(YCF), which are both central governments funds. The criteria for the distribution of the funds were based on those agreed at the Leisure and Heritage Committee Meeting of May 2002, but adapted by the YorKash Panel to incorporate the requirements associated with the YOF and YCF as well.

She decided to remain in the room unless there was discussion about the content of that particular annex, but no comments on that annex were made.

Councillor Cuthbertson declared a personal interest in Agenda Item 10 as a member of an Adoption Panel and Councillor Runciman declared a personal interest in Agenda Item 10 as a member of a Fostering Panel.

32. Minutes

Minutes of the meeting held on 16 October 2006 were not included in the agenda, therefore Members had been unable to read them prior to the meeting. it was agreed that those Minutes would be included in the next agenda and signed at the meeting of the Children's Services EMAP on 22 January 2007.

33. Public Participation

It was reported that there had been no registrations to speak under the Council's Public Participation Scheme.

In regard to agenda item 11 'Arts & Culture Staffing Review', a letter from Jackie Richardson of Unison had been circulated prior to the meeting in which she objected to the proposed loss of one Managerial post and the knock on effects to the Arts & Culture Service.

34. Exclusion of Press and Public

It was agreed that the press and public be excluded from the meeting prior to consideration of annex 1 to the report of agenda item 13 'Bought-in Services – Early Years & Extended Schools Service', on the grounds that it contained information relating to the financial or business affairs of a particular person, which was classed as exempt under paragraph 3 of Schedule 12A to Section 100A of the local Government Act 1972.

35. LA Governor Appointments

Members considered a report which provided information about the current position with regard to vacancies for Local Authority seats on governing bodies, listed current nominations for those vacancies and requested the appointment, or re-appointment of the listed nominees.

Members were informed that individuals had been identified and were being processed for all of the vacancies indicated in Annex 1 of the report, except in the case of Bishopthorpe Infant School where a nominee was still being sought.

Advice of the Advisory Panel:

That the Executive Member be advised to appoint, or re-appoint Local Authority Governors to fill vacant seats as proposed in Annex One.

Decision of the Executive Member

RESOLVED: That the advice of the Advisory Panel be accepted and endorsed.

REASON: To progress work in this area.

36. Service Plan Monitoring 2nd Period

Members considered a report which analysed performance by reference to the Service Plan, the budget and performance indicators (Pls) for all services funded through the Children's Services budget.

Officers updated Members and circulated a summary of the Children's Services portfolio which outlined the 2006/07 original estimates and latest approved budget together with details of Service Plan variations from the approved budget.

The report highlighted significant progress against a very challenging programme and identified some of the key achievements in the year to date:

- Within Access and inclusion, the number of young people on the education otherwise register had fallen very rapidly and the level of provision had now increased with more young people attending the Pupil Referral Unit for more days per week than in the recent past. It was noted that this had been achieved largely through the willingness of secondary school head teachers to collaborate over the reintegration of much larger numbers of excluded pupils.
- A much improved level and quality of provision for minority ethnic groups, with support being provided for a rapidly growing number of EAL learners in school.
- A significant decline in the level of bullying reported in the school survey
- Best ever results in maths and science at Key Stage 3, and an increased number of pupils who had achieved 5 A*-C at GCSE putting York in the top 20% of Local Authorities.
- An increase in the number of schools who had achieved a Healthy School standard
- Significant improvements to the systems the Authority had in place to respond to the needs of the most vulnerable children and young people across the city. Members recognised the excellent work of the Children's & Families Service which had achieved a consistently low level of unallocated cases, below the 2.5% target set.
- The development and refurbishment of Castlegate (One Stop Shop).
 Members were pleased with the progress made to date on that new facility which they recognised would be a significant asset and passed on their congratulations to the officers leading on the project.

Members noted that the reduction of £63k in the projected underspend on support required for statemented children was from School Based Additional Tutors and not School Based Area Teachers, as indicated in the report.

Members acknowledged the enormity of the work in Children's Services and the work that had gone into producing the report, but requested that other methods of presenting the information contained within the annex be considered as without colour it was very hard to follow. They also expressed concern over the significant number of staff absent on long term sickness.

In regard to the net projected overspend of £31k it was noted that officers would continue to work to identify further savings to bridge that remaining gap before the end of the financial year.

Advice of the Advisory Panel:

That the Executive Member be advised to note the performance of services within the Directorate funded through the Children's Services budgets.

37. Capital Programme Monitoring 2nd Period

Members considered a report which informed them of the likely out-turn position of the 2006/07 Capital Programme, based on the spend profile and information to the end of September 2006.

Updates on, and variations to, the schemes in the programme were outlined in paragraphs 5 to 24 of the report. Those variations had produced a gross capital programme for 2006/07 of £12.879m, of which £11.792m was funded externally, resulting in a net cost to the City of £1.087m.

In regard to the York High School Scheme, Members noted the increased costs and the need to identify further capital funding to meet the revised figures. It was recognised that the prudential borrowing mechanism was the only way forward.

Members noted that there was no slippage in the capital programme and thanked Officers for their work in achieving that, and in producing the report.

Advice of the Advisory Panel:

That the Executive Member be advised:

- (i) To note the capital programme forecast out-turn for 2006/07, as shown in Annex A to the report.
- (ii) To approve the additions and amendments to the programme, as summarised in Annex A.
- (iii) To approve the use of prudential borrowing to increase the available funding for the York High School scheme, subject to the approval of the Schools forum and the Executive.
- (iv) Agree the revised capital programme as shown in Annex A, subject to the approval of the Executive.

38. 2007/08 Budget Report

Members considered a report which presented the 2007/087 budget proposals for Children's Services. It included:

- the Budget Book Service Plans for 2006/07 showing the original budgets at Annex 1
- the base budget for 2007/08 including the 2006/07 budget rolled forward and adjusted
- the allocation of pay and price increases for the portfolio
- Budget service pressure proposals and savings proposals for the portfolio area were shown at Annexes 2 and 3
- Fees and charges proposals shown at Annex 4
- Residential Homes, Foster Carers, Sharing Care, Adoption and Residence Order Weekly Allowances shown at Annex 5

Members considered the overall budget savings that needed to be made by the Authority. Having noted the proposals, the following points were raised:

- The impact of the budget on EDs was not necessarily apparent from the report and it was noted that if approved, the proposals would result in the loss of a post.
- The introduction of SIPs as part of a national programme had directly resulted in the loss of one Advisor post.
- The budget had been affected by the new way of DfES funding through the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) and that the estimated increase per pupil was 6.4%.
- the number of children being taught at home was expected to fall over the coming year with those remaining being taught in groups, leading to a reduction in the provision of home tuition.

Members acknowledged the amount of work that had gone into producing the report and thanked all who had contributed.

Advice of the Advisory Panel:

That the Executive Member be advised to:

- i. Note the above comments and recommend that they be considered by the Budget Executive on 16 January 2007.
- ii. Consider the budget proposals for Children's Services for 2007/08 contained in the report and recommend that consultation be carried out on the following prior to the Budget Executive on 16 January 2007:

 - Residential Homes and Foster Carers, Sharing Care, Adoption and Residence Order Weekly Allowances as set out in Annex 5

39. Capital Programme Proposals 2007/08

Members considered a report detailing the proposed programme of capital expenditure for major and minor projects against the 2007/08 and 2008/09 DfES local Authority (LA) Formula Capital funding, as shown in Annex 1.

The report also included information on the Schools Access Initiative (SAI) for 2007/08. It was noted that 21 bids had been received totalling £458,685 and that these had been ranked and prioritised using an agreed criteria. As a result, a number of projects had been recommended as shown in Annex 2 and a programme of capital expenditure against the fund proposed.

The report informed Members of the results of the bidding round for capital support for Extended Schools to date and proposed a procurement route for the provision of a new building for Joseph Rowntree School under the BSF One-School Pathfinder Project scheme previously approved in September 2006.

Members noted that advice had been sought from the Assistant Director of Resources, Head of Property Services and he had recommended that the new school be procured through the national framework. This would allow the Authority to choose between six pre-selected construction partners who through the scheme, had previously built 3,500 schools in total and would have the capacity to deliver the new school on time and on budget.

Members expressed concern that the individuality of the York scheme must not be lost and that the ideas and requirements of those who would use the new school facilities must be taken into consideration. It was noted that a good level of consultation was in progress with all the interested parties.

Advice of the Advisory Panel

That the Executive Member:

- i. Approve the proposed LA Formula Capital programme for 2007/08 and 2008/09
- ii. Approve the proposed Schools Access Initiative capital programme for 2007/08
- iii. Note that the detail of the proposed Extended Schools Capital programme for 2007/08 and 2008/09 will be presented to EMAP in January 2007
- iv. Support the procurement for the new building for Joseph Rowntree School through the PfS national framework.

40. Placement Strategy

Members considered a report which provided:

- Annual feedback upon the progress of the placement strategy for looked after children in York, which was originally agreed by elected members in October 2003.
- Information about the key issues relating to the adoption, fostering and residential care elements of provision for looked after children
- Statistical information about the adoption activity for City of York in the past year and provides an update on changes in the membership of the adoption panel.
- A specific recommendation regarding the ongoing development of the local specialist fostering scheme

Members welcomed a more direct involvement in the establishment of the strategy for placement services as it allowed them to fulfil their corporate parenting responsibilities.

The report detail that following inspection of the Local Authority children's homes, both homes had received positive reports and the Glen had received the highest level 4 for an inspection outcome. Members were pleased to see that this challenging and demanding service had been recognised externally and congratulated the staff at both homes on their good work.

The report detailed the five key changes from the implementation of the ACA 2002 and Members noted that the new regulations would help to standardise the adoption process.

The report highlighted how the fostering service was committed to increasing the number of foster carer households to 100 by 2009. It was intended that 28 of those would be specialist placements for severely disabled young people, and teenagers with the most challenging behavioural or placement difficulties.

Advice of the Advisory Panel

That the Executive Member:

- i. Note the updated information in relation to the placement strategy for looked after children in York.
- ii. Agree the extension of the specialist fostering scheme to afford the scope for recruitment of up to 8 new households in the next two years to ensure the capacity to place young people locally and avoid the additional cost of placing young people with higher cost independent fostering agencies.
- iii. Note the information about the adoption activity in the past year.
- iv. Note the changes following from the implementation of the ACA 2002 and specifically the wider responsibilities to provide adoption support to families.

41. Arts and Culture Staffing Review

Members considered a report which sought their views on the principles behind a proposed restructure of the Arts and Culture Service.

It was noted that the decision to implement the proposed restructure would be taken by the Chief Officer and the report detailed how the method under consideration would enable the service to face new challenges and would contribute to the significant saving that the Council needs to make in its Budget for 2007/8.

The principles for the re focus of the service were to:

- Increase active participation in the arts by widening access and diversifying the work
- Increase active participation rates improving the offer to young people
- Create safer and stronger communities through focused, targeted work, especially in those communities where active participation rates were low

 Focus festival work on community and arts development whilst working in partnership to promote the 'York - City of Festivals' brand.

Members considered the options contained within the report which would focus priorities and deliver the proposed budget savings. It was recognised that refocusing services would allow for a wider engagement of young people and the community, and would improve links to extended schools and performing Arts Centres. The options included the reorganisation of the Cultural Events team and the Arts Action team under one manager resulting in the loss of one managerial post.

Members were concerned about the effects that would have on service delivery but the report detailed that delivery would continue through partnership work. Having taken into consideration the letter of objection written by Unison, Members agreed that it was a realistic approach to making the saving which would have the least impact on delivering the service.

Advice of the Advisory Panel

That the Executive Member note the comments on the principles set out in the report that underpin the proposed new staffing structure for the arts and Culture Service.

Decision of the Executive Member

RESOLVED: That the comments of the Advisory Panel be accepted

and endorsed

REASON: To secure the increased engagement of young people in

the arts, the delivery of a Wider Opportunities programme in schools and that the service arm operates within the

budgets set for 2007/08.

42. 2 Year Pathfinder Bid

Members considered a report which detailed the DfES Pathfinder Project for supporting disadvantaged 2 year olds in free Nursery Education Provision as part of a commitment to the Action Plan for the Ten Year Strategy 'Choice for Parents, the best start for children: Making it happen'.

The report informed Members that the Pathfinder had been granted to:

- Deliver 7.5 hours per week of free provision for disadvantaged 2 Year Olds.
- Provide 30 places for those children from January 2007 January 2008 and 470 places from April 2007 – March 2008
- Ensure that there was a seamless transition from the pilot to the free entitlement which would usually mean that children commenced pilot provision the term after their second birthday if they were accessing a three term place.

Members asked for reassurance that the specific needs of each 2 year old would be considered as it was recognised that all principles of care were important not just learning and education.

The report highlighted that the following would be eligible for free places under the Pathfinder:

- Looked after children
- Children or Parents with special or additional needs (includes Mental Health)
- Children of teenage parents
- Children from very large families (5 or more)
- · Children from families where there is unemployment
- Children living with single parents
- Children from the Traveller community
- Children from minority, refugee, Ghurkha, BME or service families
- Children whose family circumstances negatively impact on their early years experience (includes ill health)

Members were pleased to see that the project involved the integration of all the support services to aid the children and their families, and that the outcomes would be measured and evaluated to ensure that standards were raised across all settings.

The report also sought approval to extend the 3 & 4 year old Pathfinder Manager post by 7.5 hours and bring forward the 3 & 4 year old Pathfinder Development Worker and Data Administrator Posts from April 2007 to January 2007 to facilitate the development of this new Pathfinder.

It was recognised that combining the posts would provide continuity between the two Pathfinders and ensure a common quality framework. It was noted that there was no guarantee of provision at the end of the project but it was expected that the results would show the need to continue the service.

Advice of the Advisory Panel

That the Executive Member approve combing the management of the 2 year old Pathfinder and the 3 & 4 year old Pathfinder

43. Early Years Service Level Agreements

Members considered a report detailing the contracts for awarding services previously provided through Service Level Agreements (SLAs) for the period April 2007 to March 2009.

Members were informed that a review of the process for awarding SLAs had recently been carried out to ensure compliance with the relevant financial regulations. The current SLA funded organisations had assisted that process by providing information on the relevant criteria for evaluating quotations and assisting in the creation new format for the tender documentation.

The report gave information on the selection criteria, an evaluation of the received quotations and made the following recommendations for awards:

In respect of the service to 'provide support to existing and potential out-ofschool clubs' Members noted that the current provider who had assisted in creating the new process, had failed to present their quote in the new way. the report highlighted that none of the quotations received had met the selection criteria and as a result, it had not been possible to make a recommendation. The report detailed the remaining options:

- to investigate an in-house arrangement to provide the service
- to re-tender the service.

It was noted that both options would require further investigation and that would delay the awarding of the service. The report therefore proposed extending the current SLA with York Childcare for three months.

1. This report provides information about the current position with regard to vacancies for LA seats on governing bodies, lists current nominations for those vacancies, as detailed in Annex One, and requests the appointment, or reappointment, of the listed nominees

Background

- 2. The current position of each governing body regarding re-constitution is contained with the school details in Annex 1.
- 3. National benchmarking data on governor vacancies indicates a national average of 11% for LA governor vacancies. York has 3.4% LA vacancies at the time of writing this report.
- 4. Some vacancies will be generated by those existing governors not wishing to stand for a further term of office. The following table summarises the current position of LA vacancies and appointments in City of York schools.
- 5. Some updating of the database to include newly federated schools and to remove the previous separate governing bodies has resulted in changes to the total number of governors.

Identification of vacancies

- 6. The overall picture of governor vacancies is informed by an accurate, detailed database, which includes records of all schools, the structure of their governing bodies, individuals who serve as governors and terms of office.
- 7. From the database can be determined such information as current vacancies and terms of office which are due to expire. In this way the Governance Service can clearly identify in advance the actions which are required and act accordingly.

Reviewing Vacancies

- 8. The vacancy position is under constant review. When potential new governors are identified the candidate is interviewed to discuss their interest and suitability. The Chair of Governors and headteacher are also asked to meet with the candidate and show him or her around the school prior to nomination for appointment. This allows the school to assess the potential candidate in terms of a good match for the needs of the governing body and current governors.
- 9. Where a term of office is due to expire, the individuals are contacted to ask whether they would like their name to be put forward again for reappointment. Chairs and headteachers are contacted to invite any relevant supporting information. Where a reappointment is appropriate, this is included on the nomination paper for consideration by the Executive member with the Advisory Panel.
- 10. All Local Authority governors are required to apply for an enhanced disclosure from the Criminal Records Bureau.

Political Balance

11. In York the LA governor seats are filled on merit, rather than by strict consideration of political balance. Just under a third of LA governors are, in practice, linked to one of the political parties. Amongst this number there is a balance which very broadly reflects the political balance within the authority. As and when a situation arises in which any party has significantly more seats than their political representation would indicate to be appropriate,

steps may be taken to redress the balance over a period of time, whilst always considering the need to identify the best possible governor for a school, rather than taking account of individuals' political affiliation.

12. Consultation on the nominations for appointment has been undertaken in accordance with the agreed procedure for the appointment of LA governors.

Report of the Director of Learning, Culture and Children's Services

Specialised Diplomas

Summary

1. This report is to update members on developments that have taken place in preparation for the introduction of specialised diplomas in September 2008 and to seek support for changes planned.

Background

- 2. The 14-19 Partnership has completed a submission to the Department for Education and Skills (DfES) which indicates a willingness to offer access to 4 of the new diplomas to small numbers of students at levels 1, 2 and 3 in 2008: Construction and the Built Environment, Creative and Media, Engineering and Information Technology. The suggestion is that the 5th diploma, Society, Health and Development, will be offered to larger numbers of students because of the work that has already taken place across the city on the Health and Social Care Diploma pilot, led by York College.
- 3. The 14-19 partnership's self-evaluation led to the decision that there is the capacity in York to start work on all 5 diplomas in 2008. Schools, colleges and training providers have agreed that each will be involved according to its capacity to embrace this particular curriculum change. Collectively, there is a commitment to learn on behalf of each other and to pilot innovation on a scale which is manageable but which moves the city's education providers into a strong position to offer the national entitlement of access to all 14 diploma lines in 2013.
- 4. The 14-19 Partnership, through the work of its Planning Group, has completed applications to offer the first 5 diploma lines in September 2008. Every secondary school has indicated an interest in helping to design and deliver at least one of these diplomas. York College, Askham Bryan College and Providers in Partnership (the local consortium of work-based learning providers) are all fully engaged with the planning process.
- 5. Five separate diploma development groups prepared their submissions in time to meet the DfES' deadline of 11th December 2006. Each group consists of representatives from providers interested in delivering elements of a

diploma in 2008 and each is chaired by a senior leader from a school or college, as agreed with college principals and headteachers. All 5 submissions have been endorsed by the Local Authority (LA) and the Learning and Skills Council (LSC) (annex 1) and are accompanied by a joint capital bid to the DfES (annex 2).

- 6. All submissions will be considered during January and February and there is an expectation that announcements indicating which areas have been successful will be made in March 2007. The Government Office panel which will make decisions about bids from the Yorkshire and Humberside region is scheduled to meet on 20th and 21st February and local partnerships will be notified of the outcome in March at the earliest.
- 7. All areas will eventually be successful with their gateway applications because there is an expectation that all planned diplomas will be available for all 14-19 year olds from 2013. However, it is generally understood that many applications to start in 2008 will be turned down. It is anticipated that the DfES, through Government Office, will seek to invest in success and limit the extent of participation in tranche 1 of the diplomas (ie 2008 start)
- 8. Success in this application to offer access to diploma lines in 2008 will trigger an intensive programme of work and development during the academic year 2007-8. This will include working closely with awarding bodies to gain their approval; a very focused programme of staff development and capital investment in equipment and facilities in line with a successful capital bid.

Consultation

9. The introduction of specialised diplomas is a key priority of a partnership strategy developed by the Lifelong Learning Partnership and endorsed by the Children's Trust. There is full support from members of both partnerships. Throughout the Autumn term 2006, there has been ongoing consultation between all members of the 14-19 partnership. Headteachers, college principals and work-based learning managers have been involved at all stages of this process and the submission made to the DfES was clearly informed by consultation with all key partners.

Options

10. Not applicable.

Analysis

Corporate Priorities

12. The introduction of specialised diplomas will make a major contribution towards the corporate priority of "improving opportunities for learning and raising educational achievement for everybody in York". The authority has

identified a number of Corporate Improvement Statements, one of which includes a commitment to 'increase people's skills and knowledge to improve future employment prospects.' Actions to achieve this improvement include increasing the 'number and variety of vocational courses for 14-19 year olds.' In addition, the Local Area Agreement includes two relevant outcomes:

- to engage more young people in education and training' and
- 'to improve the skills of 16 and 18 year olds'

Implications

Financial

13. The Lifelong Learning Partnership is committed to finding £150k contribution if the capital bid is successful. The Local Authority could be required to underwrite this from the schools' formula capital budget but, in the first instance, contributions will be sought from the range of partners – LSC, colleges and the schools' delegated capital budgets. A direct schools' grant has been allocated for the financial years 2006-2008 to build capacity within schools to support the introduction of specialised diplomas (total of £461k). The cost of seconding a secondary headteacher to manage this project for the calendar year 2007 is being shared by the LSC and the LA. As this fixed term secondment comes to an end, it may be that partners identify a continuing need for a 14-19 Development Manager. If this is so, it is understood that central funds will not be available and that partners such as schools and colleges would have to fund the post from within their financial resources.

Human Resources (HR)

14. There are no HR implications arising out of these proposals at this stage. Should future roll out of this national initiative have HR implications, the HR service will be consulted and all the applicable HR policies and procedures will be followed.

Equalities

15. There are no implications for equalities.

Legal

16. There is a statutory duty upon LAs and LSCs to ensure that in 2013 there is adequate provision across the city for all 14-19 year old learners to access any one of the 14 new diploma lines. Although the changes that are planned for 2008 are not statutory, there is an expectation that LAs will move in this direction and that it will feature in the Children and Young People's Plan. Evaluation of progress made towards the introduction of diplomas is central to the Government Office performance management arrangements.

Crime and Disorder

17. There are no implications for Crime and Disorder.

Risk Management

- 21. In introducing the new diploma lines, there is a range of risks that need to be managed. These include:
 - the level of collaborative working between partners needed to deliver the programme may not be achieved
 - the funding may not be sufficient to underwrite the full cost of the programme, including travel and tutoring costs
 - the training programme may not prepare staff adequately to deliver high quality courses
 - the courses themselves may not attract sufficient numbers of students to be viable

These risks are being managed as follows:

- the strategy has been pursued through partnership arrangements, rather than a single agency, with explicit sign up at every stage, including the submission to the DfES
- whilst ear marked funding will be available for the programme through the bid, the vocational standards fund can be used as a contingency as can school and college core budgets
- the training programme will be delivered in close collaboration with the Specialist Schools and Colleges Trust (SSAT) and the Learning and Skills Network (LSN)
- estimates of demand have been based on considered advice from schools and colleges. This has been supported by the fact that young people involved in the development of the 14-19 strategy have expressed considerable enthusiasm for the idea of schools and colleges working together to offer a wider curriculum choice at 14+.

Recommendations

22. The Executive Member is recommended to consider and comment upon these proposals and to approve the plan for the introduction of specialised diplomas.

Reason: working towards requirements which will be statutory in 2013.

14-19 Gateway: Local Authority Statement

The York 14-19 Partnership has completed applications to offer all 5 diploma lines from September 2008. This is a long established, successful partnership, whose commitment to vocational learning is evidenced through its extensive Increased Flexibility programme, high quality Young Apprenticeship programme, innovative 14-19 Pathfinder work and current involvement in the diploma pilot – one of only 11 areas participating in the 2005 national QCA pilot.

York's schools and colleges are high attaining and determined that, through clear, consultative decision-making processes, they will safeguard quality as they develop breadth and access to a city-wide entitlement for 14-19 year olds. In the recent Government Office progress check, York was judged to have made good progress towards preparing for the introduction of specialised diplomas, being the only Local Authority area in Yorkshire and the Humber to be graded green on the RAG scale.

The partnership boasts several other key players, helping to drive the 14-19 strategy:

- York's Education Business Partnership (NYBEP): leads a Business Forum through which significant senior employers understand, influence and support York's 14-19 strategy; hosts the York and North Yorkshire Joint Area-wide prospectus manager; is undertaking a major review of work experience in the city, to ensure that provision meet the needs of a newly emerging curriculum
- Higher Education: close alignment between Higher York and Aimhigher strategies and the 14-19 Strategy; established links between cross-phase curriculum development groups; joint work on progression pathways; well established programmes of working with schools to address low progression cool spots in the city, targeting Y6 – Y11 (York Green Apples); level 4 modules to be piloted with 16-19 year olds in summer 2007
- Connexions: highly regarded nationally for its successful interventions with students at risk of falling out of the system. Its latest contribution to the strategy has been working with learners to publish their own version of the York 14-19 strategy

Learning visits have featured in this partnership over the last 18 months and have included an international study visit to learn about vocational provision in Sweden, a visit to Wolverhampton and to Kingswood 14-19 partnerships to investigate underpinning systems and to identify key features of long term effective collaboration.

The LA and LSC now judge that headteachers, college principals and work-based learning managers are committed to the fact that *city-wide* structures and systems must underpin our 14-19 curriculum offer and be in place for September 2008. In support of this target, the LA and LSC have jointly funding the secondment of a CYLLP 14-19 Development Manager who is charged with developing and introducing an effective infrastructure.

The partnership prepared its submissions through a robust process reflecting the city-wide commitment to 'Learning without Walls', York's 14-19 strategy. All 5 lines will support key employment sectors, with forecasts anticipating significant growth in all these sectors up to 2021. The 14-19 Planning Group (all secondary headteachers,

college principals and WBL provider, LSC and LA representatives) steered the process, ensuring that:

- proposals align with developments within the Children and Young People's Plan and Local Area Agreement, for which the partnership is taking a lead on 14-19 developments
- plans reflect a commitment to Science City's developing skills strategy in all key clusters: bio-science (including bio-engineering),creative and digital industries, environmental and health care technologies
- two key issues identified in 2005 StAR are tackled: addressing the needs of learners in pockets of low attainment and progression within York
- a single consortium capital bid was agreed, based on a confident understanding of our current and planned resources and a realistic appraisal of need if we are to offer innovative new opportunities for learning
- as provision is developed, attention will be paid to cross-boundary issues with North Yorkshire LA

Proposals are well informed and self evaluation moderated as the partnership agreed that:

- membership of each diploma development group must appropriately reflect expertise across the city
- draft submissions should be reviewed and amended by the 14-19 Planning Group
- to purchase a day of external consultant's time to secure an impartial perspective on judgements made
- self evaluation judgements would be confirmed through the 14-19 Evaluation Group

Both the LA and LSC judge that each application submitted accurately reflects strengths and areas for development. There was much discussion about the suggested scale of provision within each diploma line and venues. The partnership proposes that four diploma lines start with small numbers in 2008, agreeing that this will ensure quality is more easily managed in the early stages of offering new provision. It also allows the partnership to gradually build up a momentum with employers, so that a strong and mutually beneficial relationship is established.

All partnership members are committed to the ideal of learning together and on behalf of each other. Each provider has given careful thought to its capacity to manage change, to resources already available and its commitment to particular curriculum areas - through school specialism or CoVE status – before agreeing to help develop and deliver a diploma line. Every school will contribute to the introduction of diploma lines in 2008, alongside the colleges and Providers in Partnership. Guided by the EBP and Economic Development Unit, consideration has been given to the economy's needs and its capacity to provide work placements and employer support.

The partnership judges it is appropriate to offer the Society, Health and Development diploma to a much wider group of learners in September 2008, for reasons which emerge in the submission. From an LA and LSC perspective, we endorse their decision that foundations have been well laid through national and local investment in the pathfinder area of Health and Social Care. Partners are aware of the current framework document and understand that this covers a much broader curriculum than was originally envisaged. Had this not been so, numbers would have been even higher.

The partnership recognises the broader significance of these first 5 diplomas. They must be of high quality, attract a wide ability range, avoid stereotyping and lead to successful outcomes because they are the advance guard of further curriculum change. All partners are committed to investing in the success of these diplomas and so preparing the way for future change.

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Capital Bid – City of York Partnership

The Partnership has made Gateway submissions for all 5 Diploma lines from 2008. We intend to build on our existing Health, Society and Development pilot, which will involve York College and 8 schools in 2007-08, and run smaller pilots in the other 4 lines. City of York's position in the final tranche of Building Schools for the Future Local Authorities means that there is no possibility of aligning a large scale programme of school buildings renewal to support the development and expansion of Diploma provision prior to 2013. This bid seeks to adapt and equip existing facilities on key sites and enhance the limited programme of School building in the authority (two schools involved have TCF programmes for 2008, one has BSF Pathfinder for 2009 and early discussions over the inclusion of Specialised diploma facilities in this project are planned for Spring Term 2007). The bid also recognises that in the area of Construction the new build at York College (opening September 2007) was planned before Diploma developments commenced and that its construction facilities will be at capacity due to excess sector demand, which is far outstripping all expectations and has overtaken the 10% growth rate allowed for in the new build projections. Shared use of resources across the Engineering, ICT and Creative and Media lines has reduced the estimated costs and ensures best value. The resulting programme will support high quality delivery during development of the 2013 entitlement across the partnership.

Engineering: Partner institutions have already developed programmes and sourced funding to significantly refurbish and upgrade facilities. This bid is for equipment for use across the delivery institutions and to facilitate the development of two centres of excellence for this diploma line. Equipment will include CNC Milling machines, Lathes and Routers, CO₂ Laser Manufacturing systems, CAM Engravers and high specification ICT equipment including Laser Scanners, Printers and Software. Estimated costs are £275k.

ICT: This bid is for resources needed to provide high quality delivery of 3 options of Additional Specialist Learning (Multimedia, Software Engineering and Hardware). Partner institutions will support the delivery of the core diploma content in 2008. Software Licences will provide 75 workstations for web design, advanced web design, multimedia and 3-D across the partnership. Hardware resources and associated computer facilities for 18 learners will be set up in one or two clusters. A new server will support a shared diploma resource bank and new teaching learning methods will be supported by purchase of tablet PCs and projectors. Estimated Costs are £183k.

Creative and Media: To provide high quality delivery of the media strand of the diploma we need to create a media centre within existing accommodation. This would include a 20-station Apple Mac facility with high spec machines, industry standard software and the ability to handle large video files. External storage devices would also be needed to accommodate these files over time. Each station/user will also require a mini Digital Video Camera. The centre will need to provide high quality photo printing facilities. Estimated Costs are £190k

Health, Society and Development: Partner institutions are planning facilities upgrades in their own institutions from within existing budgets. The Diploma Development Group has identified the provision of 2 mobile units in converted double-decker buses to offer principal and additional learning opportunities. This model is founded on the successful experience of such provision in Southwark and York Youth Service's experience with a Sports Bus. Bus One will provide a simulated rehabilitation facility with kitchen, bathroom, stairway, bedroom and discussion and classroom area. Bus Two will provide a simulated multi purpose clinic/health centre facility and a flexible space for ICT based learning, discussion groups and module specific delivery such an environment for simulating a court. This will enable the pilot to continue with 9 partner institutions through mobile provision as work continues to develop closer links and greater access to fixed facilities for 2013. Each bus will cost £120k (total £240k). The partnership will fund driver/technician costs and sponsorship income to support this will be derived from the existing pilot project's involvement with 3 sector skills councils.

Construction: This is an exceptional new build proposal. We will erect a purpose built facility on a site close to the new campus of York College on the site of one of our partner institutions, Askham Bryan College. It will be staffed by tutors with experience of working with L1 and L2 students. The facilities available within the York College campus would not be able to accommodate the extra L1 and L2 places because sector demand continues to grow at rates well above trend. There is a clear regional need for an expanded and highly developed workforce.

The proposal provides workshops for brickwork, joinery, painting and decorating, plumbing and electrical activities along with two associated classrooms for academic delivery. The latter would be multi-use as would the drawing offices and CAD suites. Some elements of the L3 Specialised Diploma could be delivered in this facility. It would also be used for the Construction, Engineering and Land Based and Environmental Studies Specialised Diplomas. Using a group size of 20 as a design parameter (so allowing for some expansion in learner numbers) produces a space requirement of $800m^2$ (approx). Anticipated building costs are £600k with a further £150k for fitting out and equipment such as tools, furniture and computers. This gives a total cost of £750k, which assumes that there will be no land costs.

Building Schools for the Future - Prioritising

Summary

1. This report reviews the progress of the Building Schools for the Future and Primary Schools for the Future (BSF) programmes and recommends to members criteria for prioritisation of the order in which schools should enter the programmes.

Background

- 2. BSF for the renewal of secondary schools is prioritised on the basis of deprivation and underperformance as has been detailed in previous reports. This leaves York in one of the later waves, although the City has been awarded funding as a 1-school pathfinder under BSF and members have approved the choice of Joseph Rowntree as the school building to be replaced.
- 3. The primary school programme was consulted on over the summer, in line with the details shown at Annex 1. The DfES (Department for Education and Skills) has not yet announced the results of the consultation, but the probability is that the programme will largely reflect the details proposed. This will mean that the first tranche of funding will be available from April 2008.
- 4. It is important to agree in advance the order in which schools will enter the programme so that they can plan their own asset management in a sensible and sustainable way and time is made available for advance planning.

Consultation

5. This proposal has been discussed by the Joint Consultative Group and includes amendments suggested by the group.

Options

6. This report sets out an in principle methodology for prioritising capital work on schools to be funded by BSF programmes. The methodology reflects both

the priorities previously approved by the Executive Member and those of DfES.

7. Other options are to ask officers to formulate an alternative methodology or not to adopt a prioritisation system.

Prioritisation Criteria

8. It is proposed that all schools are given a score based on a list of elements that reflect the needs of individual schools and their pupils and communities as follows:.

Baseline score

Every school currently has a baseline score that is used in the current prioritisation for the distribution of the Local Authority Formula Capital. This is based on three surveys, 'condition', 'suitability' and 'sufficiency'. The 'condition' survey is carried out by a professional building surveyor and covers all aspects of the physical state of the school. The remaining two are completed by the schools and agreed with the Local Authority. 'Suitability' is about the barriers to raising standards imposed by the building and 'sufficiency' measures the number of pupil places available. Weightings are used to push up the scores of popular schools where pupil numbers exceed the building capacity.

It is suggested that the baseline be used as the main criterion for prioritising schools, but that all of the surveys on which it is based are fully updated before the first listing is produced.

Sector

There are currently three federations in York, each consisting of two schools. It is recommended that each of the federations that have ambitions to amalgamate have a raised sector score to reflect their strategic importance to the authority.

Deprivation

It is proposed that a deprivation score be produced, based on a range of indicators derived from the Index of Multiple Deprivation.

Standards

Insofar as the existing buildings present difficulties in the organisation of high quality teaching and learning, standards issues are considered within the baseline suitability score.

Analysis

- 9. Bringing the deprivation and standards factors in to the prioritisation reflects the Governments BSF objectives.
- 10. Once the scores have been sorted, a judgement will be made for each school about its long-term viability and its optimum size in the light of current and

- projected pupil numbers. This will satisfy the DfES requirement for consideration to be given to local demographic changes.
- 11. The DfES expects the Primary Capital Programme to have an effect on at least 50% of the Primary School estate. This means that York should receive a total of £28 million over the life of the programme. Some schools will require full replacement, so others need to achieve their objectives through smaller capital expenditure. Buildability, including issues such as available space and planning consents will also be an important consideration and each project must be achievable within budget. At this stage, all school plans, including any necessary alterations for Extended Schools, will be considered.
- 12. Proposals are made on the assumption that the primary scheme will be as suggested during the consultation.

Timescales

- 13. In order to enable a detailed project plan for the school(s) with the highest priority to be worked up and agreed by the time primary programme funding is available, a prioritised list of primary schools will be presented for approval in the early summer of 2007.
- 14. A list of secondary schools will be presented at the same time, but, with funding so far in the future, should be regarded as indicative. This will enable changing circumstances to be reflected until York enters BSF.

Corporate Objectives

15. The strategy for the prioritisation of the BSF programmes makes a significant contribution to the corporate priority of improving the way the Council and its partners work together to deliver better services for the people who live in York.

Implications

Financial

16. There are no financial implications from setting the criteria for prioritisation as this stage is planning for future funding. There may be other funding requirements arising from individual projects and these will be reported as the projects are proposed.

Human Resources (HR)

17. There are no HR implications

Equalities

18. There are no implications for equalities

Legal

19. There are no legal implications

Crime and Disorder

20. There are no crime and disorder implications at this stage, but detailed school developments incorporate the principles of 'Safer by Design'

Information Technology (IT)

21. There are no IT implications

Property

22. There are no property implications at this stage, but the Head of Property Services is aware of this process and will continue to work with Planning and Resources to ensure that projects are ready to start when funding becomes available.

Risk Management

23. Risks associated with this proposal are largely related to the proposal not being approved and adopted as DfES will be looking for a coherent strategy and sound business case for individual projects before funding will be released.

Recommendations

24. The Executive Member is recommended to approve the criteria for prioritising the order in which schools should enter the programmes.

Reason: have a strategy for prioritisation in place that would allow DfES to release the funding as it becomes due

Scope

- standardisation of design and construction components
- using existing national or local frameworks
- better day-to-day management of school facilities

What we need to achieve and how

The programme supports ECM, 'Higher Standards, Better Schools For All' and the Primary Strategy. It brings together the 10-year childcare strategy, workforce strategy, ICT and extended schools programmes. The national minimum aim is to rebuild or take out of use at least 5% of the worst condition schools and improve or take out of use the worst 20% in the most deprived communities. Other schools benefiting from the strategy will be substantially improved. The programme should also contribute to other national targets, such as raising standards, improving school food or promote sport and languages.

DfES require that we set out a strategy to improve the primary estate and target deprivation before the start., supported by local debate to support tough choices. They need to approve this before funding is released. The strategy must fit with local plans and show how it is joined up with other programmes.

Page 43

Current design quality indicators and building standards will be applied to all schemes, with sustainability as a key objective. DfES will be publishing '*Primary Ideas*' with practical school improvement projects.

Ambitious design and procurement models are required to achieve maximum value from the programme. DfES are looking for the use of LEPs where these are in place, other forms of partnership where not. Fundamentally, they believe that there should be strong private sector interest in longer term contracts with a regular flow of predictable and substantial work. For Las without a LEP, they will develop a national framework agreement and expect Las to include this option as part of a robust option appraisal. They will encourage standardised design and off-site construction methods. Efficiency is critical at every stage from early planning to long term maintenance of the resulting buildings. Las must consider how schools will commit lifecycle funding to maintain their new/renewed buildings properly.

Funding starts in 2009/10 and plans need to be prepared, consulted on and approved by then.

Outcomes

At the end of the programme, primary schools will:

- Every primary school will be a good standard
- Every child and family will have access to 8am-6pm year round childcare, parenting support, specialist support services, a good range of after-school activities, ICT, sports and arts facilities. Access will be either at the school or at nearby premises with supervised transfer arrangements for children.
- Have appropriate kitchen and dining facilities to improve the nutritional standards of food consumed on the premises and improve the uptake of school meals, including free meals.
- Provide first-class ICT facilities so that pupils can study in a way that suits them and quality learning environments to enhance teachers' flexibility.
- Reflect demographic pressures.

Extended Schools Capital

Summary

1. This report details the results of the bidding round for capital support for Extended Schools.

Background

2. The Department for Education and Skills (DfES) have awarded new additional capital funding of £1,010,743 over two years to support schools to extend their services, so that all can provide a minimum of the five core offers by 2010.

Consultation

3. Bids were invited from all schools other than those who were proposed for designation as an Integrated Children's Centres (ICC), as these had already received funding.

Options

4. All schools were circulated with details of the funding and a total of 18 bids were received. These have been scored against the bid criteria. The report recommends certain schemes for approval.

Analysis

- 5. The bidding forms and criteria were developed by staff from the Early Years and Extended Schools Service. All bids were independently scored by Project Managers from Planning and Resources. The scoring of the bids reflected the criteria set out in the bidding forms, a copy of these forms are shown in Annex 1.
- 6. The scored bids were reviewed by a panel consisting of the Head of Early Years and Extended Schools, the Early Years Adviser, the Chair of the Early Years Partnership and the Head of Planning and Resources.

7. The full list of bids is attached at Annex 2. In making recommendations for approval, the panel placed each of the bids in one of three groups:

Yes recommended for approval

Conditional recommended for approval subject to certain conditions

being met

No not supported at this time

8. The recommendations of the panel are shown on the list of bids with the appropriate conditions or a reason for not supporting the bid, shown in the 'comments' column.

9. In all cases, the panel felt that schools should undertake to deliver the projects described in their bids within the amount of funding bid for, as a condition of accepting the funds. Staff from the Early Years and Extended Schools Service and Planning and Resources will work with the schools to support them in this objective. They will also work with those schools whose bids were not successful in this round to work up a stronger bid should further funding become available.

Corporate Priorities

- 10. Supporting schools in offering a range of extended services to both pupils and the wider community can impact on the following priorities:
 - a. Increase people's skills and knowledge to improve future employment prospects
 - b. Improve the health and lifestyles of the people who live in York, in particular among groups whose levels of health are the poorest
 - c. Improve the life chances of the most disadvantaged and disaffected children, young people and families in the city
 - d. Improve efficiency and reduce waste to free up more resources

Implications

Financial

- 11. The funding has been made available in the form of a capital grant from the DfES, and totals £1,011k over two years. The successful bids detailed in Annex 2 total £879.5k, leaving a balance of £131.5k. It would be prudent to hold this as a contingency against unforeseen budget pressures. If not required, the balance can be made available for allocation to a project which currently sits below the funding line, but may qualify following further work.
- 12. There is a requirement that expenditure relating to this grant funded initiative must be incurred by 31 March 2008.

- 21. The mitigation for these risks are both the recommended general condition for accessing this funding and working with Directorate staff to work up robust project plans and budgets.

Recommendations

- 22. That the Advisory Panel advise the Executive Member that:
 - 1) Approval is given for the supported bids to go ahead

Reason: To enable the DfES funding to be spent on appropriate projects within the required timescale

2) All successful bidders undertake to deliver the outcomes described in their bids within their funding allocation.

Reason: To mitigate the risks of overspending against this cash-limited budget

3) Approval is given for the conditional bids to go ahead, providing that schools agree to meet the additional conditions relevant to their project.

Reason: to ensure that DfES and corporate objectives are fulfilled.

4) Projects currently below the line are further developed with Directorate staff and, if a higher score can be achieved and funding is available, these projects come forward for approval in the quarterly Capital Monitoring reports.

Reason: to ensure that funding is spent within the time limits and best value is achieved.

Big Lottery Fund: Play

Summary

- 1. This paper sets out how the Council may apply for Children's Play, Big Lottery Funding. It seeks:
 - Endorsement of the process followed to identify projects
 - Approval to work up the identified projects for inclusion in the portfolio to be presented to the Big Lottery Fund
 - Approval for the reserve projects
 - Approval for use of the Council's top-sliced funding

Background

- 2. The Big Lottery has allocated a total of £155 million nationally for play in order to provide three things:
 - An infrastructure to support the national development of play including Play England, a body responsible for supporting local authorities.
 - A further funding stream for the voluntary sector called 'Playful Ideas', which focuses on innovation, and
 - An allocation to each local authority under the "Children's Play Initiative".
- 3. In November 2005 the Council received confirmation from the Big Lottery Fund that York's allocation under the Children's Play Initiative will be £328,264.87 for the 3 years 2007 2010. This funding must be used to develop play provision by creating, improving and developing local play space.
- 4. To generate proposals for how the allocation should be spent, the authority is required to consult with and involve local play partners in the City in working up a portfolio of projects that:
 - Focus on areas of greatest need
 - Fit with York's local play strategy, and

- Meet the Big Lottery's "3 frees" criteria: Free of cost, freely chosen and freely accessed
- 5. This portfolio must be submitted to the Big Lottery for their approval.
- 6. As the lead body, the authority is able to top slice 10% of the total allocation for project management costs.

Timescales and Process

7. Officers have followed a process designed to build in robust consultation and to ensure that the needs of children and young people are properly taken into consideration before the authority submits its portfolio in March 2007:

Summer 2006	Updating of the Taking Play Forward Policy through consultation with children, young people, play and project providers, parent/carers, national organisations, local authority - transport, planning, housing, etc.
October 2006	First draft of the revised Taking Play Forward Policy produced highlighting local need
October 2006	3 local conferences held to discuss the revised policy and invite expressions of interest for the Big Lottery funding against the policy and lottery criteria
November 2006	Closing date for expressions of interest
December 2006	A shortlisting event held with a range of representatives to select projects for consideration
December 2006	Consultation with shortlisted projects to develop the portfolio.
December - February	Feedback from the consultation consolidated and a final revised version of the Play Policy produced
March 2007	Present portfolio to the lottery funding
April 2007	Bring final version of <i>Taking Play Forward</i> to EMAP
June 2007	Receive confirmation from Lottery of the success of application - Within 3 months of the closing date

Consultation

8. In 2002 the authority formally launched the *Taking Play Forward*, play policy, a collective vision for Play for the City actively consulting with many interested groups, organisations and individuals to ensure that the dreams and aspirations were realised for the play sector. The document covers policy objectives, legislative background, training, funding, resources and measures for play.

- 9. It is a requirement of the Big Lottery that the local authority has a play strategy in place and Taking *Play Forward* places us in a strong position. The recent establishment of a designated Play Team within the Early Years and Extended Schools Service well placed to consult and develop links with the Play sector, adds to this strength.
- 10. In developing this process, however, it was recognised that the policy was in need of updating to take account of a number of key legislative changes that have come in since the policy's launch.
- 11. The first draft revision *Taking Play Forward* makes clear links to other strategic documents including the Children and Young People's plan. It also covers how play impacts on other sectors, internal and external to the council, including the voluntary sector, sport, arts, libraries and parks. Through the Children's Trust involvement strategy, the revised policy draws from consultations that have taken place with children and young people to ensure that their needs are placed at the very heart of the document. The document is currently posted on the council website for comment. It will be brought back to EMAP in March.

Options

- 12. The Play Team received 24 applications from York's play sector totalling just over £2 million. Support from the newly formed Play England was sought to sift applications and identify potential projects. All projects were then presented to a panel which included officers from the Youth Service, Parks and Open Spaces, Children's Fund, Neighbourhood Pride Unit, Early Years and Extended Schools Partnership, CVS, and Finance, together with the Executive Member for Children's Services and 2 Play Officers. Supporting information was provided to the panel including feedback from children and young people and the revised policy to assist with the shortlisting process.
- 13. After much discussion the panel produced the following:
 - A list of 7 projects which meet the criteria and which, subject to further clarification / investigation of feasibility, will be pursued as potential projects to form the final portfolio (Details in Annex 1)
 - A number of reserve projects which demonstrated some fit with the criteria and have potential to be worked up in order to meet all the criteria. These were not scored by the panel as being priorities to put forward. These schemes are not therefore rejected at this stage and should a number of the 7 projects prove incapable of being developed to meet the requirements they could be re-examined. (Details in Annex 2)
 - A list of projects that fail to meet the Big Lottery criteria and play strategy (Details in Annex 3)
- 14. The panel was also consulted on the authority's proposed use of its available 10% top slice to extend an existing post already established in

the Play Team which focuses on supporting the play sector in working towards the Taking Play Forward policy and monitoring of play grants. This role, the Play Policy Development Worker is currently a 0.2 post. It is estimated that the capacity of this post would be increased by an additional 0.4, subject to a bench marking exercise by HR including confirmation of grade through the job evaluation process. The post will be presented to DMT in January for approval under the Director's delegated authority.

- 15. The 7 shortlisted schemes will be further investigated by officers to consider their feasibility. The proposed value of these schemes totals over £650k compared to our allocation after top slicing of £295k. This gap will be addressed by:
 - The likelihood that one or two projects will prove not to be feasible and will be withdrawn
 - Taking out some elements of the bids that do not meet the criteria
 - Challenging the projects to revisit their costings and to consider whether they can deliver the outcomes for less
- 16. From this process we will be left with a number of projects meeting the £295k allocation who are signed up to delivering their project on budget and in the timescale. These will go forward to the Big Lottery in the authority's portfolio for their final decision. The portfolio will profile the spend over the 3 year period.

The Future

- 17. Organisations which receive an award will enter into a service level agreement with the Council. This will enable the authority to monitor the delivery of the project against the Big Lottery criteria and the *Taking Play Forward* strategy.
- 18. This is 3 year project involving one-off awards. There is no obligation on the authority with regard to any ongoing support or further commitment at the end of the 3 year period. However, the Play Team will continue to work alongside those projects who will be running services as a result of the awards in order to assist and advise on future sustainability and to examine new funding sources.

Analysis

19. Accessing the Lottery Fund will enable the authority to respond in a positive way to needs highlighted through the redevelopment of the city Play Policy. It will also further enhance and build upon the work that the Play Team and partners have achieved for the sector.

Corporate Priorities

20. The Big Lottery funding would directly contribute to *Improving the life* chances of the most disadvantaged and disaffected children, young

people and families in the city. The updating of the Play policy will link with all corporate policies relating to play.

Implications

Financial

- 21. City of York has been allocated £328k to be spent over three years. £32.8k (10%) will be retained to finance the management of the grant and the approved projects. The balance of £295.2k will be distributed to the approved projects within the portfolio.
- 22. The proposed extension of the existing Play Policy Development Worker to 0.6FTE from 0.2FTE (over 3 years) would use £30.4k of the £32.8k top slice. The balance would be used to provide support to each of the approved projects.

- 23. There are seven projects to be taken forward. They currently have a total bid value of £672.8k. This exceeds the available allocation by £377.6k. As part of the clarification work, officers will be looking at bringing the bids within the allocation available.
- 24. The projects that are being held on the reserve list total £399,515.
- 25. The Lottery have stated that projects must stand alone through the funding provided by them. There is no requirement for match funding from the authority. As part of this process the Play Team must consider the sustainability of projects and put in place an exit strategy for when the funding stream finishes.
- 26. Awards can be for either capital or revenue purposes. There is no defined split in the authority's allocation.
- 27. Any assets purchased as part of this initiative and are then owned by the City of York Council will be maintained from within the existing maintenance budgets after the three years have finished.

Human Resources (HR)

28. The job description of the current Play Policy Development Worker will be bench marked in consultation with the department's HR Advisers (subject to job evaluation). A proposal for an adjusted post with increased hours will be made to the Director for approval under delegated powers. More specific HR advice can be provided on approval of this paper.

Equalities

29. A thorough, transparent and comprehensive process has been established to ensure that projects that meet the criteria have been selected for consideration for the portfolio.

Legal

30. The Big Lottery funding will be paid to the authority which is therefore responsible for ensuring that it is spent correctly and that the projects deliver on the agreed outcomes. The authority will enter into service level Agreements to ensure that the projects remain on track.

Crime and Disorder

31. There are no implications at this stage.

Information Technology (IT)

32. There are no implications at this stage.

Property

33. There are no implications at this stage.

Other

34. There are no implications at this stage.

Risk Management

- 35. We have publicised the availability of this money. There is therefore a reputational risk if the portfolio is not accepted by the Big Lottery.
- 36. There is a risk that funded projects run by external organisations will not deliver and that grant could have to be repaid by the Council to the Big Lottery. This risk will be mitigated by revenue funding be paid out in quarterly instalments and close monitoring being undertaken by the Development Worker through the service level agreement process to spot any problems at an early stage.
- 37. All schemes will be thoroughly risk assessed against corporate guidelines with regard to their health and safety considerations for users. All organisations will be required to have appropriate insurance cover.

Recommendations

- 38. The Executive Member is recommended to:
 - Endorse the process followed to identify projects
 - Give approval for officers to work up the identified projects for inclusion in the portfolio to be presented to the Big Lottery Fund
 - Approve the list of reserve projects
 - Approve the approach set out for use of the Council's top-sliced funding

Reason: To ensure that York delivers a successful portfolio to the Big Lottery to enable our play sector to benefit from the funding on offer.

Young People's YorKash Fund: 2006/07

Summary

1. This report presents the recommendations of YorKash Panel of young people for distribution of the £170k YorKash Fund.

Background

- 2. This year there is £170,000 available for projects for young people in the City. £25k of this comes from Lifelong Learning, and Culture section of City of York Council, £90k comes from the Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF) and £55k from the Youth Capital Fund (YCF), which are both central governments funds. The criteria for the distribution of the funds were based on those agreed at the Leisure and Heritage Committee Meeting of May 2002, but adapted by the YorKash Panel to incorporate the requirements associated with the YOF and YCF as well. It was agreed that projects applying should:
 - Be based on ideas that have come from young people
 - Be for 11-21 year olds
 - Be achievable i.e. planning permission
 - Be from new or existing groups
 - Have long term benefits for young people
 - Involve young people fully in applying for the money
 - Allow young people an opportunity to develop personally and socially
 - Provide activities and services for young people, things to do and places to go, especially for those most disadvantaged in society

Consultation

3. The YorKash Panel was recruited through a postcard campaign that went through all secondary schools, all York youth service projects and voluntary sector youth projects in the City. Overall 22 young people have been involved in this panel. The panel met to develop the funding criteria and application form. They also developed the publicity for the scheme to attract applications, distributing the application forms and promotional posters to current youth groups within the City. The group also organised a press event in the City Centre where they gave fortune cookies out to young people. This

resulted in a piece covering the scheme on Radio York, and a piece in the Press and the Star.

4. This resulted in the panel receiving 75 applications from young people's groups across the City. 3057 young people have been involved in writing these applications for a total of £493,580. This compares to 46 applications in 2004/5, 31 applications in 2002/3 and 54 in 1999/2000. The panel then assessed these applications and short-listed them in a fair and transparent manner, rejecting those applications that did not meet the criteria, and allocating funding to those which did.

The Future

5. Evaluation of the projects which have been recommended to receive a share of the fund will be organised by the YorKash panel of young people. All groups will be sent a questionnaire to be completed and visits to the groups/projects will be organised. A presentation evening and press launch is to be organised by the YorKash panel, to celebrate the success of the fund and of the young people.

Option

6. The YorKash Panel of young people have recommended that 64 applications receive a share of the funding in this round. The recommended applications are set out in Annex 1.

Analysis

- 8. The YorKash funding meets the Council objectives of:
 - Encouraging all Children and Young People to become Active Citizens
 - Consulting with young people about the future of the City and about provision by the council on behalf of young people.

9. The YorKash fund is made up of £25k from council budgets as well as £90k from the Youth Opportunity fund and £55k from the Youth Capital fund, totalling £170k. Awards made to the 64 recommended applicants will total £169,926, are affordable within the budget available and have an appropriate split of the revenue and capital awards.
