. Whilst I could support an application for two weekends a year for community events, the possibility of something happening every weekend of the year is totally unacceptable. Even six occasions a year would be unreasonable given the level of the impact on nearby residents.

People would be unable to enjoy their gardens and many residents would hear the music indoors. Those living nearest the site have suffered from the noise of the generator indoors as well. Car doors slamming as people leave late at night would also be a nuisance as visitors do park in residential streets. I know there have been first hand accounts from residents detailing what they have to put up with.

The application gives details of parking facilities but makes no mention of any contingency plans for if, as has happened in the past, the fields are too wet to use for parking. Even when the facilities are open very serious concerns have been raised with me about the ability of emergency vehicles to access the site.

I also have concerns that the pedestrian access, along a narrow track which is a public right of way, is also used as a vehicle access to the car park.

I ask that you only grant a licence for two events on this site given the level of nuisance caused to residents.

Extract from Draft Minutes of Dunnington Parish Council Meeting 12th March 2018

3 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Five members of the public spoke to the meeting in respect of Item 4 (EASTFIELD SHOWFIELD LICENCE APPLICATION). Parishioners spoke both in support and in opposition to the Licence Application for Eastfield Showfield.

4 EASTFIELD SHOWFIELD LICENCE APPLICATION

A discussion took place in respect of the licence application; the response the Parish Council had given and the arguments from those who supported or opposed the application.

As well as the issues raised in the Parish Council's response the Parish Council raised concerns in respect of the maximum number of people who could attend and the licencing of the serving of alcohol. The Parish Council considered:

- Did it wish to retain its previous response submission
- Did it wish to speak at the licencing meeting which will be held within 20 days

- Were there any amendments required to the submission

The Parish Council was content with its initial submission but taking into account the level of support in the village for the Fayre and the bonfire would seek a resolution which would let the existing two events take place. The Parish Council may perhaps support a third event if they were approached in advance with full details. The Parish Council does not support the existing open ended application. The Parish Council also made it clear that their support for the two existing events depends on the proper overall management and on DCE ensuring that the adverse effect of the events on local residents was minimised as far as possible.
