## 15. UPDATE REPORT - PROPOSED SCRUTINY TOPIC ON THE ACCEPTANCE OF EUROS BY YORK BUSINESSES

Members received an update report on a proposed scrutiny topic for review on the acceptance of Euros by York Businesses. This was originally submitted by Councillor Alexander.

Members received a presentation from the Director of Visit York that set out the objectives of the Gillygate Pilot Scheme.

In response to questions from Members, the Director confirmed that:

- The pilot scheme had already started in Gillygate and people had been enquiring about it.
- The pilot could continue from six weeks to two months, to allow the scheme's popularity to be assessed.
- Once the results had been collated, the findings would be reported to the Committee.

Members also queried:

- To what extent the scheme would cause confusion amongst visitors, in that only some businesses in the city would accept Euros not all businesses.
- To what extent the scheme would take into account fluctuations in the currency exchange rate in regards to businesses exchanging their Euro takings into Pound Sterling.
- Whether the scheme was more about marketing the sense of acceptance of the Euro as a currency rather than actually using Euros to sell and buy items in the city.

RESOLVED: (i) That the presentation be noted.

(ii) That an update report from Visit York on the outcome of the pilot scheme be received by the Committee at a future meeting.

## 17. REPORTS ON TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT AT YORK RAILWAY STATION AND YORK NORTH WEST

Members considered a report which presented two reports received at the Executive meeting on 30 March 2010 and invited them to decide whether they wished to take any further action in relation to these. The reports entitled 'Traffic Management at York Railway Station' and 'York Northwest Area Action Plan' were annexed to the cover report, together with copies of the Executive minutes on those items.

Officers at the meeting provided the following additional information in relation to the York Railway Station report:

A capacity study conducted by East Coast had indicated that there
was no business case for them to change the car parking

- arrangements at the station. (possibly due to the fact that the operating franchise held by East Coast was due to end in 2012.)
- East Coast were conducting a pilot study looking at similar traffic issues being encountered at Newcastle Central station, one outcome of which could be the removal of the taxis from the portico immediately outside the station. If successful at managing the traffic issues encountered there, this could be rolled out across all stations on the East Coast Mainline.
- In relation to the FTR buses, there were issues about how the buses 'docked' at their islands and the passage of cyclists around these.
- The apparent under-use of the car park at Leeman Road was probably due to the fact that there were no direction signs to this car park, which was owned by a private company and not East Coast.

Some Members raised safety concerns in relation to pedestrians using the cycle lane as a safety zone and to the restrictive movement of the FTR buses meaning that the mirrors on the vehicles would not be able to see cyclists using the lane.

In their update to Members regarding the report on the York Northwest Area Action Plan, Officers answered queries relating to the British Sugar Site. They informed Members of two meetings in the near future that would discuss future plans for the site; an inception meeting on the masterplan for the site with Associated British Foods and a Ward Committee to consult with local residents.

In response to additional queries from Members Officers stated that;

- It was currently a good time to plan for the future of this project as the recession had led to a lull in development, which meant that more planning could take place.
- The York NorthWest site was very large and that it might be better to consider it as several small sites rather than one large site.
- Investigation was currently taking place to identify alternative funding sources for investment in the site.
- Money from the Eco Settlement Plan would be used in the transport plan for the site.

RESOLVED: That the two reports on Traffic Management at York

Railway Station and York North West be noted.

REASON: To keep the Committee informed of progress in areas

of ongoing work within their remit.

## 18. PROPOSED SCRUTINY TOPIC IN RELATION TO THE ADOPTION OF NEW ESTATES

Members received a report on a proposed Scrutiny Topic in relation to the Adoption of New Estates. This topic was proposed by Councillor Watt, who was in attendance at the meeting.

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Councillor Simpson Laing had also submitted a request for a scrutiny review on a similar topic 'the implementation of planning conditions and the adoption of new estates' in summer 2009. She was unable to attend the meeting, but had previously circulated why she felt that her topic should still go ahead. These comments have been attached as an annex to the published agenda.

Councillor Watt spoke in support of his proposed topic, stating that there was a need for a scrutiny review to look into how to improve the timescale of action being taken to adopt estates by the Council.

Officers from the Council's City Development Team at the meeting stated that the timescale of the adoption of new estates, relied on developers, and other parties involved in the building process, completing their parts of the process before the Council could adopt and maintain them. Traffic Regulation Orders were sometimes put in place before the road was adopted.

In response to Members' suggestions that Planning Enforcement be examined as a scrutiny review, this topic had already been reviewed and the Committee would be updated on the findings of this at a later date.

## **Overview and Scrutiny Committee**

What is the Council's priority order for bringing forward development sites and how will they be brought forward?

The Council is working in partnership to bring forward a number of key development sites in the City including Nestle South, Terry's, Derwenthorpe, York Central and British Sugar. The Council's approach is to be responsive to and support the timescales and work programmes of developers, land owners an other interested parties. The Council's activities includes work on pre-application advice, statutory planning frameworks, masterplanning, funding of packages and determination of planning applications.

What proportion of Yorkshire Forward's Assets are coming into York?

The only substantive landownership of Yorkshire Forward in York is at Holgate Park, as part of the York Central scheme. We are lobbying, through both the LGA and Yorkshire Forward, for this asset to transfer to the Council. A decision on this has yet to be made. The meeting of Local Government Yorkshire and Humber leaders on 19<sup>th</sup> August agreed that there would be a collective response made to Government on behalf of all 22 local authorities in the region for the assets of Yorkshire Forward to remain in the region (taking into account that some of these carry with them financial liabilities in parts of the region)

What are the governance arrangements for Local Enterprise Partnerships and what representation will York have?

We have supported outline proposals for LEPs covering the Leeds City Region and York and North Yorkshire. These were submitted by the deadline of 6<sup>th</sup> September and a response is awaited from Government to both proposals. Proposals for governance arrangements for both proposed LEPs are currently under consideration. The White Paper will take this into account.

➤ What relationships will exist between York, North Yorkshire & East Yorkshire relating to economic development?

There is a long standing arrangement for the York and North Yorkshire Partnership which has considered economic development issues, particularly through Yorkshire Forward's sub-regional investment plan (SRIP). The Centre for Cities report on prioritizing prosperity in York highlighted the importance of economic links between York and the East Riding. It is intended that these relationships will be explored further the development of the LEP – the Council have actively encouraged further dialogue with the East Riding as an integral part of this LEP development. Priorities identified in the York and North Yorkshire LEP are:

- 1. To invest in the role of York as Economic driver for the sub region
- 2. Secure investment in the provision of broadband including next generation
- 3. Promote enterprise and raise aspirations
- 4. Invest in business tourism and the visitor economy

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- 5. Support for a coastal regeneration (through Hull, East Riding and Scarborough LEP)
- 6. Reduce the barriers restraining high growth businesses in rural areas
- 7. Support the food and the agricultural sector
- 8. Enable the care sector to meet rising needs
- > What interconnectivity is there between York and other high profile tourist destinations such as London & Edinburgh?

This is largely the responsibility of Visit York which has been established as a company limited by guarantee, with 3 elected members representing the Council on the board.

Visit York is part of the heritage cities marketing consortium, primarily for the US market.

Visit York are also members of the European Cities Marketing group, which includes other UK members - it is through this group that York became European City of the Year in 2007 and 2008.

Visit York have had fairly regular dialogue with Chester and Manchester, and have worked with Nottingham on the VIC benchmarking.

Other connections have been made through Welcome to Yorkshire on encouraging people from the South to enjoy Yorkshire – such as the Railway Children at Waterloo Station.

Yorkshire Museum @ The British Museum. The British Museum are keen on partnership working with the regions, so they worked with the Yorkshire Museum to allow them to display treasures at the British Museum in early-mid 2010 (while the Yorkshire museum was being refurbished. Was an excellent profile raising event.

We regularly work with the rail companies and invariably promote rail access to York - clearly linkage to Edinburgh and London is an important part of the message.

What impact will place shaping budgeting have on service delivery in York?

It is important that at a time of reduced resources that we try and bring together priorities for spend around places to try and reduce duplication or fragmentation of spend and maximise 'pooling of resources' to achieve better synergy and value for money.

> What is the economic cost of housing demand outstripping supply in York?

An appropriate level of new housing is required to support the local economy to ensure that there is an appropriate housing offer to incoming businesses and that the local workforce has access to the right type of housing. Housing completions in York have fallen significantly in York since the recession started in 2008. If we do not fully meet housing demand in this city (and there are good environmental capacity reasons why we should not), then we will need to plan for increased in commuting from people from outside York who take up new jobs in the City.

Report of the Director of City Strategy

#### 2010/11 Finance and Performance Monitor 1 Report

#### **Summary**

1. This report provides details of the 2010/11 forecast outturn position for both finance and performance in City Strategy and Housing Services.

#### **Analysis**

#### Finance – forecast outturn overview General Fund

2. The current outturn position within the City Strategy Directorate is a projected overspend of £+937k on a total net budget of £8,125k. The Housing General Fund has a budget of £1,483k and is expected to overspend by £124k. Service Plan Variations by service plan are shown below:

3. Details of the main variations by service plan are detailed in the following paragraphs.

#### City Development and Transport (£+231k)

4. Car Parking income is forecast to be £+306k below budget which is made up of £+118k short stay, £+201k standard stay, £+8k on-street offset by net £-21k surplus on Respark and season tickets.

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- 5. There is an underspend of £-26k on employee costs within School Crossing Patrols where a number of posts were unfilled in the first part of the year, and a further £-22k from a vacancy in Emergency Planning.
- 6. There are expected to be £+20k additional consultation costs in preparing the LTP3, however this is offset by £-7k saving in new residents parking zone due to low demand, and £-40k saving in public transport.

#### Planning and Sustainable Development (£+280k)

7. The economic downturn has continued to have a significant impact income within the Planning Service. The planning income projected shortfall is £+150k due to low numbers of major scheme applications, but an improvement on the £+500k reduction in income reported last year. Income from building control is projected to be a further £+180k below budget but offset by £-68k staff savings. Income from local searches is expected to be £+60k below budget due to low activity in the housing market, also offset by £-42k staff savings.

#### Resource & Business Management (£+176k)

8. The primary reason for this projected overspend is the lower than expected dividend from Yorwaste (£+230k) due to reduced tonnages and reductions in recyclates prices. This is offset by £-54k staff saving due to apprentices leaving or providing maternity cover.

#### Economic Development (£+20k)

9. Officers have carried out a detailed review of markets and city centre budgets and have realigned the budgets accordingly. Other budgets for Science City, Tourism and Inward Investment relate to guaranteed contributions to partner organisations that deliver the service. However, due to withdrawal of Yorkshire Forward funding inward investment is expected to overspend by £+20k.

#### Property Services (£+230k)

- 10. The main variation within Property Services is that Commercial property income is expected to be £+188k below budget, linked to not receiving wayleave income at Harewood Whin and from lost income due to property sales.
- 11. There are further overspends due to the decision to defer asset sales in the current economic climate which has resulted in £+99k additional costs of holding surplus assets such as Manor school Lowfields school and Parkside.
- 12. There is expected to be £-57k energy saving in the council's accommodation budget

#### Remedial Action

13. The Departmental Management Team have asked managers to review expenditure budgets and consider what actions can be undertaken to bring the budget back into a balanced position.

#### Housing Services (£+124k)

14. The review of the Housing General Fund budgets indicates that the service will be £+124k over budget. An overspend of £+161k on utility costs at travellers sites is offset by £-19k additional income being received at Howe Hill due to higher occupancy than forecast and £-18k savings on removals.

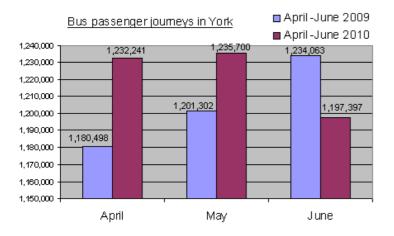
#### Finance Housing Revenue Account (HRA) - Non General Fund account

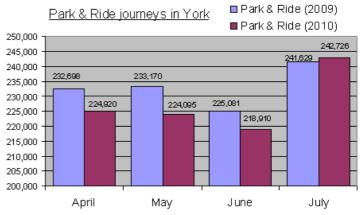
- 15. The working balance budget on the HRA is £8,777k and this first review indicates a net underspend of £-383k, leaving a projected working balance of £9,160k. The variances include:
  - Overspends totalling £+120k, the main areas being overspends on lift repairs and additional health and safety equipment purchased for estate workers along with reduced income and a reduction in interest received on the balances held.
  - Underspends totalling £-503k, mainly due to staff vacancies across housing operations, asset management and temporary accommodation along with reductions in interest payable and increased income from leaseholders and shops.

#### Performance - Monitor 1 Overview

#### City Development and Transport

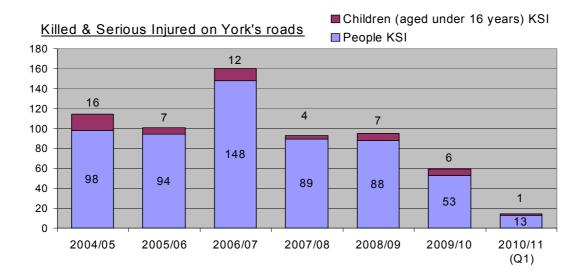
16. For Bus and Park & Ride Passengers: The overall number of passenger journeys in York improved slightly on the same period last year (currently 3.67m for April - June compared to 3.61m in the same period in 2009). Park & Ride data is now available up to July and shows a 2.3% decrease (910,651 compared to 932,578 in the same period last year). Although passengers for the first 3 months show slight reductions on last year, July figures show a 4.5% increase and it is hoped that this trend will continue over the next 8 months of 2010-11. Residents and visitors to York continue to be encouraged to use the bus through a variety of means, including more 'Car Free Days'. The council is also gradually rolling the 'Your next bus' initiative, providing SMS text real time bus information to mobile phone users.

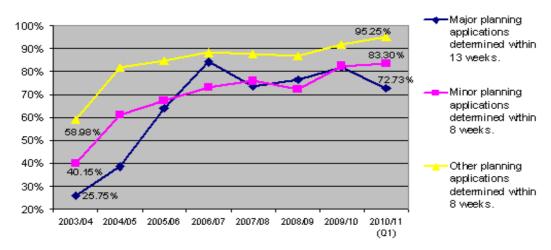
17. NPI 47: People killed or seriously injured in road traffic accidents (LAA indicator). A range of successful initiatives introduced in the last year, such as the 'Made you Look' campaign and the 'Safer Business Driving Conference has resulted in a significant improvement in the number of people killed and seriously injured on York's roads over the past 18 months and this trend has continued in Q1 (see graph below). A safer driving campaign for event for older drivers is planned for October.



#### Planning and Sustainable Development

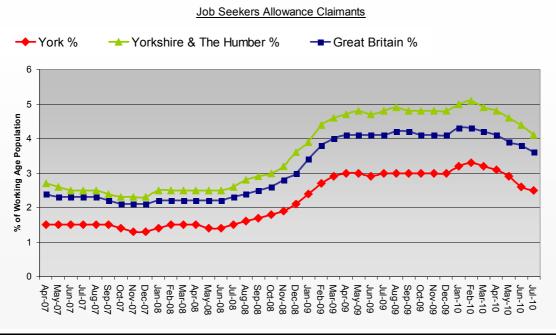
18. NPI 157a-c: Processing planning applications. The number of 'minor' planning applications determined within 8 weeks stands at 83.3% for Q1 (a 1% increase on last year). The number of 'major' applications determined within 13 weeks declined in Q1 (currently 73% compared to 82% in 2009-10). This was due to 4 of 11 applications in April and May failing to make the 13-week timescale (see graph overleaf). Despite this decline, all 3 indicators are currently performing in the top quartile for unitary authorities.

#### **Economic Development**

19. VJ15a&b: York's unemployment rate (12 month rolling average). Unemployment in York is currently 2.2% below the regional and 1.4% below the national average. A key indicator of unemployment is the number of York residents claiming job seekers allowance, which was 3443 in July 2010, a decrease of 21 from the previous month. This equates to 2.5% of the working age population and is well below the claimant count for Yorkshire and the Humber, which stands at 4.1% and the UK, which stands at 3.6% (see graph overleaf). However, York usually experiences seasonal variations due to School/College/University leavers who may find it difficult to find employment in the current economic climate.

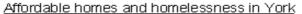
- 20. A number of factors and initiatives have influenced York's encouraging rates, and further work is underway to ensure this continues. One City is an initiative, which sees City of York Council taking measures to help residents and businesses through the recession. The main aim is to help individuals limit debt, and to support business growth and minimise job losses. Work currently taking place includes:
  - advice and information to sign-post businesses to sources of support.
  - an external strategic assessment of the city's economic outlook and its ability to recover from the recession.
  - an enterprise fund/allowance scheme is offered on a match-funding basis. To date 10 businesses have been supported through the fund. The businesses supported so far range from mobile catering to computing companies.
  - the Business Forum working with 126 businesses to ensure that their needs are centrally involved in shaping the city's economic development policy; fostering opportunities for continuing commercial success and future growth opportunities.

#### Resource and Business Management

21. This service plan area holds the cross cutting performance information for the directorate of City Strategy; for example, indicators relating to Health and Safety, Human Resources, Customer First and Finance. Resource and Business Management is not responsible for any National Performance Indicators.

#### Housing

- 22. NPI 155: Affordable homes (LAA indicator). In quarter one 52 new affordable homes have been delivered. 22 of these homes have been delivered on two private developments through planning gain agreements. The remainder have been through various grant-funded routes. The current forecast for the year is 238 against an LAA target of 252 but this will be subject to review in the current housing market and economic climate. If funding from the Homes and Communities Agency is still available, it will allow the council to build up to 21 new family homes for rent in Clifton. Work on this development will start in early in 2011 with the homes completed approximately one year later. Funding for the YorHome scheme expires October 2010 and a report reviewing the future viability of the scheme was considered in August. A funding bid for Ordnance Lane has been submitted to the Homes and Communities Agency and a decision as to whether funding will be granted is still awaited.
- 23. NPI 156: Homelessness (LAA indicator). The number of York households living in temporary accommodation fell by 52% in 2009-10, despite a rise in repossessions and homelessness across the UK. As a result, the improvement target of 75 households set for this year was particularly challenging as the recession starts to deepen. Current performance shows a rise in households living in temporary accommodation (now up to 93). However, the first half of the year is generally busier and a caseworker vacancy has significantly affected staff capacity for this service. Performance is expected to improve throughout the year.

# Future of Yorkshire Forward and Proposals for Local Enterprise Partnerships

# Summary

This report appraises the Overview and Scrutiny Committee of the likely future of Regional Development Agencies and proposals involving the City of York to establish Local Enterprise Partnerships.

#### INTRODUCTION

1. This paper brings the Overview and Scrutiny Committee up to date with progress on Local Enterprise Partnerships and also the proposed Regional Growth Fund. Members will already be aware of the intention of the Coalition Government to wind up the Regional Development Agencies. It explains the decision for York to join both a Leeds City Region and a York/ North Yorkshire outline bids for Local Enterprise Partnership status. It seeks comments and views on how York should position itself within the emerging Partnerships and how the Regional Growth Fund could best benefit York.

# YORKSHIRE FORWARD

- 2. The attached note sets out background information on the investment by Yorkshire Forward in York in recent years. In the current year, Yorkshire Forward has been asked to find cuts in expenditure totalling some £45 million across the region. The outcome of the proposals for York is as follows:
  - Key Account Management a proposal for the City of York Council working with other local authorities in North Yorkshire, taking this activity over from york-england.com, was at an advanced stage of negotiation. This has now been included in the programme of cutbacks.
  - York Central cut of £40k in the current year, as part of a forecast budget of £125,000 for York Central in 2010/11.
  - York Renaissance Team cut of £190k in the current year out of a forecast budget of £448,000 in 2010/11; this has impacted on the number of posts to be established within the Renaissance team.
  - One City programme to address worklessness and provide job match with employers - £200k project at risk and subject to further discussions to

incorporate into a Leeds City Region approach to worklessness. We have highlighted the need for this to be targeted on specific areas within York.

- Reduction in proposed grant funding to projects at York Minster and the National Railway Museum.
- There have been some significant reductions in regional programmes including a £3m cut to Business Link and £1m cut to Welcome to Yorkshire, with others identified at risk.
- Yorkshire biorefinery project £1.29 million identified as project "at risk"; of interest to Science City York although no firm decision made at present.
- In addition, it is likely that Yorkshire Forward will face further reductions in expenditure for 2011/12.

# THE COALITION GOVERNMENT'S APPROACH TO LEPS

- 3. The government's economic development priorities relate to working with the private sector to create the right conditions to promote new employment growth and the rebalancing of those economies, which are over dependent on public sector jobs. Local Economic Partnerships (LEPS) are seen as the new drivers for strategic regeneration, with individual LEPs have a portfolio of functions dependent on local opportunities and circumstances. A new Regional Growth Fund, worth £1b over 2 years, will be the principal source of central resources to support economic development.
- 4. With an emerging government agenda focussed on building on success and maximising private sector investment, York, as the North's most buoyant city, is well placed to be a strong and influential member of LEPs and to seek to maximise the Regional Growth Fund opportunities. It is also the North's most buoyant economy (according to recent research from the Centre for Cities) and is attractive to private sector investment. We are well placed to work with business on worthwhile and major transformational projects as we emerge from the recent recession. However, our specific challenge of reducing public sector job dependency also allows us to score well against this particular criterion.

# **BACKGROUND TO LOCAL ENTERPRISE PARTNERSHIPS**

- 5. The Partnership is probably well informed about the government's proposals for Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs). However, the events leading to the formation of LEPs involved;
  - a joint letter (29 July 2010) from Eric Pickles/ Vince Cable, respective Secretary
    of States for BIS and DCLG, invited outline bids for the setting up of specific
    Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) to be submitted by 6 September. The
    letter follows the government's decision to wind up Yorkshire Forward, as the
    Regional Development Agency, by March 2012 and to promote Local Enterprise
    Partnerships to fulfil the role of leading strategic economic and business
    development.

- 6. The letter from Eric Pickles and Vince Cable;
  - invites local groups of councils, including upper tier authorities, and business leaders to come together to consider to form local enterprise partnerships (LEPs) for areas that reflect their natural economic geography;
  - anticipates that local enterprise partnerships will wish to provide the strategic leadership in their areas to set out local economic priorities;
  - proposes that LEPs rebalance the economy towards the private sector and create a positive environment for business growth; and
  - suggests that a prominent business leader should chair the LEP Board but business and civic leaders normally have an equal representation.
- 7. The available information that underpins the introduction of LEPs is limited, and in the spirit of the new "localism" agenda involved local partnerships setting out how they felt LEPs could operate and the functions they should cover. Meanwhile, the following appear to be significant;
  - LEPs should be based on functional economic areas and include at least two top tier authorities, and might have population coverage of 1 million.
  - The roles and functions of LEPs will vary significantly, there will no typical LEP, as LEPs have been asked to submit bids that are tailored to their local circumstances. They can be strategic and/ or delivery organisations, and might be involved in selected activities including, inter alia, planning, transport investment, regeneration and housing, enterprise support, tourism, and economic development.
  - There is no anticipation from government that the whole of England should be covered by a LEP.
  - LEPs are expected to focus on creating the right conditions for business and growth.
  - LEPs are also expected to have a key role in implementing the government's proposed £1b Regional Growth Fund (see paragraph 11 below).

# 8. A Leeds City Region LEP.

The City of York Council carried out an internal review of linkages between York and its surrounding areas. Overall York's critical business links, together with connections in the higher education sector, are to the west and the Leeds City Region. Therefore York has reaffirmed its commitment to the Leeds City Region, as its first priority, as part the outline LEP bid to government. This decision is consistent with independent advice from the Centre for Cities, which recommends that York should participate in the LCR with a focus on particular areas of benefit access to markets, developing the financial and business sector and skills. LCR also has universities with which Science City York can develop stronger, mutually beneficial, relationships. As a government designated Science City, York can bolster its innovation credentials by extended networking and taking its model of business development (supported by private sector representation) to a wider audience. The innovation agenda is one of the principal areas the government believes private sector job creation and growth can occur.

# 9. A York and North Yorkshire LEP.

Whilst York's interests are principally served by membership of a Leeds City Region LEP, we have recognised that there are potential benefits from joining an additional LEP. York has strong economic links to the North, East and South, particularly through the high levels of net in commuting from settlements in North Yorkshire and East Riding. Therefore York has also joined an outline bid for a York and North Yorkshire LEP. Working with North Yorkshire provides opportunities for;

- seeking wide support for York's transformational economic projects (such as York Central) if York's established role as a major employment hub for the surrounding area (including settlements outside of the Leeds City Region) is to continue.
- working together formally to ensure that sustainable accessibility into York from surrounding settlements is jointly planned and that there will be support for any available central funding for initiatives such as enhancements to park and ride facilities.
- a planned approach to employment, housing and transport infrastructure provision.
- joint work on the tourism agenda recognising that that York is a tourism gateway regionally and to the north generally.
- 10. Our proposed membership of two LEPs leaves the East Riding of Yorkshire area as an anomaly since whilst the City of York and East Riding local authority boundaries are contiguous, our joint work will not benefit from the formality of working within a LEP framework. The Hull, East Riding and Scarborough outline LEP bid states that the East Riding will continue to work with York recognising that "the impact of York is particularly important in terms of the area's (East Riding) profile as a business and visitor destination, transport connections and as a centre for innovation and research". The bid helpfully trails the option of the East Riding also joining at a future date the York and North Yorkshire LEP "(the) East Riding will work with the York and North Yorkshire LEP, potentially as a full member".

# 11. Yorkshire Enterprise Partnership.

Discussions within sub regional partnerships and also as part of Local Government Yorkshire and Humber (LGYH) have already accepted that there might be areas which are best delivered at the regional level either because they make best use of the Yorkshire brand (tourism marketing for example) or where economies of scale suggest that it would be cost effective to deliver some services jointly (such as research and economic intelligence). A leading group of Yorkshire business persons have come together and presented a proposal for "Yorkshire Enterprise" which is seen as a new organisation that would complement LEPs but which would deliver services on behalf of LEPs. Generally the Yorkshire Enterprise proposals have been welcomed, especially if it brings with it additional expertise and resources and puts in place a vehicle for delivering those activities which, in the view of LEPs, are best delivered either at a regional level or involves the collaboration of more than one LEP. At this stage there have been no firm decision taken on which activities are best delivered at a regional level but the proposals will need careful consideration and integration with LEP Business Plans at the stage beyond the outline submissions.

# **REGIONAL GROWTH FUND**

12. Meanwhile the government has published a consultation paper on the proposed Regional Growth Fund. The Regional Growth Fund (RGF), operating in England, is worth £1b over two years. In the new fiscal climate the Regional Growth Fund is seen as the principal source of central funding to support enterprise, and Local Enterprise Partnerships and other private sector groupings could bid into this fund for mainly capital investment for the period 2011/12 and 2012/2013. The first bids would need to be in by the end of 2010. LEPs and other organisations can bid for RGF resources although it is clear from the guidance that LEPs will have a central role in co-ordinating and prioritising bids within their area. Whilst some RGF will be delivered through a competitive approach the government has asked for views on whether part of the RGF should be delegated to LEPs to support worthwhile initiatives and projects.

# **NEXT STEPS**

- 13.A White Paper planned for September 2010 should clarify the process and the timetable for the designation of LEPs and also clarify government's thinking on the RGF.
- 14. Business Plans will be prepared for both the LCR and York/ North Yorkshire LEPs. From a York perspective the following issues seem important;
  - That the government's agenda, focusing on private sector investments as a
    basis for fuelling job growth and only supporting worthwhile investments
    which demonstrate a market funding gap and justified through cost benefit
    analysis, should be the driving force for both LEP and RGF activity and
    therefore future York economic development initiatives.
  - LEPs should be complementary and should avoid duplication. Simplistically
    the LCR LEP should provide a focus for the innovation agenda and for
    progressing the business and professional services together with creative
    and digital, inward investment opportunities and for influencing strategic
    transport connections and investment (including rail improvements). The
    York/ North Yorkshire LEP should provide opportunities for tourism
    development and townscape improvements and support enhancing
    accessibility to the City.
  - York's dual membership should not distract York from being a strong and influential member of the LCR LEP, which should provide the main opportunity for rebalancing our City economy and delivering the government's agenda.
  - To continue to have discussions with East Riding of Yorkshire Council in relation to the option of East Riding joining the York/ North Yorkshire LEP.
  - That there is clarity as to which economic development initiatives and issue are strategic and therefore should be progressed with the LEP in the lead, and which are local and therefore relevant to the Economic Partnership.

15. There is no commitment to deliver the RGF beyond the first two years, and therefore it is important to maximise its use. As well as the government's focus on levering private sector investment and rebalancing economies away from public sector dependency, it would be helpful if York was to work with partners to ensure that the opportunity is taken to ensure that York's transformational projects are competitive as part of the RGF process.

# 1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 This report provides an update for members of the Partnership Executive, Local Authorities and other interested partners on the performance of the York Geographic Programme in the financial year 2009/10.
- 1.2 A separate report on the performance of the North Yorkshire Geographic Programme will be made to the York & North Yorkshire Partnership Executive.

# 2. Background

- 2.1 This report provides detail of performance against 5 major outputs. Businesses Created; Businesses Supported; Jobs Created or Safeguarded; Employment Assistance and Private Sector Leverage. Financial information is contained in Yorkshire Forwards Annual Report, which is currently with Ministers for consideration.
- 2.2 Maps are provided at Annex 2 which show output performance by Local Authority area

# 3. Output Performance

- 3.1 Table 1 shows the output performance of the York Geographic Programme up to the end of year and compares them to regional totals for the same period.
- 3.2 Yorkshire Forward collects Beneficiary Data about its project outputs (results) from its delivery partners. This allows us to analyze our interventions and monitor that our projects are delivering outputs where they should be. It also helps us understand who is benefiting and in which areas our project are having an impact.
- 3.3 Whilst Yorkshire Forward requires its delivery partners to submit data for all outputs claimed a small proportion of its outputs are outside the region (for example a project in Sheffield can provide support to businesses just outside the Yorkshire & Humber region) or the data received is invalid (the postcode has been incorrectly written down) this accounts for the slight difference in totals between the maps and the total outputs claimed.

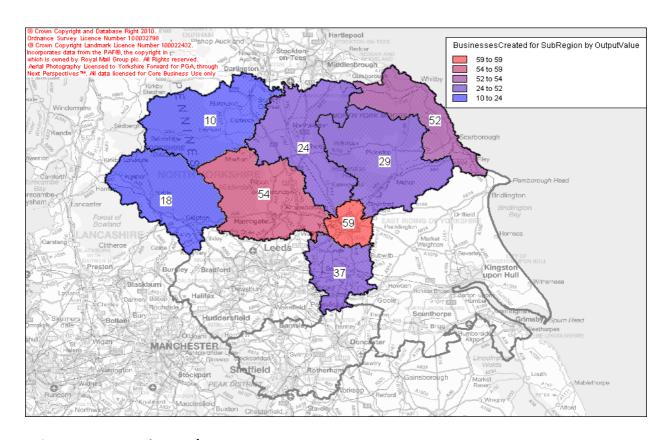

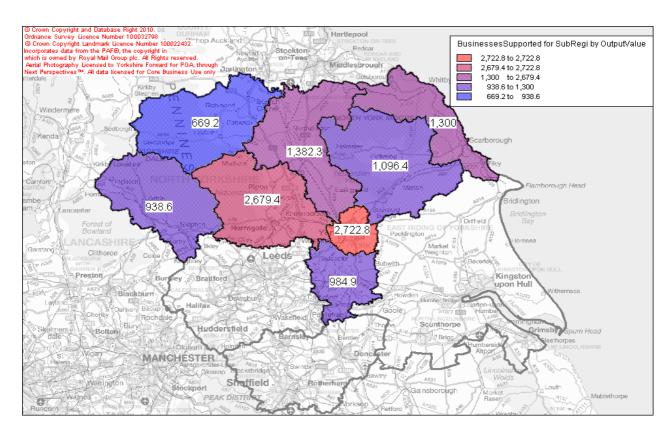

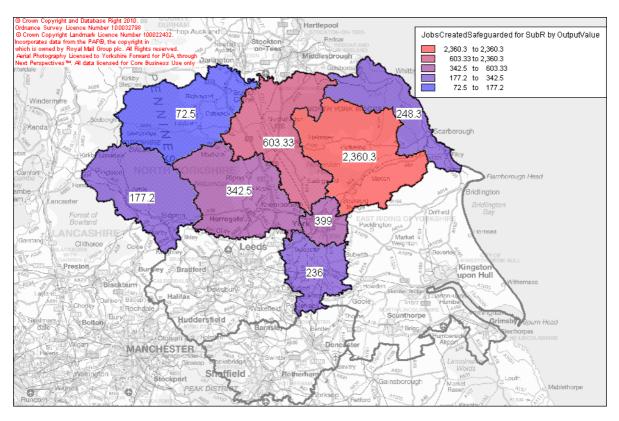
Businesses Created-2009/10 Final Figures



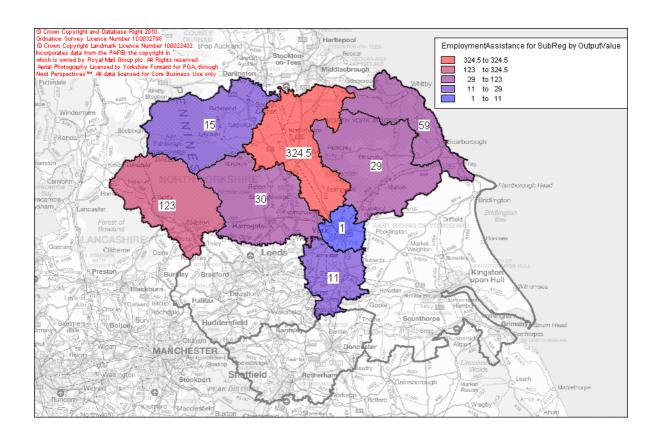
Businesses Supported -2009/10



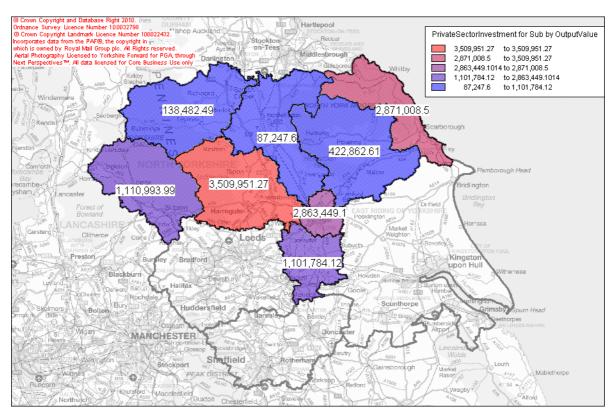
# Jobs Created and Safeguarded - 2009/10
