#### **Holding the Executive to Account**

The majority of councillors are not appointed to the Executive (38 out of 47). Any 3 non-Executive councillors can 'call-in' an item of business from a published Executive (or Executive Member Advisory Panel (EMAP)) agenda. The Executive will still discuss the 'called in' business on the published date and will set out its views for consideration by a specially convened Scrutiny Management Committee (SMC). That SMC meeting will then make its recommendations to the next scheduled Executive meeting in the following week, where a final decision on the 'called-in' business will be made.

The purpose of all scrutiny and ad-hoc scrutiny committees appointed by the Council is to:

- Monitor the performance and effectiveness of services;
- Review existing policies and assist in the development of new ones, as necessary; and
- Monitor best value continuous service improvement plans

## LICENSING ACT 2003 SUB – COMMITTEES PROCEDURE FOR HEARINGS

#### <u>Introduction</u>

The procedure outlined below will be followed at all Licensing Hearings.

As Licensing Hearings are quasi-judicial the Sub-Committee will, in effect, act like a Court and the rules of natural justice will apply. The Sub-Committee will be guided by legal principles in determining whether evidence is both relevant and fairly admitted. Committee Members have a duty to view all evidence presented before them impartially. Members of the Licensing Sub-Committee have all received relevant training and are used to making decisions of this type. No matter how strong local opinion may be, Committee Members can only make decisions based on relevant licensing issues as set out before the Sub-Committee in determining applications.

The hearing will be in public session. However, the Sub-Committee may exclude the public from a hearing if it considers it in the public interest to do so. However, the decision will be made in private.

The purpose of the hearing is

- To enable those with a right to appear to advance their point of view and to test the case of their opponents
- To assist the Sub-Committee to gather evidence and understand the relevant issues

In view of the requirement to hold hearings within specified times, the Licensing Authority will generally be unable to enter into discussions to identify dates convenient to all parties concerned. In <u>exceptional</u> circumstances, the Licensing Authority will consider applications to adjourn hearings to a later date.

#### Representations at Licensing Hearings

The Applicant, Ward Councillors, and Representors who have made written submissions will be allowed to speak at the Sub-Committee. At any hearing of an application, the Applicant and any Representors shall attend in person wherever possible. Any party to a hearing may be assisted or represented by any person, legally or otherwise.

All parties will be given a fair hearing and each party will have the same amount of time in which to address the Sub-Committee. A time limit has been set because of the pressures on the Sub-Committees to hear so many applications in a short period of time. Each party will have 15 minutes to address the Sub-Committee, give any further information, and call any witnesses. If any party considers this time to

be insufficient then a request in writing may be made to the Democracy Officer for an extension of time at least 2 working days before the hearing. However, this will not be automatically granted and will be at the discretion of the Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee may take into account any documentary evidence or other information in support of the application, representations or notice, either before the hearing or, with the consent of all other parties, at the hearing.

If any Representors fail to attend the hearing, the Sub-Committee will normally proceed but will consider their written objection and hear and consider any evidence and argument in relation to it put forward by the Applicant. In considering written evidence in the absence of a Representor, appropriate weight will be attached, given that the person cannot be questioned by the Applicant and Members.

The Sub-Committee is required to disregard any information given or evidence produced by a party or witness which is not relevant to the application, representations, or notice, and the promotion of the licensing objectives. Duplication should be avoided. Comments must be confined to those points already made, although the parties may extend or expand on their written submissions. The Sub-Committee will have read and familiarised themselves with all the written submissions and the issues prior to the hearing, and therefore do not require the points to be repeated or made at length. The Applicant and Representors cannot raise substantial new information at a hearing which has not been seen previously by the other parties.

A Representor **may not** introduce any new ground or objection not referred to in the written submission unless the Sub-Committee considers there are <u>exceptional</u> circumstances for doing so and the Representor is able to justify why the ground or objection should be raised. The Applicant may make representations to the Sub-Committee as to why any such request to introduce a new ground should or should not be granted. In considering whether to grant a request by a Representor to introduce a new ground, the Sub-Committee will consider why the new evidence has not been produced earlier and whether the admission of such a ground would necessitate the grant of an adjournment and will consider any unfairness to the Applicant or other Representors by reason of the extra cost or delay thereby caused.

Any person behaving in a disruptive manner will be asked to leave the hearing. If this does occur, that person may, before the end of the hearing, submit in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally.

#### Procedure prior to the Hearing

The Members sitting on the Sub-Committee will meet prior to the hearing to note the matters that are to be presented. They will only be accompanied by the Democracy Officer and Legal Advisor (*if present*). Attention will only be drawn to the nature of the application and the premises or person to which it relates. The actual application will not be discussed.

At any hearing of an application, the Licensing Officer, the Applicant and any Representors or representatives will report to reception and be asked to wait in reception until the democracy officer calls them through to the committee room.

#### **Procedure at the Hearing**

- 1. Members of the Sub-Committee will appoint a chair.
- 2. The Chair introduces the Committee Members and officers [Democracy Officer, Legal Advisor to the committee (if present) and the Licensing Officer], welcomes the Applicant and Representors (or their representatives), and establishes the identity of all who will be taking part.
- 3. The Chair will explain to the parties the procedure that will be followed at the hearing.
- 4. The Chair will proceed with the order of business on the agenda.
- 5. When the agenda item relating to the application is reached, the Chair will invite the Licensing Officer to present the application.
- 6. The Licensing Officer outlines the application, confirms the application details, introduces the report and gives an update on any recent changes.
- 7. The Chair will invite Committee Members, the Applicant and Representors (or representatives) to ask the Licensing Officer questions to clarify any points raised in the report.
- 8. The Chair will ask the Applicant (or their representative) to present their case.
- 9. The Applicant (or their representative) will present their case and may call any witnesses to support their case [maximum 15 minutes].
- 10. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to ask questions of the Applicant (or their representative) and/or witnesses [maximum 5 minutes each party]
  - (i) Police
  - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
  - (iii) Ward Councillors
  - (iv) Interested Parties
- 11. The Chair will invite the Committee Members to ask questions of the Applicant (or their representative) and/or witnesses.
- 12. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to state the nature of their interest in the matter, present their case and call any witnesses to support their case [maximum 15 minutes each party]
  - (i) Police
  - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
  - (iii) Ward Councillors
  - (iv) Interested Parties

- 13. The Chair will invite the Applicant to ask questions of each Representor (or their representative) and/or their witnesses after each presentation [maximum 5 minutes per Representor].
- 14. The Chair will invite the Committee Members to ask questions of each Representor (or their representative) and/or their witnesses after each presentation.
- 15. The Chair will invite the Representors (or their representative) in the following order to summarise their case [maximum 5 minutes each party]
  - (i) Police
  - (ii) Other Responsible Authorities
  - (iii) Ward Councillors
  - (iv) Interested Parties
- 16. The Chair will invite the Applicant (or their representative) to summarise their case [maximum 5 minutes].
- 17. The Chair will provide the Sub-Committee with a final opportunity to seek clarification from any of the parties on any points raised, or seek advice from the Licensing Officer on policy, or from the Legal Advisor (*if present*) on law and jurisdiction.
- 18. When all the evidence has been heard, the Chair will declare the hearing closed and ask the Licensing Officer, the Applicant and Representors (or their representatives) plus any witnesses present to leave the committee room and wait in reception while the Sub-Committee considers the evidence.

#### **Procedure after the Hearing**

- 19. If the Sub-Committee wish to seek further clarification on the evidence given, the Democracy Officer will invite all parties back into the committee room.
- 20. If possible, and for all hearings under:-
  - section 35 or 39 which is in respect of an application made at the same time as an application for conversion of an existing licence under paragraph 2 of Schedule 8 (determination of application under section 34 or 37)
  - section 85 which is in respect of an application made at the same time as an application for conversion of an existing club certificate under paragraph 14 of Schedule 8 (determination of application under section 85)
  - section 105(2)(a) (counter notice following police objection to temporary event notice)
  - section 167(5)(a) (review of premises licence following closure order)
  - paragraph 4(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing licence)

- paragraph 16(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing club certificate)
- paragraph 26(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application by holder of a justices' licence for grant of personal licence)

the Sub-Committee will make a decision on conclusion of the hearing and only the Democracy Officer and the Legal Advisor to the Sub-Committee (if present) will remain in the room with the Committee Members. These officers will not comment on the merits of the application, but will be present to provide advice on legal and procedural points and to record the decision.

- 21. If the decision has been made, all the parties will be invited back into the committee room by the Democracy Officer. The Chair will announce the decision including reasons together with, if appropriate, details of any conditions to be attached to the grant of the licence. This decision will then be communicated in writing to the Applicant and Representors within 3 working days of the hearing. There can be no further questions or statements.
- 22. For all other hearings not listed above, if the Sub-Committee is unable to make a decision on the day of the hearing, the decision will be made within 5 working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held. The Democracy Officer will inform the parties that they are no longer required and the decision will be communicated in writing to the Applicant and Representors within 3 working days of the decision being made.
- 23. The notification will include information about the rights of appeal against the determination made.

## Section 35(3)(a) Application for the Variation of a premise licence for The Woodman, 16 Main Street, Bishopthorpe, York, YO23 2RB

#### Summary

- 1. This report seeks Members determination of an application for the variation of a premise licence, which has been made under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2. Application reference number: CYC-008938
- 3. Name of applicant: Carol Ann Temple
- 4. Type of authorisation applied for: Variation of premises licence
- 5. <u>Summary of application</u>: The nature of the application is: a) to extend existing licensed hours for the sale of alcohol; b) to provide regulated entertainment consisting of films, indoor sporting events, live music, recorded music and provision of facilities for making music and dancing; c) to provide late night refreshment; d) to remove all embedded restrictions listed in Annex 1 of the current premises licence.

#### **Background**

- 6. A copy of the existing premise licence is attached at Annex 1.
- 7. A copy of the application to vary the licence is attached at Annex 2.
- 8. A table detailing existing hours and proposed hours is attached at Annex 3.

#### **Promotion Of Licensing Objectives**

- 9. The operating schedule submitted by the applicant shows that, in addition to existing conditions attached to the current licence, the licensing objectives would be met as follows:
- 10. The prevention of crime and disorder: CCTV will be fitted if required.
- 11. <u>Public safety</u>: Premises are subject of a regulatory reform (fire safety) audit. Children's play equipment in garden subject to regular inspection.

- 12. The prevention of public nuisance: Inner door to lobby and all windows to remain closed when entertainment being provided. Applicant is aware of noise issues which could emerge. Music to be reduced to quieter 'wind down' music for last 30 minutes. Appropriate notices to be displayed at all exits requesting customers to be quiet.
- 13. <u>The protection of children from harm</u>: Requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 will be complied with.

#### **Special Policy Consideration**

14. This premise is not located within the area.

#### Consultation

15. Consultation was carried out by the applicant in accordance with s13, and s17(5) of the Act and Regulation 42, Parts 2 and 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005, which concern the displaying of a notice on the premises and an advertisement in a local paper giving details of the application and serving a copy of the application on all responsible authorities. The applicant complied with all statutory requirements. In addition the relevant ward councillors and/or parish council were notified by way of register.

#### **Summary of Representations made by Responsible Authorities**

- 16. A representation has been received from the following responsible authority relating to this application. This is attached at Annex 4 and summarised below:
- 17. Environmental Protection Unit make representation on the grounds of public nuisance and ask that the following conditions be attached to the licence if the variation to the licence is granted; 1) Noise from the operation of amplified music or regulated entertainment originating from on the premise shall be inaudible within noise sensitive premises. 2) All windows shall be kept shut during the operation of amplification equipment and regulated entertainment. 3) During the operation of amplification equipment and regulated entertainment all external doors shall be kept shut when not in use, with the exception to the front door that may remain open during opening hours providing that the inside porch is kept shut when not in use.

#### **Summary of Representations made by Interested Parties**

18. Representations have been received from the interested parties listed at Annex 5 (confidential). Their representations are attached at Annex 6.

The addresses of the interested parties are indicated on the map attached as Annex 7 (confidential). A further map indicating the general area from which representations were received is attached at Annex 8. Nineteen representations were received from the Main Street area, 4 from Church Lane, 2 from Ebor Court, and one each from Acaster Lane, Chantry Lane, Croft

- Court. An "interested party" is defined at s13(3) of the Act as being a person living in the vicinity of the premises, a body representing persons who live in that vicinity, a person involved in a business in that vicinity, or a body representing persons involved in such businesses.
- 20. Five representations received from interested parties were not deemed to be relevant as they were not considered to be in the vicinity of the premises. This decision was made by the Head of Licensing and Regulation in consultation with the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services under the terms of the Licensing Act 2003 and the City of York Council delegation scheme.
- 21. Members are reminded that representations are only "relevant" if they relate to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives.

#### **Options**

- 22. By virtue of s18(4) of the Act, the Committee have the following options available to them in making their decision:-
- 23. Option 1: Grant the variation of the licence in the terms applied for.
- 24. Option 2: Grant the variation of the licence with modified/additional conditions imposed by the licensing committee.
- 25. Option 3: Grant the variation of the licence to exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates and modify/add conditions accordingly.
- 26. Option 4: Reject the application.

#### **Analysis**

- 27. The following could be the result of any decision made this Sub Committee:-
- 28. Option 1: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by any of the representors.
- 29. Option 2: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant or any of the representors.
- 30. Option 3: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant or any of the representors.
- 31. Option 4: This decision could be appealed at Magistrates Court by the applicant.

#### **Corporate Objectives**

- 32. The Licensing Act 2003 has 4 objectives the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm.
- 33. These directly contribute to the Council's Safer City priority and corporate aim 4.
- 34. In addition the licensing objectives of public safety and prevention of public nuisance contribute towards corporate objective 1.4 protection of residents from pollution, public health and safety hazards.

- 37. Measured in terms of impact and likelihood, the risk score has been assessed at less than 16. This means that at this point the risks need only to be monitored as they do not provide a real threat to the objectives of this report.

#### **Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions**

MANDATORY CONDITIONS WHERE LICENCE AUTHORISES SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL

- (1) In accordance with section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
- (a) at a time where there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### **Embedded Restrictions**

### STANDARD PRE-EXISTING CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ON LICENCE WITH NO CHILDREN'S CERTIFICATE

#### **Permitted Hours**

- 1. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours. In this condition permitted hours means:
- a) On weekdays (other than Christmas Day or Good Friday) 10:00 to 23:00
- b) On Sundays (other than Christmas Day) 12:00 to 22:30
- c) On Good Friday, 12:00 to 22:30
- d) On Christmas Day, 12:00 to 15:00 and 19:00 to 22:30
- e) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31<sup>st</sup> December).

#### The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of alcohol on the premises
- b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking away of alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel
- c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours, the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as an ancillary to their meals.
- d) the sale or supply of alcohol to, or consumption of alcohol by, any person residing at the licensed premises
- e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the dispatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered
- f) the sale or alcohol to a trader for the purpose of his trade, or to a registered club for the purposes of the club

- g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces
- h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there
- i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied
- j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

#### Children

- 2. No person under fourteen shall be allowed in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:
- a) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
- b) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
- c) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.
- d) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is merely ancillary.

In this condition bar includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the sale and consumption of intoxicating liquor, but does not include a bar at any time when it is usual in the premises in question for it to be, and it is -

- i) set apart for the service of table meals, and
- ii) not used for the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor otherwise than to persons having table meals there and for consumption by such persons as an ancillary to his meal.

#### Credit Sales

- 3. Intoxicating liquor shall not be sold or supplied for consumption on the premises unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied. This condition, however, shall not apply:
- a) If the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, is consumed with the meal and is paid for together with the meal, or b) If the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guests and is paid for together with his accommodation, or c) If the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor is to any canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or to an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces.

#### Late Night Refreshment

The licence holder may also provide and permit the consumption of late night refreshment for a period of 30 minutes after the permitted hours set out above.

#### Recorded Music

Recorded music may be played throughout the premises without limitation in line with previous provisions as set out in Section 182 of the Licensing Act 1964.

#### Private Entertainment

As the provisions of the Private Places of Entertainment (Licensing) Act 1967 was previously adopted and applied throughout the City of York Council area, private entertainment for gain may be provided throughout the premises without limitation by virtue of the previous Justices Licence.

The Environmental Protection Unit would like to make representations regarding this application as we have received complaints regarding noise from this premises.

I have written to Ms Carol Temple to discuss my concerns regarding noise and have highlighted my suggestions to reduce the impact that later hours will have on nearby residents. The following actions have been recommended and could be attached to the variation of the license:

- Noise from the operation of amplified music or regulated entertainment originating from on the premises shall be inaudible within noise sensitive premises.
- All windows shall be kept shut during the operation of amplification equipment and regulated entertainment.
- During the operation of amplification equipment and regulated entertainment All external doors shall be kept shut when not in use. With exception to the front door that may remain open during opening hours providing that the inside porch door is kept shut when not in use.



I am writing to object to plans by the Woodman pub in Bishopthorpe to extend its licensing hours, including more live music entertainment.

My objection relates to the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance.

We already have a problem with criminal activity taking place in the long garden areas at the back of the pub. I have reported damage to our fence and hedges in our garden to the police on several occasions. We believe this is being caused by customers of the Woodman trespassing and causing damage late at night. This activity will only increase with increased opening hours. Late night revellers have also been responsible for smashing the butchers' window, which is opposite the Woodman, and there is regularly rowdy behaviour on Main Street after the pubs close.

Bishopthorpe is a quiet residential village which has been granted conservation status. It is also very family-friendly, with many young children living in the centre of the village on Main Street. So an increase in rowdy, loud behaviour even later at night would constitute a public nuisance.


It would be entirely inappropriate to change the nature of the village and allow it to become a place where people can drink and listen to live or recorded music until the early hours of the morning.





In regard to the above application we would like to strongly object to its content.

Bishopthorpe is a small village already served by two other public houses and a social club. Living on the Main Street we have our fair share of noise, unruly behaviour and general public nuisance not only at closing time. We feel that the extended hours applied for by the Woodman to 1230hrs in the week and 0130hrs at weekends are unreasonable these could attract customers from farther afield than the village and will result in them wandering the Main Street after hours in search of a way home or just hanging round waiting for taxis. After so many hours of drinking I feel that it will fuel crime, public disorder and public nuisance. You would think that if an establishment opens at 830am in the morning by 11oclock at night every one would have had their fill.



Further to our previous letter I would like to add some more information in respect of our objection to the above licence application.

We have now been informed that the hours applied for are even later than originally asked for ie: 10.00am -01.00am Monday to Thursday and 10.00am -0200am Friday and Saturdays. These hours are really unnecessary for a village of our size. You can imagine the noise when everyone leaves.

I would like to bring your attention to what happened last Saturday night (4<sup>th</sup> Nov) in Bishopthorpe. There was a crowd of 30 or so youngsters who had all been drinking some had been at the Marcia Bonfire, well at 11.30 it turned into a massive fight in the middle of the Main Street which carried on for about an hour the police were called there were arrests and injuries which required an ambulance being called. This is an example of what can happen when alcohol is served to under age youngsters and when licensing hours are too long.

Bishopthorpe does not need the further temptation of extended licensing hours and the disturbance it can cause to residents. Plus someone in authority needs to do something about establishments serving underage teenagers alcohol.


#### **Objection to Extended Opening Hours**

We object to the granting of extended opening hours to the 'Woodman' public house. This is a village pub and we cannot understand the requirement for these extended opening hours.



License Application by the Woodman Pub, 16 Main Street, Bishopthorpe.

I have been approached by a neighbour to the above premises for Bishopthorpe Parish Council support in making representations against this application for extended hours.

We have explained that as the Committee has already made a determination with respect to applications by the Social Club and the Marcia, it would not be unreasonable for a grant to be given if the proposed hours fall within the hours already granted previously and which are deemed by the committee to full fill the 4 licensing objectives. We would expect the same restrictions to be made.

This has been accepted but there is an important difference here in so much as that where the Social Club and the Marcia are detached buildings, the Woodman is attached to its neighbouring cottage. Therefore the playing of music and other entertainment will disturb the neighbours. Therefore a restriction for this "nuisance" to finish earlier would be reasonable. In the case of the Marcia this is set at 11/11:30 pm and the committee may consider an earlier termination would be more desirable due to the proximity of the neighbours.

There is also a restriction at the Marcia for all outside use to be finished by 11:20 pm. A decking area has been placed in the front of the Woodman. It is set with tables. Although it is fairly recent and has not been in use for long, noise is generated by movement over the decking. Also due to the proximity to the neighbours living area talking is disturbing and smoking take place is noticeable. There is a possible planning issue about this decking area.

We see no reason why the premises need to be open at 8.00 am. No reason has been given but if traffic were generated then this would not be so desirable as to its effect on children walking to the schools. The Woodman is on one of the main "walking" routes and the neighbouring car parks are used for the "park and stride" initiative. Opening at 10:00 am as with the Marcia would be more acceptable.

In summary a change to extend hours as per those approved for the Marcia would be acceptable. Any longer hours would not be. The same restrictions (or more stricter ones as above) should be imposed.







#### THE WOODMAN PUBLIC HOUSE, MAIN STREET, BISHOPTHORPE.

I understand that yet another application for longer opening hours has been made, - by the above. Having personally wasted much time preparing for, - and speaking at, the Public Enquiry re The Marcia, Main street, Bishopthorpe, I am appalled to see that this can still be an on-going problem.

I wish to object to this application on the grounds of Prevention of Crime and Disorder, and Public Nuisance.

1) THERE ARE ALREADY Public Nuisance and Petty Crime problems on Main Street - and elsewhere in The Village, caused by revellers going home after closing time. There is widespread feeling that nobody takes any responsibility for the proper PREVENTION of problems under both the above headings.

Any extension of opening hours is bound to transfer this problem even further into the small hours, which will have even further adverse effect on local Residents (Ratepayers). This situation can only get worse, as any extra trade will likely have to be generated from OUTSIDE Bishopthorpe - from people who will have even less consideration for Bishopthorpe Residents. There is also a PUBLIC SAFETY issue here, with more Drink / Drive potential - predominantly for young people.

- 2) ANY EXTENSION of the recently agreed opening hours is bound to evoke a response for similarly extended hours from both The Marcia, and the W.M. Social Club, both of which are almost next door to The Woodman, also on Main Street, on the grounds of their losing potential business. This is a very valid commercial consideration, especially as the largest two Pub Companies in the U.K. are involved.
- 3) THE WOODMAN has now constructed an external drinking area by the establishment of decking etc. on it's front elevation to Main Street, and this abuts directly onto the windows of the adjacent Cottage. Whilst not my problem, this does seem to be a rather insensitive act by The Woodman.

The Licensing Office must SURELY have a serious responsibility to ensure that such 'in your face' situations are avoided. This in itself is already something of an act of Public Nuisance directly from The Woodman. It is also surely an indication of the Pub's likely attitude towards preventing any escalation of Disorder and Nuisance Problems.




We wish to object to the proposed extended licensing hours for the Woodman. Public House. Main Street Bishopthorpe.







I would like to oppose the proposed application at the above establishment.while I do not wish to take away peoples enjoyment or perpetuate a nanny state mentality, there really is nothing to commend this application.

The village is exactly that, a village not a town. 
My objection is based on the grounds of increased noise late at night.

Will you please take the above into account when reviewing this application?



Re: application for extended licensing hours, Woodman Inn Bishopthorpe. York We are writing to strongly object to any variation of the licence for the Woodman Inn.

Main Street, Bishopthorpe is in the conservation area and is primarily a residential area. It already has three other licensed premises and should this extension be granted they also could apply for the same leading to very late night drinking and excessive noise in the village increasing traffic noise and public nuisance which has accelerated over the summer months. We believe there are enough hours already to accommodate the needs of local drinkers as found by the previous Landlords. On a more personal note.

#### THIS PROPERTY ADJOINS OURS

A. We already have done major work within our home to insulate from noise and feel in this respect we can do no more. The Woodman is not a detached public house and therefore a comparison should not be made with the other licenced properties in the village.

B. In the past <u>music</u> of any sort can be heard through the wall and should this be a regular occurrence at the requested hours it would be totally impossible to live with - particularly for us and other neighbours. We already have music from other establishments and indeed can hear it now in spite of the double-glazing and tv. - from the Social Club. As music is played at the Club every weekend and during the week surely the need for yet more in premises attached to a residential home is completely unnecessary.

C. Decking has been placed within 4 feet of our sitting room/bedroom windows with lighting and heaters for outdoor drinking/eating/smoking. Most people know that decking exacerbates every noise which will be intolerable at any time. We already suffer noise from people walking in and out of the pub on the new decking. Decking is also proposed for the back which will again mean more noise. Also this will mean the smoke from the no-smoking ban will drift in our house and garden.

D. We have always had noise 30 feet away from the house in the garden due to the beer cooling system which although a nuisance we have never complained about. However the kitchen is actually attached to our house with no outside ventilation relying completely on **extractor fans** and cooling systems. Although the cooling system falls above the noise regulation and therefore should not be used, the extractor is just below and therefore can be on for 10 hours per day giving a constant hum and vibration, even when on low, so should late night eating be granted with its inevitable clearing up afterwards this would be totally unacceptable as we would be unable to sleep.

Finally we are aware of the problems living close to a public house brings having resided here for nearly forty years without too many problems but are totally opposed to any changes in the current licence, particularly if later hours were allowed as our/anyones future living here would appear to be under threat.


My objection is based on the grounds of increased noise late at night.





- Residential area with predominently older residents.
- Private dwellings on both sides of the pub
- Longer drinking hours could lead to anti-social behavior in small hours causing noise and vandalism
- Most residential properties are close to road, without garages, and if anti-social behavior increases, so will car crime.
- Likely to bring in non-local people and increased traffic, particularly in early hours of morning, cause noise disturbance
- Not social hours drinking so likely to attract unsociable people
- Already disturbed when people leave the pub, this will only become later and with the
  potential for increased consumption, and will be louder and more anti-social


My parents, to The Woodman and I am horrified to hear of the proposed changes to the use of this village pub.





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## MANDATORY CONDITIONS – PREMISES LICENCE LICENSING ACT 2003

#### MANDATORY CONDITIONS WHERE LICENCE AUTHORISES SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL

- (1) In accordance with section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence
  - (a) at a time where there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### MANDATORY CONDITION: EXHIBITION OF FILMS

- (1) In accordance with section 20 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
- (2) Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.
- (3) Where
  - (a) the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
  - (b) the relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question,
  - admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
- (4) In this section
  - "children" means persons aged under 18; and
  - "film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

#### MANDATORY CONDITION: DOOR SUPERVISION

- (1) In accordance with section 21 of the Licensing Act 2003, where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, the licence must include a condition that each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- (2) But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed
  - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or
  - (b) in respect of premises in relation to
    - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence, or
    - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
- (3) For the purposes of this section
  - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and

(b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

#### **Legislation and Policy Considerations**

- 1. The following provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 apply to this application: S4 general duties of licensing authorities; s17 application for premises licence; s18 determination of application for premises licence; s23 grant or rejection of application; and ss19, 20 and 21 mandatory conditions.
- 2. The following provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005 apply to this application: Regulation 42, Part 2 (Premises licences) and Part 4 (General) relating to applications, notices and representations and advertisement of applications
- 3. The following provisions of the Secretary of State's guidance apply to this application: Paragraphs 5.47 Steps to promote the licensing objectives.
- 4. The following paragraphs of the licensing authority's statement of licensing policy apply to this application: 3.2 Crime and Disorder; 4.1 Consultation on New Premises Applications, Club Premises Certificates, Variations and Provisional Statements; 4.2 General Principles for Determination of Applications; 5.0 Guidelines for Applicants; 7.0 Licensing Hours and Appendix D Pool Conditions.
- 5. The Committee is reminded of their duty under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to consider the crime and disorder implications of their decisions and the authority's responsibility to co-operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in the city.
- 6. The Committee is reminded that the Human Rights Act 1998 guarantees the right to a fair hearing for all parties in the determination of their civil rights. The Act also provides for the protection of property, which may include licences in existence, and the protection of private and family life.
